

Wreck Victim Still 'Poor'

COTTAGE GROVE — Twelve-year-old Alice Robbins, severely injured in an auto accident 10 miles east of here Sunday that cost the life of a 16-year-old youth, was still in "poor" condition at Cottage Grove Hospital Tuesday morning.

She suffered a compound fracture of the right leg and severe head injuries.

Fatally injured in the accident was Franklin A. Cornwall, son of Lafayette G. Cornwall, 246 S. 3rd St., Cottage Grove.

Several young passengers received minor injuries.

In another car accident Tuesday evening 12 miles south of Cottage Grove, Glen S. St. Clair, 20, no address available, suffered a broken nose and face lacerations.

St. Clair received out-patient treatment at Cottage Grove Hospital. Details of the accident were not available Tuesday morning.

COTTAGE GROVE—Municipal Court here Monday handled the largest number of drunk on the street charges in several months. Six men were fined—one of them twice.

The annual Career Day at Willamette High School will be Wednesday, Feb. 13, from 12:15 to 3 p.m.

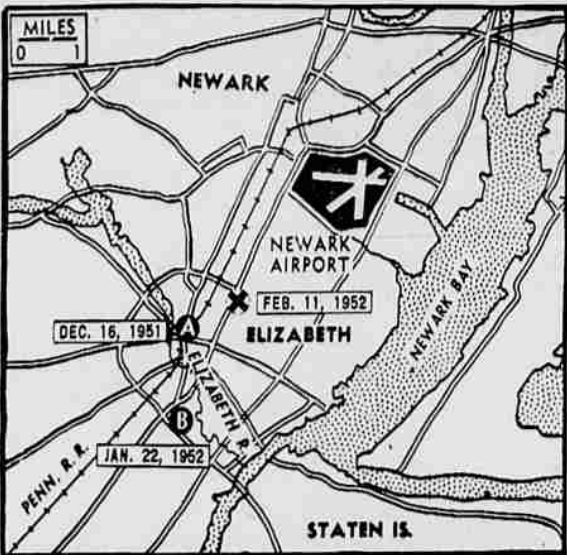

The crash brought Elizabeth's death-from-the-sky toll to 117 since Dec. 16 when a four-engine plane crashed at (A) killing 56 people. On Jan. 22 a twin-engine aircraft killed 30 people when it crashed at point (B).

Yanks Repulse 2 Red Attacks

SEOUL, Korea — (AP) — United Nations soldiers Tuesday killed 96 Reds and wounded 130 in a fight near the Mundung Valley on the East Korean War front—the heaviest single action in weeks.

The casualties were announced in a U.S. Eighth Army communiqué. The communiqué did not say whether the Allies suffered any losses.

ELEMENTS of a group of 420 Communists struck Allied positions near the valley in two places three minutes apart. In less than an hour the Allies had driven back both attacks.

The valley is just west of Heartbreak Ridge, a craggy range of mountains captured by American troops in a month-long fight last fall. West of the valley are other tall, snow-covered mountains.

OTHER RED probing attacks were reported all along the 155-mile front. In one of these, on the Central Front west of the Pukhan River, 12 men of an enemy platoon were killed. In all other probing attacks, the Reds were beaten off or withdrew.

An overcast sky held down fighter bomber attacks in North Korea. A briefing officer said Eighth Army soldiers inflicted 2272 casualties on the Reds in the week ended last Thursday. The figure included 981 killed, 1260 wounded and 31 captured.

LONDON — (AP) — The three-year-old heir to the British throne is learning fast.

Prince Charles was quick to respond Tuesday as a sentry presented arms when the little boy was brought home from his daily romp in a nearby park.

The prince raised his right arm to the brim of his blue hat and smiled.

Pirates Board British Vessel

TAIPEH, Formosa — (UP) — About 70 bare-foot Chinese pirates fired on and boarded a British steamer in Formosa strait Monday night and collected \$4000 ransom.

The 3559-ton King Sang docked at the northern Formosan port of Keelung Tuesday with bullet marks on the starboard side and one sailor wounded. However, the other 120 crew members and 78 passengers were little the worse for their encounter with the pirates.

Capt. Donald Stanton, skipper of the Wing Sang, said he could not determine whether the 120-foot, heavily armed pirate ship was Communist or Nationalist.

Passenger Edward L. Stanbury, new chief of the U.S. information service here, said the pirates at first pretended to be Nationalists but turned out to be pirates who wanted gold.

When told the ship had no gold aboard, they demanded U.S. and Hong Kong dollars and threatened to seize the ship if sufficient ransom were not paid.

Collections were made among passengers and crew members until \$4000 was raised and the pirate ship departed.

Council Refuses to Approve Chamber's Plan

COTTAGE GROVE—A Chamber of Commerce-sponsored proposal for two access roads when Highway 99 is relocated received a cool reception from the council here Monday night.

The chamber in a letter asked the council to pass a resolution endorsing the proposed project, but Monday night councilmen—while not opposing the plan—took no action favoring it.

The highway commission has already outlined a tentative plan for the Cottage Grove area when Highway 99 is relocated just east of the city limits.

THIS PLAN calls for construction of a cloverleaf on East Main St. and a partial cloverleaf at Divide.

But the chamber several months ago went on record opposing this plan and drew up one of its own. A special chamber committee has developed this proposal:

1. Construction of an underpass on East Main St. This would

mean all traffic east of Cottage Grove would come into the city before moving toward points north and south.

2. Construction of an access

road north of the city limits which would link the present highway with the new route.

3. Development of access facilities at Divide for a southern ac-

cess approach as proposed by the highway commission.

Elmer Kent was the only councilman to favor endorsement of the chamber proposal. He made a motion that the council pass a resolution to back the plan, but the motion died for a lack of a second.

Said Councilman Joe Bricher: "I don't feel we should oppose them (chamber) in anyway. They have a right to take their proposal to the highway commission, but I don't favor the plan."

Amil Thies commented he thought it would be wrong to make Row River traffic come to Cottage Grove before going north or south of the city.

THE COUNCIL'S general attitude seemed to be: "We won't offer opposition, but we won't back the plan."

Meanwhile, a special chamber committee is preparing to discuss its proposal with the highway commission shortly. The commit-

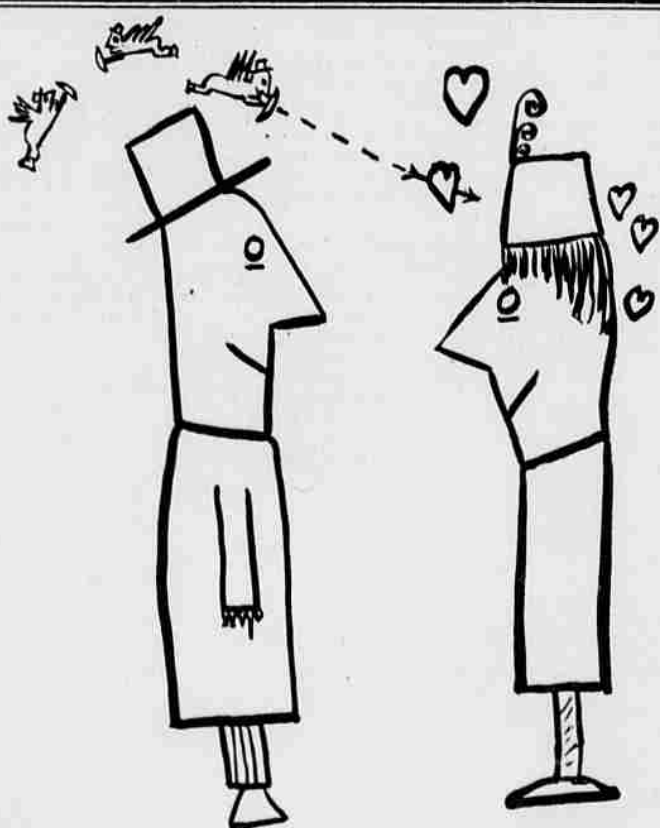
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
