NEW YORK—(U.P.)—Acclaimed by many as the greatest Wagnerian soprano of this generation, Kirsten Flagstad ended her Carnegie Hall concert Friday night with the announcement that it was her last recital in New York.

The 56-year-old Norwegian star of the Metropolitan Opera made the announcement with tears in her eyes as the audience shouted "no, no!"

Miss Flagstad previously had announced that she was through with opera as well as concert singing, but Rudolf Bing, general manager of the Metropolitan, persuaded her to reconsider.

New Water Line Almost Ready

COTTAGE GROVE—The city's new 14-inch supply line from the reservoir this week will receive chlorination treatment before it is placed in service.

The 3000-foot line was installed parallel to the existing wooden supply line, and although it is hooked into the distribution system, two gate valves must be opened before the line is charged with water.

City Engineer L. W. Colner said large amounts of chlorine will be placed in the new steel line and the line filled with water. After the chlorinated water has remained in the line for several hours, the line will be flushed out. It will then be ready to

handle the city's drinking supply. Colner said the line may impart a weak tar taste to some city water users the first few days, but that the change in taste would not be permanent.

The engineer said the city expected to start installation of additional steel line within a few days. The additional line will be an extension of the present new distribution pipe and will run through a large portion of central Cottage Grove.

Sitter Accused In Baby's Death

TORONTO, Ont.—(U.P.)—A 22-year-old blonde baby-sitter, accused of clubbing a three-year-old girl to death with a beer bottle, was remanded Saturday to Feb. 8 for mental examination on a murder charge.

Police identified the baby-sitter as Dianne Bound.

Police found the body of the child, Susan Kellough, lashed to her crib. She had been beaten on the head and there were two deep gashes across her face. A blood-stained beer bottle and a signed note were found nearby.

"If I can't have children, you can't have them either," the note read.

Mr. and Mrs. William Roy Kellough's other daughter, Penny Ann, 11-months, was found in a clothes hamper with a pillow pressed down on top of her. She apparently suffered no ill effects from the abusive treatment.

The Kelloughs, who recently arrived from England, were working at the time of the slaying.

Youth Fined For 'Soliciting'

COTTAGE GROVE—An 18-year-old youth was fined \$25 in Municipal Court here Friday for violation of the city's "Green River" ordinance.

The youth, Bruce P. Palmer, Salt Lake City, Utah, pleaded guilty to a charge of "soliciting on private property without consent of the owner."

Judge Don Allen said it was the first "Green River" case to come to court in the 15 years the ordinance has been in effect. In previous incidents, Allen said, no citizen has been willing to sign a complaint against a person soliciting in a residential area.

The complaint against Palmer was signed by C. J. Cox, 736 South Third St., Cottage Grove.

Under terms of the city ordinance, no one can solicit on private property unless he has consent of the owner.

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Vets Groups Deny Claim

HONOLULU, T. H.—(U.P.)—Irish veterans organizations Friday denounced the Army's claim that it sounded them out on the flat grave markers in the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific.

They demanded that the Quartermaster Corps be ordered to restore 13,000 crosses to Hawaii's "Hill of Sacrifice" which now resembles "a cow pasture."

Robert Williams, national service officer of the Disabled American Veterans, said no survey was made by the Army before taking down the white crosses and replacing them with flat grave markers.

Joining with the DAV was Robert F. Clarke, service officer of the American Legion's Hawaii department.
