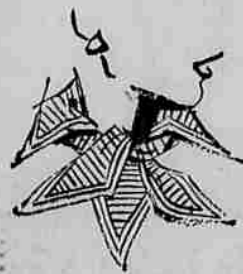

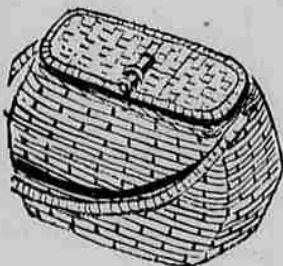

40 Red Planes Downed or Hit In Three Days

Ninth U. S. Jet Ace
Bags Enemy MIG

SEOUL, Korea — (AP) — American Sabre pilots destroyed or damaged eight Communist jets Thursday running their box score to 40 for the first three days of April.

The jets clashed in three battles over Northwest Korea, including history's longest jet fight. It lasted 45 minutes.

Eighteen F-86 Sabre jets tangled with 60 Russian type jets in that battle, fought as the sun was setting.

The April mark is already more than a third of the total for the full month of March.

APRIL ALLIED losses have not been announced. They are reported weekly.

A new jet ace, America's ninth, came out of the actions. He is Capt. Robert H. Moore of Houston, Tex. He shot down his fifth MIG-15 on his 26th flight over Korea.

The seldom-seen "Type 15" Communist jet showed up in Mig Alley Thursday. The U.S. Fifth Air Force said one was probably destroyed and another damaged.

THE HIGH-WINGED "Type 15s" were flying with the faster, low wing MIG 15s. American air officers said the "Type 15s" apparently were designed as fighter-bombers rather than interceptors. Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, top U.S. commander, spent two hours watching the Sabres and Australian Meteor jets taking off from their Korean bases.

Fifth Air Force fighter-bombers were out in record force Wednesday. Pilots flew 1,048 sorties, the highest number yet. They cut Red rail lines in a record 211 places.

GROUND ACTION Wednesday was highlighted by a heavy Communist artillery barrage, mostly on the Western front. An Eighth Army briefing officer said the Reds fired 4,693 rounds.

The Reds probed lightly at six points. At the eastern end of the battle line the American Cruiser Rochester and the Cruiser Gurke fired more than 350 shells at Communist targets.

License Violation Charged to Driver

Top U.N. Brass Holds Meeting Amid Rumors

MUNSAN, Korea — (AP) — Rumors of a possible break in the prisoner exchange deadlock cropped up Thursday when top Allied brass arrived shortly after U.N. truce negotiators postponed secret prisoner parleys.

An Allied spokesman said the prisoner talks were postponed 24 hours for "constructive purposes."

THERE WAS no announcement as to why Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, top Allied commander; Gen. James A. Van Fleet, Eighth Army Commander, and other generals flew here for conferences with the U.N. armistice delegation. An official spokesman said it was not "a foregone conclusion" that an important development was imminent.

He did not deny, however, that there was such a possibility. Observers said it might be significant that the list of top level officers included Van Fleet and Brig. Gen. Francis Dodd, commander of the Koje Island Prison camp, scene of two bloody riots in the past two months.

The Eighth Army would handle the actual exchange of prisoners.

THE JOINT subcommittee of top level negotiators met for the first time in two months Thursday for its first attempt to break the deadlock over whether Russia qualifies as a neutral nation to help inspect a Korean truce.

"We had a meeting in which nothing new happened," said Maj. Gen. William K. Harrison. Postponement of the secret prisoner exchange talks stirred immediate speculation that a new move to end the deadlock may be in the offing.

Anti-Reds Sentenced

BERLIN — (AP) — Five members of an anti-Communist underground, arrested in the Russian sector of Berlin 14 months ago, were sentenced Thursday to serve a total of 32 years at hard labor as "enemies" of the Red state.

Magazine Revives Controversy

Flying Saucers Again

NEW YORK — (AP) — The United States Air Force was reported by Life Magazine Thursday to be taking a new, serious interest in "flying saucers."

"The Air Force is now ready to concede that many saucer and fireball sightings still defy explanation," Life said in an 11-page article entitled, "Have We Visitors From Space?"

IT SAID the Air Force now maintains constant intelligence investigation of unidentified aerial objects and "military aircraft are alerted to attempt interception."

The magazine declared that his represented a sharp change in a previous Air Force policy of "official calm" concerning the eerie sky phenomena.

Life said its own investigation indicated that solid objects have

existed, and may still exist, in the earth's atmosphere and that they are not of American or Russian origin, nor made by a man.

It said it was "plausible" that they originated beyond the earth, possibly on other planets, and that the answer to the mystery "may come in a generation—or tomorrow."

"Somewhere in the dark skies there may be those who know," said Life.

RECOGNIZED scientists have seen the objects and given credence to them, the magazine said.

It printed three photographs of strange lights flying in a "V" formation like a flock of geese near Lubbock, Tex. The pictures were taken on Aug. 30, 1951 by Carl Hart Jr., 18 years old.

Life said "the Air Force, after the closest examination, has found

nothing fraudulent about Hart's pictures."

The magazine said that out of its "exhaustive inquiry these propositions seem firmly shaped by the evidence:

• Discs, cylinders and similar objects of geometrical form, luminous quality and solid nature for several years have been, and may be now, actually present in the atmosphere of the earth.

• Globes of green fire also, of a brightness more intense than the full moon's, have frequently passed through the skies.

• These objects cannot be explained by present science as natural phenomena—but solely as artificial devices, created and operated by a high intelligence.

• Finally, no power plant known or projected on earth could account for the performance of these devices."
