Solons Probe Airfield Loss

Maj. Gen. G. J. Nold, deputy chief of Army Engineers, testified Friday that a contractor recruiting workers for North African air bases passed up 20,000 men in New York because he could not weed out Jews.

Nold told the Senate Preparedness Committee that the men were recruited in Minnesota and transported to Africa.

Chairman Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex.) said the rail transportation cost from Minnesota to the embarkation point was added to the cost of the air bases. The committee is seeking an explanation of what it called a "million dollar failure" in building an air base in North Africa.

Nold said it was not advisable to send Jewish workers to Arab countries. He added that the New York State Employment Service would not do business if it was necessary to make racial discrimination.

Johnson also brought out that a New York contractor overlooked 20,000 unemployed men in New York and advertised in Fairbanks, Alaska, for workers to go to Turkey, transportation furnished.

Stocks Show Advance After Midweek Break

NEW YORK — (AP)—The stock market advanced Friday with the steel section providing the inspiration. The rise represented a good recovery from the midweek break.

The forward movement was moderate throughout, extending to around 2 points among leaders with the exception of a few soaring issues. Losses were limited to around a point or less.

Volume came to an estimated 1,400,000 shares.

EMMETT, Idaho — (AP)—Claude Blackburn, about 49, Ontario, Ore., farmer, was killed by his divorced wife Thursday, Sheriff Calvin Bernard said.

The sheriff said Mrs. Blackburn, 24, told him that Blackburn was making his weekly visit to see their children. She said she shot in self-defense when Blackburn came at her with a butcher knife, Bernard said.

The woman was not arrested.

Banker Approved By Senate Group

WASHINGTON — (AP)—A Senate subcommittee Friday unanimously recommended confirmation of Abbot L. Mills, Jr., Portland, Ore., banker, as a member of the board of governors of the federal reserve system.

Sen. Wayne L. Morse (R-Ore.) and William McCartin, chairman of the reserve board, supported Mills' nomination by President Truman.

PORTLAND — (AP)—Construction dropped off, but bank clearings mounted to a record high for January in Portland.

The clearings reached \$898,761, 816, about 3½ million dollars more than the previous January. The number of new houses slumped badly, totaling less than half of January, 1951, when 127 were started. Other construction boosted the building permit total to \$2,212,425, about \$450,000 under the previous January.
