

Credit Losses Topic of Talk NOMA Speaker Describes System

much credit losses—bad mean to business and can be done about them explained to members of the National Office Management Association, at a Lane County chapter, at a meeting in the Osburn Hotel Tuesday night.

Speaker was George Davis, manager of the American Credit Indemnity Assn. His address was the outstanding accounts of manufacturing and retail houses.

Davis divided credit losses into two categories, primary losses, which are losses by unreasonably tightening its credit policy. Different kinds of business have certain policies which they follow, and it is up to credit managers to follow these ideal levels, Davis said.

One of the tips he gave his audience on how to escape some of the losses from bad debts included:

1. Avoid the hazard of familiarity with those to whom you are extending credit.

2. Credit policy so that year by year will be as constant as possible.

3. A BETTER job of collection and insolvent accounts.

Speaker Asks Understanding of Northwest

Professor Ed Bingham of the University of Oregon said he had developed a great enthusiasm for the subject after coming here as a speaker on the history of the Northwest. The whole field of history has not been much explored by writers he said.

Bingham said he is trying to bring to the attention of the entire Northwest area Thursday night at the University of Oregon a microcosm (a reproduction of the entire universe or a miniature) or a section of it is unique. He finds arguments for both theories.

Bingham concluded with a suggestion that Northwest residents should acquire a better understanding of background of the area. He recommended travel to the collection of a Northwest history for this.

Bingham suggests for the Northwest shelf are: the works of Lewis and Clark, the works of Fuller Victor, who used the name "Bancroft" and is a "major historian" of the area; the "Big Sky" and "The West" by the late late Randall; books on transportation; H. Davis' "Honey in the Horn"; and "Nard Jones" "Swift Flows the River".

Court Suspends Youth's Penalty

Vacation's Mishaps
Caused Trouble

Ernest Gerard Rheault, 17, Portland, was granted a suspended sentence Thursday in Circuit Court after pleading guilty to grand larceny of an automobile.

His application for probation told a tangled tale of a vacation trip to Los Angeles. He set out for California in a car he still owed \$200 on. It broke down in California and he abandoned it, lacking the money for repairs.

Informed that this violated his sales contract, he retrieved it, only to break down in Klamath Falls. He stored the car there and took a bus to Oakridge, arriving there with ten cents in his pocket. It was here that he "borrowed" a car, after trying vainly to hitchhike in a snow storm.

He told the court he intended to abandon the car in Portland, but couldn't as he was arrested in Salem.

He served five months in the Woodburn reformatory in 1949 for petty theft, his record shows.

In granting the suspended sentence, Judge G. F. Skipworth, cautioned the lad that if he were placed on probation he would be unable to join the Army. "You would be an outcast," he said.

"This ought to be a lesson to you, young man," Skipworth continued. "You don't want to be a criminal do you? If you're sent to the penitentiary it would ruin your life. Now the decision rests with you, no judge can ever do this for you again."

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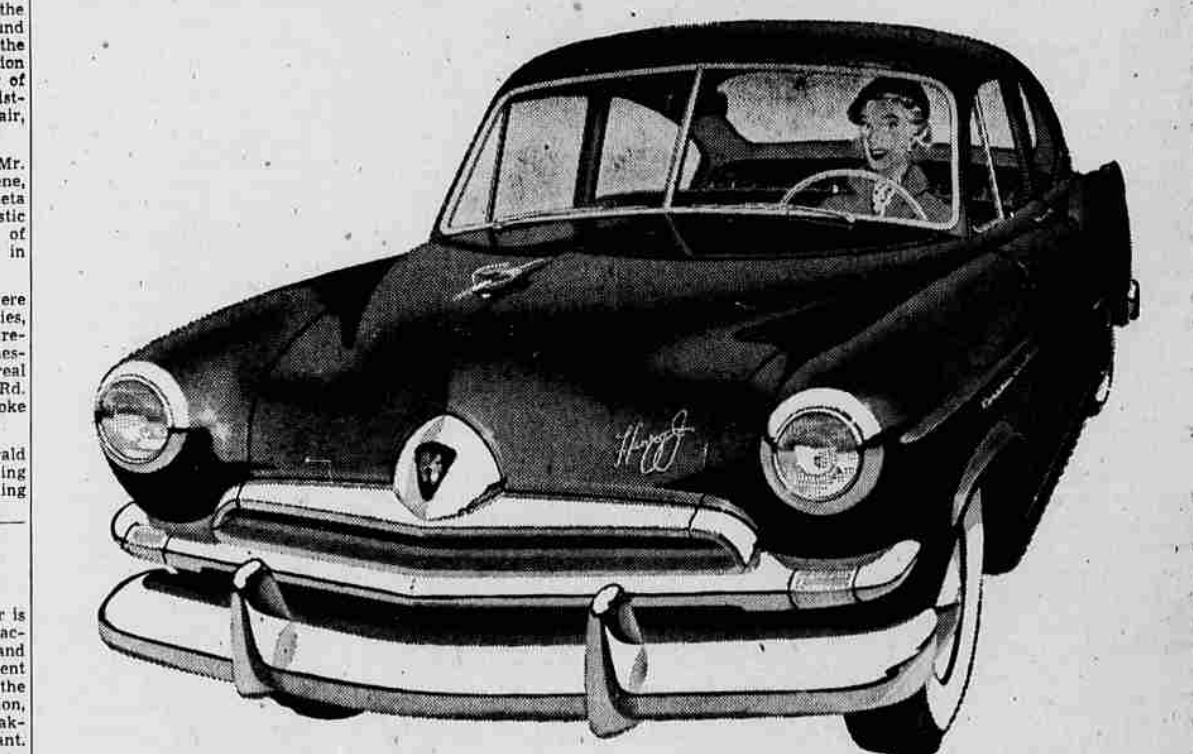


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
