Translated into terms of the B state tournament, the victories mean Lane County is sure to have a team—Mapleton or Coburg—in Salem March 13-15.

FISH TALES BY DICK STRITE

★ The rash of sturgeon fishing makes the sailfish and salmon anglers look like pikers—but we're wondering if some of our local fishermen haven't missed a bet? The eggs or roe of the sturgeon provide the raw material for caviar, which, when properly prepared by a simple process, can be marketed at \$3 per pound jar. . . . The sturgeon steaks, which reputedly taste like chicken at its best, sell at something like 80 cents per pound. . . .

There is one stumbling block, the sports anglers cannot market their fish, but all of the neighbors will be able to live like kings for a while. . . . A couple of Springfield fishermen, Perry Wimmer and Earl Brooks, fishing the Columbia near Hood River (Lindsey Creek), brought home a 120-pounder after an exciting battle. The successful angler was Wimmer and the boatman was Otis Lape of Hood River.

Last Sunday, with the same boatman, Don Cook and Brooks bagged six sturgeon at the mouth of Prosperity Creek and Brooks caught one that weighed an approximate 140 pounds and was about six feet in length. . . . The fish and Cook are shown here with the mammoth long-nosed sturgeon. . . . The smallest of the five was 36 inches—just right for good eating. . . . The anglers used salmon tackle with a 102-pound test line and fresh smelt for bait. . . . Cook admitted he lost three outfits on the "light" tackle. . . . There was also a rumor that a much larger fish had been caught, but not quite as large as the 600-pounder blasted out of the Columbia near The Dalles earlier in the week. . . .

In case you, too, get the bug, here are the sturgeon fishing regulations: Open season, entire year except the Umpqua and tributaries. Bag limit: 5 sturgeon from 30 to 72 inches in length (notice you are not permitted to take the granddads and grandmas), of which not more than three may be under 48 inches.

★ Bob Dethman, former OSC Athlete might well have won the Corvallis steelhead derby, had he weighed in the fish the day he made the catch. . . . The winner was an 18-pounder and Dethman's fish, after allowing it to waste away all night, weighed in at 17 pounds, 14 ounces. . . . Both fish were taken on the Siletz.

Joe Richards is scheduled to fish off the coast of Florida during most of the month of March. . . . A Florida friend, with a large and well-appointed yacht, invited Joe to make the angling bait and he accepted—but fast. . . . Joe's ambition is to catch a bonefish on light tackle, a fish that is comparable to a steelhead in size and fight. . . . Just for the record—the world's mark is 14 pounds, 38 inches, caught by C. M. Cook III, November 30, 1948, off West Molokai, T. H.

Bob Adair, whose picture appeared in this column a year or so ago with a sailfish, has recently returned from an angling trip to the Islands, but he didn't catch a record bonefish. . . . He did catch with his bare hands (he has a picture to prove it) a halibut—no record world record list. As Adair describes the fish: "It had thorny fins fore and aft and razor-sharp teeth."

★ Gene Pitchford wanted to make certain he won the final Indiana steelhead derby, so Monday he racked up one that weighed 15 pounds, 1 ounce to top the 13-6 fish posted by Tom Caswell of Albany. Pitch is still in third place, too, with a 10-pound, 12-ounce steelie. . . .

Camp Indiana reports the water in fine shape and Wednesday there were lots of fish taken, about 50 percent bright fish. . . . The derby continues the remainder of the season—through March 16.

Christiansen, Junction Share District Honors

Willamette's Gunnar Christiansen and Junction City shared individual and team honors in complete District 6 scoring statistics.

Christiansen was the highest scorer in the district with 349 points in 20 games; had the highest per-game average of 17.5; and had the highest single performance of 35 points in a contest with Elmira.

Junction City sported the best regular season record of 18 wins against three defeats, and had the best offensive mark, averaging 55.7 points per game. Cottage Grove boasted the best defensive record, allowing the opponents only 40.7 points per contest.

TWO OTHER district players ran up a 300-point total for the season with Junction's Bruce Paulson tallying 307 and Oakridge's Allie Clark collecting 305. Paulson and University's Al Grubrud sported the second-best averages of 14.6. Grubrud tallied 282 points but played in only 18 games. Clark had a 13.9 average.

Other leading district scorers and their averages: Fred Richter, Oakridge, 295 and 14.0; Wes Malcolm, Cottage Grove, 294 and 13.4; Floyd Burrig, Springfield, 257 and 12.7; Bill Pakulak, Springfield, 254 and 11.5; Jerry Messler, Eugene, 233 and 12.0; Loring Dixon, Junction City, 230 and 11.9; Jim Forcia, Elmira, 219 and 12.4; Ed Bartholomew, St. Francis, 230 and 11.0; and Jay Isley, Cottage Grove, 208 and 10.4.
