OMS Granted Fare Increase

SALEM — (U.P.) — State Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Heltzel late Monday granted Oregon Motor Stages authority to increase their fares between all points on their line generally 10 per cent.

Oregon Motor Stages filed a petition for the increase last Feb. 4. A hearing was held in Portland March 7, and Heltzel said no opposition to the increase was voiced.

The commissioner said exhibits showed the company had been operating at a net operating loss for several years.

Increase of fares was authorized in these jumps: 70 cents and under, 5 cents; 75 cents to \$1.20, 10 cents; \$1.25 to \$1.70, 15 cents; \$1.75 to \$2.20, 20 cents; \$2.25 to \$2.70, 25 cents; \$2.75 to \$3.20, 30 cents; \$3.25 to \$3.70, 35 cents; \$3.75 to \$4.20, 40 cents; \$4.25 to \$4.70, 45 cents; \$4.75 to \$5.20, 50 cents; \$5.25 to \$5.60, 55 cents.

Children's one-way minimum fare will be 15 cents. Round trip fares will be based on 180 per cent of the adult fare.

Elmira High Is Host To School Bands-Choruses

ELMIRA — Elmira Union High School will be host to over 800 high school musicians Saturday, April 19, for the Western District C Music Contest. To date 15 bands and seven choruses have enrolled, representing high schools with up to 250 students in Marion, Polk, Linn, Lane, Benton counties and parts of Lincoln and Douglas counties.

The bands will play in the EUHS gymnasium starting at 9 a.m. and continuing until 5:30 p.m., each organization being assigned a 30 minute period. The choruses will perform at the Veneta Grade School gymnasium at 20 minute intervals starting at 9:30 a.m. and continuing till noon.

Judges for the band competition will be Johnny Richards, Lewis and Clark College; George Boughton, University of Oregon; and Richard Greenfield, Pacific University. The three chorus judges are Donald Allton, University of Oregon; Eleanor Tipton, Clark College; and Donald Sites, Oregon State College.

Bands listed and their memberships are: Eddyville, 26; Stayton, 40; McKenzie River, 40; Elmira, 60; Drain, 30; Oakridge, 60; Newport, 35; Jefferson, 24; North Marion, 45; Seio, 35; Waldport, 35; Siuslaw, 45; Lowell, Siletz and Toledo. Mixed choruses are from Waldport, North Marion, Lowell, and Seio. Girls choruses are from Elmira, Siuslaw and Toledo.

In addition to local cafes, the problem of feeding the 800 students will be handled by advance ticket sales as far as possible. Organizations handling this are the FHA Club at the high school, noon luncheon for directors and judges; Veneta Parent-Teacher Ass'n and Elmira Grange, noon luncheon for students. The facilities of the Elmira Grade School will also be used in order to accommodate the band contest.

The public is invited to attend the contest and there is to be no admission charge. Space for audience will be provided at both gyms.

MOSCOW, Ida. — (U.P.) — Dr. Max Saville of the University of Washington told the Borah Peace Conference Tuesday "the time is past when one country can settle any significant problem without consulting any other countries involved."

Dr. Saville, rated as one of the nation's top diplomatic historians, told educators from 12 universities and colleges in four Northwest states "it is no longer possible to get away with the pre-1914 variety of deeply secret diplomacy."

Others to speak before the educators from Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana included Dr. Gordon A. Sabine, University of Oregon; Dr. Frederick A. Peters, Reed College; Ralph M. Hagan, associate director of the Gallup poll, and Dr. Erwin Moore of the University of Idaho.
