

Motorist Fined On Two Charges

Crashes His Car Into Parked Auto

COTTAGE GROVE — A 21-year-old motorist who crashed his car into two parked vehicles on North Ninth St. Thursday night was fined \$125 on two counts in Municipal Court Friday.

The motorist, Lester F. Hauntz, Box 18, Saginaw, pleaded guilty to charges of driving under the influence of liquor and disorderly conduct.

Injured in the accident was Ed Gage, 54, Box 293, Cottage Grove, who was riding with Hauntz. Gage was treated at Cottage Grove Hospital for multiple lacerations about the face and released.

According to police, Hauntz's car struck the rear of a parked car owned by the Floyd Githens Motor Co. and pushed this vehicle into another car owned by H. B. McMillan of Cottage Grove.

Damage to the Githens Motor Co. car was considerable. Damage to the other vehicles was slight.

Police said Hauntz was disorderly when booked at the police station Thursday night for driving under the influence. This led to a second charge against him.

Today I learned how to spot one of J. Edgar Hoover's boys. I managed to snap up a left-over Republican box lunch at a bargain, and I was eating it on a park bench when a young man carrying a briefcase walked by with an innocent air.

"LOOKS PRETTY suspicious," I said to a fellow on the bench. "Bet he's on the way to pay off a bribe."

The fellow just laughed.

"You must be a stranger," he said. "That's an FBI man. You can always tell 'em. They're the only ones in town who still have the self-confidence to carry a briefcase."

After that I moseyed over to call on our Congressman. Did I tell you how to tell a Congressman from a Senator? The Congressman is the one with the hungry look—he's hungry for the Senator's job.

WELL, TRELLIS Mae, that's Washington for you. No matter what you say to a fellow here, he always suspects you didn't mean all you say or else didn't say all you meant. This is the capital city of the hidden meaning.

Our Congressman was fretting over a mass of papers on his desk.

"Been working on my income tax return," he said. "Taxes! Taxes! I don't know how much longer I can afford to live in this country on the pittance the government pays me."

When I asked why he didn't have an expert from the Bureau of Internal Revenue to go over it with him, he said:

"I did have one of those fellows helping me. But right now he's busy explaining his own 1949 return."

Well, I showed him a couple of

deductions he didn't know about, and I never saw such gratitude in a man in public life.

CHICAGO —(P)—The possibility that unsuspecting Illinois residents may have been eating muleburgers and donkeyburgers as well as horseburgers arose Thursday.

Martin Brodtkin, assistant state's attorney, said Arthur Nelson, a state meat inspector, told him one and possibly two slaughtering plants have been processing donkeys and mules.

In Springfield, meanwhile, Gov. Stevenson told a news conference that seven state agencies are now cooperating in a drive to stamp out illegal horse meat sales in Illinois.

Plant Wastes Under Fire

CORVALLIS —(P)—Wastes from only five industrial plants along the Willamette River are polluting the stream as much as would a city of two and a half million people, county sanitation officers were told here Wednesday.

Kenneth H. Spies, assistant chief engineer of the State Board of Health, said industrial plant managers have co-operated but that the problems still are not solved.

Among problems peculiar to a lumbering state, he said, was that of blanketing the river bottom with sawdust and wood wastes so heavily that fish food plants are killed. He spoke at one session of a three-day short course at Oregon State College for sanitarians.

Pendleton Acquires Round-Up Grounds

PENDLETON —(P)—The city of Pendleton acquired the Pendleton Round-Up grounds Thursday in a deal completed with the Round-Up Assn.

The deal calls for the city to lease the grounds to the association each year for the Round-Up, taking a percentage of the receipts. The city will maintain the property and keep any other revenue earned.

The association said it had spent \$185,000 in improvements in the past five years, and estimated the property was worth \$500,000.
