as opposing the county manager system as proposed here and in Clackamas County or any system "which would eliminate the two-party system of government."

BOEHKE ALSO spoke of a Republican meeting at Florence this week at which Oregon Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry "forcefully stated his position against the plan."

A map showing the proposed districting of the county as set forth in the county manager plan was displayed to the group. Three of the districts are composed of Eugene and Springfield. Three others border on the immediate locality. Reid observed that the "outside people would still be out-voted" under such a system.

Discussing what should be done by way of fighting the plan, Reid said that much would depend on how vigorous a campaign is conducted by the plan's proponents.

I BELIEVE that if it were to go to a vote at the present time it would be defeated by a tremendous majority," he said. Treasurer McCrea said he thought that they would have to plan on a vigorous fight because "they plan to raise \$2500 on the Tugman side."

Plank averred that "interest for a county manager plan is just not there" this year. Supporters of the plan will have to "stir pretty hard" if they are to get anywhere before election, Plank said, because "the people are pretty fed up with what they've had to face the last few years."

REID REVIEWED the county's financial record since 1945, stating that while Eugene's tax rate had increased 4.9 mills and school district 4's 15.7, Lane County's had declined 5.1 mills.

"Few counties in the United States are in any better condition than this county is in," he asserted. "Regardless of whether you like Tom Swartz, Lee Ralph or George Stock, those are the facts."

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Illinois Victory Increases Hopes of Ohio Senator Taft

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Sen. Robert A. Taft's presidential primary victory in Illinois practically guaranteed Wednesday that he will have more than 200 Republican national convention delegates by month's end.

A bare majority of 603 delegates is sufficient to nominate a Republican presidential candidate.

TAFT APPARENTLY won 48 of Illinois' 50 district delegates, raising his total to 179 so far. His chance of taking the 10 Illinois delegates-at-large to be selected later was considered to be excellent.

Clouds Blamed For Fatal Crash

CAMP EDWARDS, Mass.—(AP)—An unexpected cloud formation was blamed Thursday for the collision of two Air Force planes travelling at better than 500 miles an hour over Cape Cod.

Twelve Air Force men were killed.

The last of the bodies weren't recovered until several hours after the planes crashed in flaming explosion Wednesday.

A C-47 out of Stewart Air Force Base, Newburgh, N. Y., carried 10 men. An F-84 fighter carried two men. Both planes were on training flights.

Capt. Robert J. Stephenson, public relations officer at this camp's Otis Air Force Base, said one of the two pilots apparently was blinded by billowy clouds which floated over the camp.

Capt. Stephenson said the planes were at between 5000 and 7000 feet altitude when they collided.

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Gives Up Job As 'Caves' Boss

FLORENCE — Gib Houghton, senior partner at Sea Lions Caves, retired April 1, turning over the reins to his son, Don Houghton, who came from Portland to join the junior partners of the firm, Jack Jacobson and Clifton Sautbert.

More than 20 years ago Houghton and John Jacobson acquired the caves and started their developments as the Oregon Coast Highway was being constructed. They later included Roy Sautbert in the partnership, who was to lose his life in a tragic accident at the caves. Houghton and Sautbert were repairing the tower which had been damaged by a storm when a freak wave washed the two men into the sea. Houghton, a powerful athlete, was able to reach safety on the rocks, but his partner was never seen again. Jacobson retired after World War II.

Before the ingenious trail was built along the mountain joining an enclosed stairway to the north cave entrance, the only manner in which the caves could be visited was by use of a rope to make the treacherous descent, which cost at least one life immediately prior to the caves development.

The Houghtons are now in Portland and plan spending the next two years seeing America, with their trailer as their home away from home during that time.
