Officer Denies Extra Charges In Army Housing Construction

CASABLANCA—(P)—Lt. Col. Leonard L. Haseman denied Saturday he and his wife were responsible for an extra million dollars being added to the cost of housing at a U. S. air base under construction here in French Morocco.

Colonel Haseman is a U. S. Army engineer recently relieved of his post here by Secretary of the Army Face in a shakeup following hot congressional criticism of the government's North African air base projects.

Charges were made Monday in the U. S. Senate preparedness subcommittee that Haseman's wife, Violet, known as the "Colonel's Lady," halted a crew of workmen putting up houses at nearby Nouasseur Air Base and arranged for them to start over again to provide more space between her government-built house and others going up nearby.

THE SUBCOMMITTEE was told Mrs. Haseman complained that 65 feet was too close and "the plans were redrafted at her insistence" for 120-foot lots, causing additional expenses which "may range from several hundred thousand dollars to more than a million dollars."

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CAA Counts 145 Aircraft

Lane County now has 145 civil aircraft based at its various airports—more than any other county in the state except Multnomah which has 391.

Although only 95 of the Lane County planes are considered in "active" use, the Civil Aeronautics Administration reports that no other Oregon county outside Multnomah has more craft in use.

Multnomah has a total of 391 civil (privately owned) planes, with 248 in active service. Lane County ranks third in the state, behind Lane, with 124 craft and 87 in active use. Marion County has 124 civil craft, but only 77 are listed as "active."

Altogether, Oregon's civil aircraft total is 1747 planes, 1115 of them in regular use. By way of comparison are these totals: Washington, 2173 planes, 1400 active; Idaho, 805 planes, 608 active; Montana, 1111 planes, 793 active; California, 9,845 planes, 5,811 active.

In the entire U. S., the Civil Aeronautics Administration has counted 87,128 civil planes of which 53,285 are in active use. Hawaii has 218 craft, 90 active; Alaska, 1057, with 801 active.
