

Forest Receipts Hit \$3,911,923 Record

The Willamette National Forest received the 19 national forest receipts in this region in forest receipts for the first eight months of the year 1932.

The local forest collected \$3,911,923, an increase of \$1,941,710 over the similar period last year—July 1, according to Reuben Forester J. Herbert Stone, national forest receipts increased all over the state, for a total of \$4,730,000 over the similar period last year, for a total of

\$21,250,000 during the eight months, Stone said.

Twenty-five per cent of the receipts is returned to the counties in which the forests lie for use by schools and for building roads. An additional 10 per cent is used for Forest Service roads.

Payments to counties have increased steadily in recent years, Stone pointed out. In fiscal year 1931, Oregon counties received more than \$4,250,000, an average of 29 cents from each acre of national forest land. Washington counties averaged 22 cents an acre.

Second and third highest income producing forests in the region were the Olympic and Gifford Pinchot National Forests, both in Washington, which collected \$2,320,300 and \$1,641,839 respectively during the first eight months of this fiscal year.

Onion Editor Views 'Unusual' Lamb's Tongue

Spring Upsurge Found Slower

SALEM — (AP) — The spring recovery in Oregon's industries is slower than that of last year, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission said Friday.

The commission announced that 431,500 persons were working in late March in non-farm jobs, which was 3800 less than the total a year earlier.

Forest industries employed 75,400 men, a drop of 2,300 from late March in 1931.

The commission listed 32,967 persons as unemployed, with the rate of insured unemployed being 6 per cent.

The commission paid out \$2,101,532 in benefits in March, 29 per cent more than in March, 1931. Benefit payments in the first three months this year were \$7,383,083, the second highest total for that period of the seven post-war years. The highest first quarter post-war total was in 1930, when extremely cold weather forced closure of many industries.

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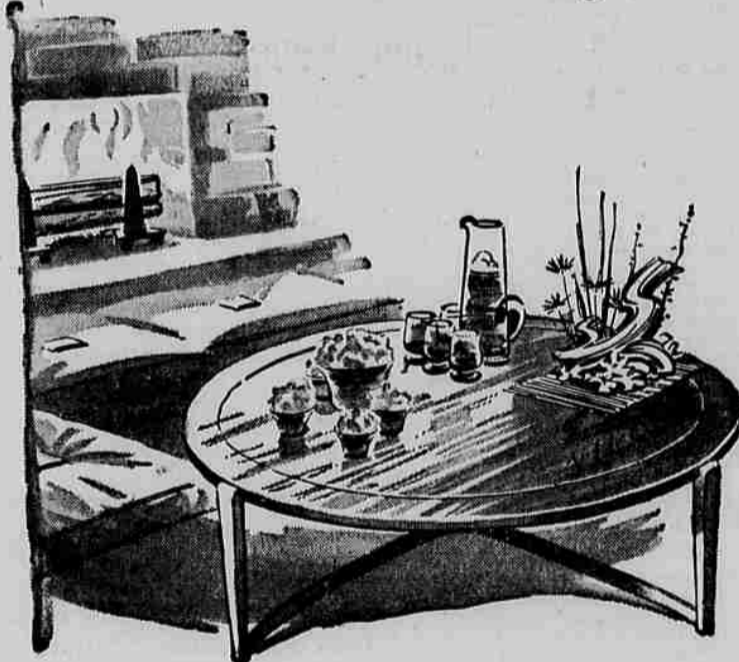
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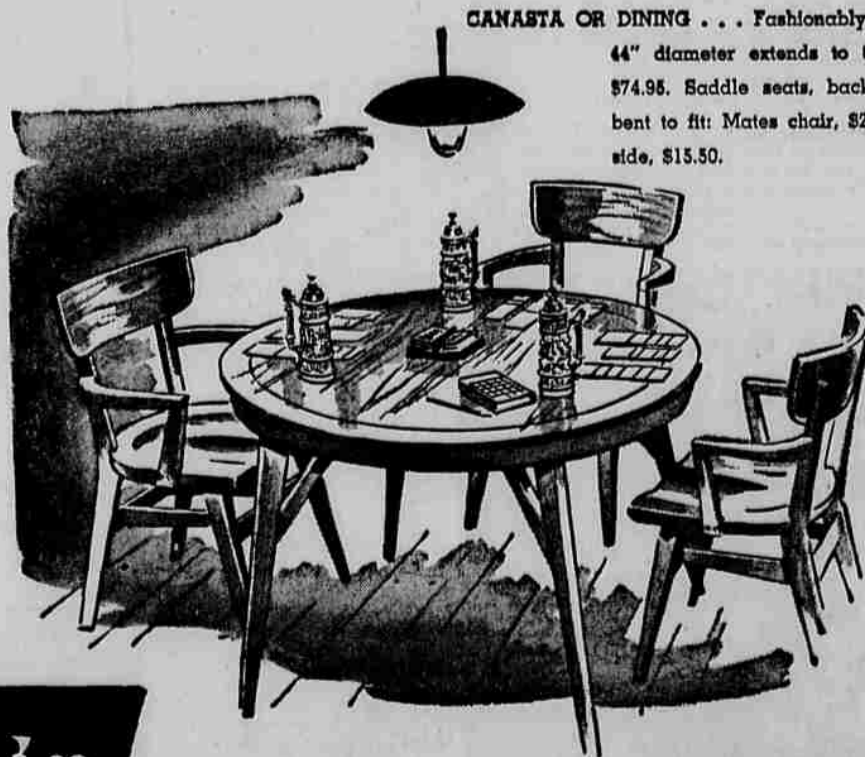


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
