

Northern Division
LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Washington Huskies, runner-up for the Pacific Coast Conference basketball championship, led the assault on Northern Division records in the season just closed.
Quarterback Thursday night in the quarterfinal game, Bob Houbregts, the leading scorer and top passer.
Houbregts missed three games because of injuries but scored 251 points in his 13 contests for the Huskies. It topped the old record mark of 19.0 points a game set by Jack Nichols, Washington, in 1948.
Washington's total points, 1,030, topped the division mark of 968 in 1947 by Oregon State and by Washington last year.
Washington's 370 field goals exceeded the 365 registered by the Huskies.
Oregon State was charged with 10 personal fouls. It exceeded the limit of 367 set by Oregon State in 1950.
Washington's 275 was the fewest personal fouls on record, being under the 300 for Oregon State in 1948.

Southern Division
LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Three records on offense were written into the books by title-winning UCLA and runner-up Stanford in the Southern Division basketball campaign of the Pacific Coast Conference.
Both broke the 12-game record of 744 points scored last year by UCLA, with Stanford on top with 793, and UCLA next at 788. UCLA scored 294 field goals, surpassing its mark of 277 set in 1947.
Stanford registered a new scoring record, hitting 285 out of 758 floor shots for 37.6 per cent. It broke the old mark of 35.8 per cent set by Southern California last year.
Ed Tucker of Stanford was the division's leading scorer, with 184 for a 15.3 game average.
UCLA, winner of the division title four straight years and newly crowned champions of the entire conference after defeating Washington in a three-game series, continued to rest Wednesday.
Coach Johnny Wooden plans to bring the Bruins back for practice Thursday, preparing for the regional NCAA tournament at Corvallis, Ore., March 21-22.

Hunt Receives UO Cage Award
Ken Hunt, 22-year-old senior from Marshfield (Coo's Bay) High, won the second annual Bill Baker Campus Shop basketball award during a small squad banquet at Club Crosstown Wednesday night.
Jack Keller was last year's winner.
The award is made to the senior member of the Oregon squad voted by his teammates as the most outstanding player. Other candidates this year were Mel Streeter and Jim Vranizan.
Bill Baker of the Campus Shop made the presentation, a suitably engraved wristwatch.
Hunt played four seasons for the Webfoots after starring for Coach Bill Borchert on the state championship Marshfield high quintet in 1947. He was rated all-Northern Division guard on virtually every selection during the past season when he became the second highest Oregon scorer in Northern Division play, second only to Roger Wiley. He tallied 218 points in the 16-game campaign and 363 for the season, bringing his three-year total to 305 in the division and 558 for all games.
Captain of the team this year, Hunt was a fine defensive man and playmaker, the top man in assists for the PCC. He is a six-footer, weighing 163 pounds.
Borchert and Athletic Director Leo Harris also spoke briefly. Art Litchman was master of ceremonies.

Pilots, Whitworth Win NAIB Games
KANSAS CITY — (AP) — Whitworth College and Portland University, and Pacific Northwest's two entries in the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball tournament, fought their way into the third round Wednesday with high scoring victories.
Whitworth, of Spokane, Wash., narrowly got by Millikin, of Decatur, Ill., 72-71, while Portland gave Memphis State a 72-48 pasting. They join six other of the nation's best small college teams in the round-of-eight.
Portland University has drawn the stiffest assignment in the tournament—trying to stop three-time champion Hamline, rated with Southwest Texas State as the best bet to reach the finals.
