Fortnighters Hear Disraeli Described in Book Review

Eugene Fortnightly Club observed its annual spring social meeting with a program and tea in the Wheeler Room of the Congregational Church Thursday afternoon, March 20.

Mrs. J. P. MacKinnon reviewed "Disraeli," a biography of the dramatic Victorian statesman, author and wit, Benjamin Disraeli, by Hesketh Pearson. Mr. Pearson followed the stage as a career in his earlier years and that experience, the reviewer said, doubtless enabled him to portray with such color the dual personality of Disraeli as romanticist and practical politician.

Disraeli's romanticism found outlet in his early published novels which were obviously sympathetic, and it was his love of drama and pageantry that enabled him to command and hold the attention of his contemporaries until he at last achieved his desired pinnacle of fame. Following his election to Parliament after several reverses, his maiden speech was greeted with ridicule, jeers and noisy uproar but he continued with unflinching persistence until the end of his life, when he sat down only until the hub-bub ceased and then arose to declare, "I sit down now, but the time will come when you will hear me," a prophecy that was fulfilled in after years, when he held the rapt attention of audiences.
