Family Doctor Is on Way Back

The old-fashioned family doctor, that storehouse of medical knowledge and possessor of every needed medical skill, is making a comeback after his temporary disappearance in a floodtide of specialization. For the past five years the proportion of medical students planning to become general practitioners has increased steadily, according to an article in a current monthly publication.

The day of the old-time general practitioner is back, but the new-style family doctors are better equipped than ever before to accept total responsibility for diagnosing and treating the whole patient as well as giving them psycho-biological counsel. This will be good news, says the magazine, to people who have felt for many years they were being led through a veritable forest of medical "isms" — gynecologists, dermatologists, gastroenterologists and all the others.

At Duke University Medical School, for example, an exchange program for medical students and country doctors has been inaugurated. Its purpose: to help improve rural health by encouraging more medical school graduates to enter general practice. It permits Duke medical students to take a minimum of two weeks "time-out" to serve a tour of duty with a small-town doctor.

But this sudden regeneration of the general physician is by no means a one-night stand on the

tank-town circuit, the article states. People in rural areas are not alone, in these jittery days, in their need and desire for understanding, interest and affection from their doctor. In the cities too the general physician, long in obsecure during a period of intense specialization, is again becoming the family medical prop and indispensable friend.

"No matter what the discoveries of science hold for them," concludes the article, "people know now they can not do without afterfection, kindness and recognition of their essential human dignity—emotional factors supplied by a family doctor. Bless him, and all the rest like him. May they never disappear again."

Two Women Proud to Serve In Tuberculosis Experiment

Mrs. Edith Helen Johnson and Mrs. Hilda Carrion are "human guinea pigs" in the tuberculosis ward of Sea View hospital in New York. They are two of the first five human beings ever to receive the new anti-tuberculosis drugs, marsilid and rimfon.

The five, two women and three men, received the drug at about the same time last June 19. Throughout the men's and women's wards there is friendly rivalry over which patient actually was the first to take the new drugs. Doctors insist that there is no one individual who can claim that distinction.

Only a few months ago, they were on the record books as "hopeless cases." Today, many of them are classified as "clinically well."

All of that first group are alive today. Some have become negative cases and have been given "passes" to leave the hospital for short periods of time. While a few may be discharged soon, they will continue under observation for several years.

Each woman likes to be called by her first name. So we'll do that.

We sat beside Edith's bed. She looked the picture of health. She is 23 and came to the hospital in February, 1950. Then she weighed 98 pounds. Today, she weighs 174 and is thinking about going on a reducing diet.

Edith said she was proud to have volunteered to be a "human guinea pig." She said she had a sore arm for several days after receiving the first dose of marsilid. At that time, it was given by injection. Now she takes six tablets each day.

The doctors said she had large involvement in both her lungs. She may still have to undergo surgery, but the doctors say her downhill course definitely has stopped. She has negative sputum.

Her companion, Hilda, is a smaller woman. Only four feet nine inches tall, she weighed less than 100 pounds. Now she is 120. Hilda, 20, has a young son. She said she had been "in and out" of the hospital since she was two years old. She already has had surgery and she was one of the most desperate cases. The drugs reversed her downhill course. She,
