

11 Bodies Taken From Wreckage

Two Warplanes Crash in Japan

TOKYO—(AP)—The bodies of 11 crewmen have been recovered from the wreckage of two American warplanes that crashed Monday, the Far East Air Force announced Tuesday.

Another crew member of one of the planes is presumed dead.

Nine bodies were taken from the B-29 Superfort which plunged to the ground 40 miles northeast of Tokyo in a violent rain storm Monday night. The Superfort was enroute to North Korea with a full load of bombs.

There were two survivors. Both were thrown clear when the plane hit. The Air Force said neither was seriously injured.

The Air Force also located the bodies of two crew members of a B-29 light bomber which dived into the sea off the southeast tip of Hokkaido, Japan's northernmost island.

The plane was on a routine observation flight.

Arm Badly Sprained

James J. Arnold, Springfield Police officer, received a badly sprained arm in a scuffle early Sunday morning that led to arrest of three persons. X-rays showed Monday that his injury was not as serious as previously believed. It was thought he may have received a broken arm during an attempt to arrest Robert P. Winnop, Winnop's wife, Constance, both of Springfield, and Bruce Lee Byerlin of Junction City. The men were charged with being drunk on a street and Mrs. Winnop was charged with interfering with a police officer.

Springfield Council Awards Six Paving Contracts Worth \$60,201

The Springfield City Council Monday night let bids on the first group of paving jobs which are to be completed this season and conducted hearings which paved the way for another large group of jobs on which contracts will be let April 21.

Bulk of the \$60,201.80 worth of street paving jobs went to the Acme Construction Co. of Eugene. It was low bidder on the paving of 8th from North A to North G, \$1,191.40; 9th from A to C, \$6,391.90; D from 5th to 8th, \$3,413.90; D from 10th to 14th, \$2,519.35; and 6th from E to G, \$6,762.65.

CENTRAL HEATING Co. was low on the only other street job with a bid of \$3,922.60 for paving C from 6th to 7th.

All the streets will be 36 feet wide. Cost per front foot on the projects ranged from \$5.24 on D from 10th to 14th to \$5.62 on 9th from A to C.

Also let were contracts on the following storm sewers:

Eighth St. from A to D, Fred Stubbert, \$2,033.25; 9th from A to D, William Stoneburner, \$2,922; 6th from C to D, Stoneburner, \$738.75; 8th from D to G, Stoneburner, \$2,430.

The council adopted ordinances for the following paving jobs and called for bids on them to be submitted by 2 p.m. April 21:

I St. from Molawke Blvd. to 19th, No. A from 22nd to 23rd with a sidewalk on north side of No. A; 25th from A to D with sidewalks; 24th from A to D, 23rd from Main to D, D from 22nd to 28th, E from 21st to 26th, and 26th from Main to E.

ANOTHER ordinance authorized a sanitary sewer for M and N

streets from 12th to 13th. Bids are due April 21 on this also.

A hearing on the proposed paving of M St. from 8th to 13th produced a controversy which lasted for more than an hour. Opponents and proponents of the paving overflowed the Council chambers and some 20 of them stated their views.

Supporters of the paving proposals claimed that the first petition they had submitted to have the work done had been signed by the required 51 per cent of the property owners on the street. Their opponents, however, claimed 60 per cent of the property owners had signed a remonstrance against the paving. It was stated that a few persons had changed sides in the fight but it was also plain that nobody knew just how many property owners were involved.

CITY ATTORNEY Robert Carmichael explained that a "property owner" is a person with a deed to property or who is buying a piece of property on contract. If married, his wife is also a property owner, he said. The matter was finally tabled until a new petition is circulated to determine just who is for and who is against the paving.

The Council accepted and sent to the city engineer petitions for the paving of So. D from 2nd to 4th and 19th from Main to E. A petition to pave 6th from E to G 40 feet wide instead of the originally planned 36 was denied.

An agreement which will straighten out a difficulty caused when the city last summer paved 125 feet of G St. near 12th without having a right of way from the property owners was authorized.

Carmichael explained that under the agreement, Clifford and Vernon Landon, owners of the property, would grant an easement to the city and the city would drop its assessment against them. The assessment, for \$604.96, would be paid by the Willamalane Park board, which, according to Carmichael, had agreed to obtain the right of way over the property before the paving took place.

CITY MANAGER L. B. Bartlett read for the first time a proposed ordinance designed to ease the city's brush-cutting problem. If adopted, it would make property owners responsible for cutting the grass or brush on their property and on adjoining streets and alleys which would otherwise be done by the city. The property owners would be able to pay the city to do the work if they chose. If they

did neither, they could be fined from \$10 to \$50.

Other business enacted during the session included:

Authorization for fire hydrants to be installed at 19th and Main, 12th and M, 14th and M, and 28th at the airport.

Calling of bids on four lots of city-owned land near 12th and K.

Granting of a mason's license to Marion Tedro.

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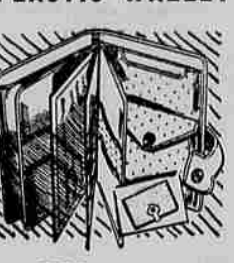
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
