

## Award Slated For 4-H Club

The outstanding 4-H Electricity Club in Lane County will pick up a \$15 cash award next September at the Lane County Fair.

Glen Sawyer, manager of the Lane County Electric Cooperative, announced this week that his organization will give the award as part of a program to encourage the development of electricity clubs.

"Our co-op considers the 4-H electricity project especially worthwhile for rural boys and girls," he declared.

Sawyer said the winning club will be selected on a score card basis which will take into consideration demonstrations, community activities and exhibits.

Individual awards of study lamps will be presented to the top three club members in the blue ribbon group in first and second year 4-H electricity projects. The winners will be chosen through their record books and exhibits.

## Chatt Files As Delegate

John O. Chatt, Eugene Democrat, Tuesday filed for fourth district delegate to the Democratic National Convention in Chicago next July. A Kefauver supporter himself, he asserted he would vote in accordance with the vote of the people of Oregon in the May primary elections.

A delegate to the 1948 Democratic convention, the 27-year-old Democrat, is a former vice-president of the state Young Democratic organization, and in 1948 was treasurer of the Lane County Democratic Central Committee.

A graduate of the University of Oregon and an Air Force veteran of World War II, he is a partner in Lane County Abstract Co. He belongs to the American Legion, Lions International, and the Air Force Reserve. He is a trustee of the First Baptist Church.

Opposing Chatt for the position is Walter Dodd, who is now in Korea with the First Marine Division. Dodd has indicated he expects to be home and out of uniform by the May 16 primary election.

## Sessions Now Have No Limit

SALEM—(AP)—Special sessions of the Oregon legislature have no limits as to their length.

This interesting discovery was made last week by Miss Alene Phillips, secretary to Gov. Douglas McKay. It will give the governor a good argument as to why he shouldn't summon the lawmakers to meet in special session this year to pass a tax bill.

Since Deputy State Treasurer Fred Paulus proposed the special session several days ago, news reporters have been writing that special sessions can last only 20 days. State officials thought there was a 20-day limit, too.

But the alert Miss Phillips discovered that in November, 1950, when the voters changed legislative pay from \$8 a day for the first 50 days of each session to a flat \$600 a year, they also removed the 20-day limit for special sessions.

After Paulus proposed the special session, Gov. McKay said one argument against it would be that lawmakers could consider all kinds of bills during the 20 days. Now that he finds out a special session could go on for a long time, he will be more reluctant to call one.

MANILA—(AP)—The Philippines government Wednesday cancelled its policy of seeking new markets for sugar, and banned exports to all countries except the United States.

## Ants Lined Up For Control

RIVERSIDE, Calif.—(UP)—A 3000-year-old system of insect control is under study here at the University of California experiment station. The system is based on pest-eating ants.

Dr. Stanley E. Flanders is planning tests on rearing of useful ant colonies that can be moved around as apiculturists do bees. The colonies would be turned loose on insect infestations in fruits and grains.

It's not as simple as it sounds, however. The entomologist explained that only some ants have the right habits and it will take a lot of careful study to learn to control them.

The common Argentine ant that plagues California households with its raids on the cake drawer and jelly cupboard won't do.

"Certain ants that are harvesters or protect scale insects and aphids are harmful," Dr. Flanders said. "We want to cultivate only those that eat insects."

"Ants were used by the Chinese for control of citrus bugs and caterpillars," the professor said.

## Cop is Victim Of the Times

ST. LOUIS—(AP)—Chalk up the traffic cop as a victim of this streamlined age.

For, say St. Louis patrolmen, today's traffic officer just doesn't have a satisfactory place to plant his foot while writing a ticket for motorist.

McNamara adds that now with the low-slung cars, the policeman has to bend over so far that a lecture just isn't worth the effort.

COLUMBUS, O.—(AP)—A honey of a family in distant Tasmania is looking around for new uses for the sweet stuff.

Harold R. Beer, who lives on the island off the Southeast Australia coast, raises bees and his family uses about 60 pounds per year for each of its five members. The average American family uses one and two-thirds pounds per person per year.

In order to get further mileage out of their crop, Beer recently wrote the Ohio State University booklet, "Honey and Honey Cookery."
