Girl Growing Up Needs Guidance in Activities

You wake up one morning to find that Sis is no longer a baby. At six, or seven, or eight, she is beginning to develop ideas of her own with respect to dress, decoration and play. As parents, you find yourselves facing two problems: how to provide guidance and sincere advice she will need to mold her character; and how to provide the proper fun and entertainment for her at this stage in her life.

The larger part of these problems have been solved for you in a little book which has just come out. It's called "Fun For Girls: The Complete Book of Things To Do, Make and Learn" (\$1.00) (Padell Book Company, 830 Broadway, New York). It is edited by Sarah Brooks, the mother of two children.

THERE ARE hundreds of suggestions, ideas, drawings and pictures illustrating almost any facet of interest to young girls with particular interests and talents. The 192 pages are chock full

of things to do indoors and outdoors.

Mrs. Brooks points out that being a good hostess is an art. "From the time she is hardly more than a baby until she is a grown woman there is seldom a day passes that doesn't require her to perform some function of a hostess. At home, when friends drop in; at school, when she is asked to lead the play hour or the game sessions and, finally, when she gives a real party of her own."

MRS. BROOKS lists ten musts for a successful party:

- "1. Make a list of guests you wish to attend your party.
- "2. Decide what kind of a party it is going to be, keeping in mind the likes and dislikes of the guests you have invited.
- "3. Send out invitations at least a week before the party.
- "4. Make up your refreshment menu.
- "5. Organize a shopping list, including food, decorations, game material, prizes.
- "6. Make up a list of games and stunts. Diversify the list, using different types of games, so that everyone will have an activity they are interested in or adept at.
- "7. The morning of the party should be devoted to preliminary food arrangements. Prepare as much of your food as possible now, don't wait until the last minute.
- "8. Hours before the party starts get your decorations up. If furniture needs to be moved, lamps changed, do it now; don't be rushing around when your guests start arriving. Also make adequate arrangements for disposing of guests' wraps.
- "9. Check all plans carefully. Do last minute preparation of food.
- "10. Sit down and rest a few minutes before your guests start arriving. If you're in a cheery, party mood, yourself, it will make a lot of difference. If you're nervous and tired your attitude is bound to show through and affect everyone else's feelings."
