

Missing Fliers Return to Base

Land Light Plane In Rugged Country

SPOKANE, (P)—Four Air National Guardsmen, missing since Friday on a flight from Spokane to Sacramento, Cal., were safely back at their Geiger Field Base Monday.

Their light plane made a forced landing in rugged mountain country.

None was injured in the landing.

THREE OF THE men trekked 14 miles out of the Siskiyou County mountains to McCloud, Cal., arriving early Sunday. The fourth, who had remained at the plane because of sickness, was rescued later.

The fliers are Harley Pallette, Sacramento, pilot of the plane; Ernest Kidwell, Del Paso Heights, Cal.; Bruce Prinz, Carmichael, Cal.; and James Sims, Fair Oaks, Cal.

Commenting on their experience, Pallette said they had no luck in locating a town Saturday night.

"WE WALKED Sunday and we heard a train and walked in that direction," Kidwell said. "We were all tired and sick."

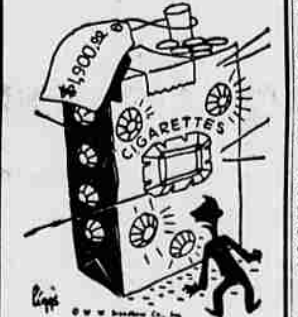
"In about an hour we hit the railroad and decided to follow the tracks down the mountain, rather than up, because it was easier walking that way," he added.

Fighting in Korea Starts 21st Month

SEOUL, Korea — (AP) — The Korean war ground into its 21st month Monday. There was virtually no fighting to mark the date.

Heavy clouds and snow grounded most Allied warplanes. Only a few fighter bombers went out on rail cutting missions. Fifth Air Force planes flew only 180 sorties Monday, far under the daily average.

South Korean and American Mustang pilots and Marine Corsair pilots, cut North Korean rail lines at 13 places.

South African Mustang pilots reported they killed an estimated 75 Reds in an attack on a Communist billeting area.

American Mustang fliers said they destroyed or damaged 31 Communist troop or supply shelters.

Reports from scattered points along the 155-mile front indicated the usual pattern of recent fighting—probes, patrols and a few brief clashes.

FAR EAST AIR forces reported its pilots destroyed about 200 supply trucks in widespread attacks Sunday. That was the highest number in several months.

Other pilots cut Communist rails in 145 places and destroyed 10 gun positions, 35 supply buildings and 30 bunkers.

For the first time in eight days there were no air battles between Communist and Allied jets Sunday.

Eight B-29 superforts dropped 80 tons of bombs on the Chongju rail bridge Sunday night.

Carrier based Marine planes from the USS Bairoko made saturation assaults on Red supply buildings and rail lines near Chinnampo on Korea's west coast. Other Marine aircraft hammered targets on the east coast.

THE BATTLESHIP USS Wisconsin returned to the Kongsong-Kosong area of Northeast Korea and laid 16-inch shells on Red troop installations.

Other Allied warships ranged the west coast in attacks on Communist positions.

A delayed naval report identified three Allied ships which helped drive back a Red attack on Yang Island Wednesday.

The Navy said the destroyer USS Shelton, the minesweeper USS Endicott and the New Zealand patrol frigate Taupo sank 15 sampans, damaged numerous others and wounded an estimated 70 per cent of the retreating Reds.

Morris to Seek Income Reports

**Government Officials
To Get Questionnaires**

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The administration's cleanup chief, Newbold Morris, said Monday he is planning to ask officials throughout the federal service for full details of their private income sources.

Morris said a questionnaire, now about complete, is expected to be in the hands of the Government Printing Office by the end of this week and will be distributed to government officials as soon as it is printed.

THIS WILL BE the first step in Morris' search for any official misconduct in the government—an inquiry ordered by President Truman in the wake of Congressional disclosures of tax collection scandals and other irregularities.

Morris, a New York Republican, was appointed a special assistant to Atty. Gen. McGrath to undertake the task.

A Congressional inquiry into McGrath's own income sources was demanded last week by Harold E. Stassen, candidate for the Republican presidential nomination, who said he had heard the attorney general himself became a millionaire after taking public office.

McGrath issued a statement thanking Stassen for the compliment but declining further comment.

Morris told reporters his survey of "outside" income is not intended for rank and file government workers but is aimed at upper level officials.

A LIST OF THOSE to be questioned is being worked out with the Civil Service Commission. Chairman McCarran (D-Nev.) said meanwhile he wants his Senate Judiciary Committee to post-pone action on the President's "unparalleled request for revolutionary powers," as McCarran put it, for Morris.

Morris said his questionnaire would require officials to list all income received in addition to their government salaries, with a detailed explanation of any services performed to earn such income.

President Truman already has directed everybody on the federal payroll to give Morris any information he asks.

Morris said answers given on the questionnaire will be kept confidential unless they disclose irregularities calling for prosecution or other government action.

Kansas Pancake Racers Hold Final Practice Run

LIBERAL, Kan. — (AP) — This southwestern Kansas town's pancake racers were confident Monday of victory in their international competition with the housewives of Olney, England, Tuesday.

Despite 30-degree weather, 28 women went through their last practice Sunday over the 415-yard "S"-shaped course, each holding a skillet containing one pancake.

A group of men from the Junior Chamber of Commerce sports committee, who have served as trainers, said a new record was likely to replace the one minute, 12 seconds mark an Olney woman won with last year.

One Liberal housewife scooted over the track in less than one minute and two others ran it in 1.5.

Several of the runners wore jackets over their gingham house dresses and aprons, traditional attire at Olney since the Shrove Tuesday pancake race was begun five centuries ago.

The Liberal-Olney series was started in 1950 and the English won the title that year and in 1951.

A steady snowfall has made the Liberal track wet and slippery, but local experts predict a dry, fast "track" for the big event Tuesday.

Gov. Edward F. Arn and Lt. Gov. Fred Hall will be in Liberal for the race and related activities, including five-state beauty contests and the feeding of pancakes to 25,000 persons.

The governor will bestow the traditional "iss of peace" on the pancake race winner.

Fire Damages Two Buildings

SHERWOOD, Ore. — (AP) — Fire broke out in an unused attic space above the UDL grocery and market here about 11 p.m. Sunday and for a time threatened three buildings, including the postoffice.

Fire and water damage was heavy, but the buildings were saved.

The blaze was in the same block as that in which there was a costly fire some two years ago.

Sunday's fire, however, was checked more quickly as the Sherwood and Tualatin rural fire department poured big quantities of water on it.

There was some damage at the Wink hardware store, mostly from water, but the major loss was held to the market, known as Jones Market. Much of the stock was believed to have been ruined.

Cause of the fire was not immediately determined.

There was no loss estimate.
