

to Produce News Film
Wire Service Enters Television Field
 NEW YORK — (AP) — The Associated Press has entered the field of television news-on-film.
 The announced Sunday that the television stations can receive a complete film news service and created exclusive rights for television.
 The service, which includes camera work, sound, editing and editing, is incorporated into individual television programs. The finished product is delivered to stations by a special delivery service.
 The service will come from a complete film news service in 42 states and 44 foreign countries. There also are representatives in the remaining states.
 The AP, a news cooperative, has a new, specialized organization, Spotlight Productions, Inc., to handle the service.
 Personnel of Spotnews includes president, Theodore A. Morde, who has been in the radio and film since 1929, except for a brief period in the U. S. Office of Information; John H. Tobin, vice-president; John H. Tobin, general manager of Tele-News and Tom Craven, a Paramount news cameraman for 25 years.
 Foreign coverage will be under the direction of F. D. Kahlenberg, former editorial director of TeleNews, who is now in St. Louis, Mo., by the Post-Dispatch of Chicago, is the first station to contract for the news service.

New Treatment Helps Victims of Hemophilia
 NEWARK, N. J. — (AP) — A new treatment for hemophilia — the blood disease in which the blood will not clot — has been reported by the Research Foundation of Newark Beth Israel Hospital.
 Hemophilia is inherited only by children and it is passed to them through the mother.
 The new treatment is an important development of their blood disease. The blood will not clot, and a slight cut or scratch becomes a dangerous hemorrhage.
 The BETH ISRAEL treatment is a cure, the doctors emphasize, but it helps patients to lead almost-normal lives. A doctor said scientists had traced what was lacking in the blood of a hemophiliac. It is a protein substance. They have previously isolated this protein from whole blood and injected it into the blood of hemophiliacs with some results.
 In some cases, as reported in previous papers on the subject, the protein substance set off a reaction in the patients. They were resistant to it. Antibodies in their blood were created to attack the effects, which made further injections of the protein dangerous.
 The Beth Israel researchers concentrated whole plasma. The concentrate contained the protein, but also had other blood elements in it.
 The concentrate is frozen and injected into the patient with a syringe.
 The treatment is repeated periodically, and restores a more normal ability of the blood to coagulate. No resistance to the concentrate has been observed, as when the protein alone was used.

Experts Are Wondering About the Wonder Drugs

Antibiotics May Seriously Affect Body's Own Immunity, Says Experts
 For a number of years the public has been bombarded with tales of the "wonder drugs" — Penicillin, streptomycin, aureomycin, etc. — guardians of the nation's health, killers of disease, miracle workers of the blood stream.
 Now it turns out that all is not balm in Gilead, by a long shot. The wonder drugs just ain't so wonderful as all that. At a recent conference of the New York Academy of Sciences' biology section, a number of faults were found with the drugs that hitherto could do no wrong.
 It seems according to the New York Times report of conference, that use of the antibiotics to control infections may actually interfere seriously with the normal bodily development of immunity. It was brought out that these drugs are not all "killers" of disease. They merely hold the infection in check as long as high levels of antibiotics are present in the blood. When the drug is discontinued the patient may suffer relapse because the normal bodily development of anti-bodies to combat germs was checked along with the spread of infection.
 This explains the so-called "mysterious" failures in the use of such drugs.
 May we point a Moral? There is no drug that has ever been made that can equal the curative powers of the human body itself.

 "It is curious how things repeat themselves," Mr. Truman wrote in a letter of thanks to Democrats who have written him since he announced he will not run for reelection.
 "Now again, in 1952, some people are saying that a Democrat cannot be elected president.
 Well, they were wrong in 1948, and they are wrong now.
 "A Democrat could and did win in 1948; a Democrat can win in 1952 — and a Democrat will win if we fight the same kind of hard-hitting campaign on the issues that won in 1948."
 The President's letter was printed in a weekly newspaper sent to 60,000 party officials and workers.
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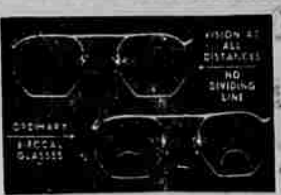
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
