Dr. Flach Describes 'Cold War'

The one way to prevent wars is for the people to be filled with the desire to prevent them, according to Dr. Michael Flach, native of Czechoslovakia who is a visiting professor of international relations in the political science department of the University of Oregon. He talked on "The Cold War" before Eugene Branch, American Association of University Women early this week.

The cold war is entering the homes more and more, he said, which will influence its outcome. The people make wars, and each individual has a part to play in its prevention, he declared.

At the end of the recent war, good will existed between east and west, because differences were submerged in winning; but when it came to living in peace, the differences again came uppermost, he remarked.

The speaker believes world war unlikely now, unless Russia thinks she can win. He does not think Russia ready for war, but we may "stumble into it, if either side should accidentally touch it off." Russia respects strength, he stressed.

The United States must be pre-

pared to offer world leadership, economic and moral, but leadership by this country is unacceptable to much of the world, because of the existing attitude here toward color.

He believes that a unified Europe would help the situation. Heretofore, countries have had to turn either to Russia or Germany, as the United States is too far away; a European league would give a third choice.

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
