American Backer Quits in Indonesia

JAKARTA, Indonesia — (P) — Foreign Minister Achmed Soebardjo resigned Thursday under a storm of protest against his endorsement of United States aid under the terms of the Mutual Security Act.

Soebardjo's tentative acceptance of aid for this strategic island republic aroused a wave of opposition last week in his own Moslem Mashumi Party, as well as other political factions, who charged he had steered Indonesia from her declared neutral position into the Western camp.

Texans Accepts WSC Position

Dr. Clement French Is New President

SPOKANE — (P) — Dr. C. Clement French, vice president of Texas A & M Thursday accepted the \$18,000 a year job as president of Washington State College.

French will succeed Dr. Wilson Compton who resigned last spring after disagreements with the Board of Regents.

James McCluskey, chairman of the WSC Regents, announced French's acceptance and said he was selected from a list of more than 230 candidates.

French, 50, holds a Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy degree from the University of Pennsylvania and was a chemistry professor there for eight years.

He was a member of the faculty of Randolph-Macon Women's College in Virginia before becoming vice president of Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1949.

French resigned as vice president of Texas A & M, a post he has held since 1950, to accept the WSC job after a meeting with McCluskey in Chicago last week.

Hit-Run Count Faces Driver

A charge of hit-and-run driving was filed against a 31-year-old Eugene man Thursday night after being implicated in an event of the previous evening by two doctors.

One of the doctors called city police to state that he had seen a pickup truck, operated by Robert J. Timms, 971 W. 11th Ave., side-swipe a 1942 coupe at 17th and Willamette Sts., Wednesday evening.

The doctor said that he and another physician followed the pickup truck to the university district where they stopped Timms and talked to him. One of the doctors then drove Timms home while the other followed in the pickup.

At headquarters Thursday, Timms signed a statement admitting involvement in the hit-and-run accident and stating that he left the scene because he was flustered. He was released on \$200 bail, to appear in municipal court Monday at 1 p. m.

Judge Wants 3 Reindicted

SAN FRANCISCO — (P) — Federal Judge James Alger Fee said Thursday he is going to ask that ousted Collector of Internal Revenue James G. Smyth and three others be reindicted on charges of conspiracy to defraud the government.

"I am going to re-refer this case to a grand jury," the judge told attorneys who were arguing motions to dismiss the indictments now pending against Smyth and his co-defendants.

The judge has not yet dismissed any of the existing indictments, but he indicated that he would. He didn't say when he might do this.

"I am not saying that these indictments don't state a crime in a tumbling sort of way," Judge Fee said. " . . . I am saying that you have not told the defendants with what they are charged."

Tiny Gun Stops Holdup Try

VANCOUVER, Wash. — (P) — Tavern Proprietor Walter Lindstrom put his fountain pen tear gas gun to the test early Thursday and averted a holdup.

He told Sheriff Clarence McKay that he and his wife were leaving their 10-Mile Tavern, east of here on the Evergreen Highway, at 1 p. m.

As they stepped outside, they were confronted by three men. One flashing a gun, said: "This is a stickup." He demanded the tavern receipts Lindstrom was carrying in a cloth bag.

Instead of handing over the money, Lindstrom whipped out the tear gas gun he wore clipped to his coat pocket and fired it into the gunman's face. The three men fled in an automobile, he said.

Ontario Boy Killed By Deer Rifle

ONTARIO, Ore. — (P) — Arthur Richard Colley, 17, of Rt. 2, Ontario, was accidentally shot and killed here Thursday morning by his brother Walter, 16, who was playing with a deer rifle in the kitchen of their home, Malheur County Coroner George Beecher said.

The accident occurred between 8-8:30 a.m. The boy died in an Ontario hospital at 9:30 a.m.

The coroner said Walter told him he did not know the gun was loaded. The second time he pumped the arm, the gun fired a bullet that fatally struck the 17-year-old, he said.

Stockman Asks Approval Of Columbia Dam

WASHINGTON — (P) — Rep. Stockman (R-Ore) has urged a House appropriations subcommittee to approve the \$7½ million dollars budgeted by President Truman for construction of The Dalles Lock and Dam on the Columbia River.

He made public Thursday a statement to the committee in which he asserted the project would help alleviate the Pacific Northwest power shortage and eliminate "numerous handicaps which now retard navigation, including Celloso Falls."
