School Head Says Costs Continuous; BPW Gives Check

The problem of the Children's Hospital School is a continuing one, for it has continuing expenses and must be dependent upon public contributions for aid. Manager Loyd Eppenbaugh of the school told members of Eugene BPW Club at its Tuesday luncheon.

He was presented there with a check for \$327, proceeds of a benefit style show and card party given by the club. Mrs. Lyman Palmer, style show chairman, made the presentation at the invitation of Mrs. W. E. Nicholson, club president.

Increase in staff in the past year was reported by Mr. Eppenbaugh, who noted that a full-time speech therapist and physical therapist and a half-time kindergarten teacher have been added. A lawn is being prepared and planted, to serve as additional play area for the children before the summer is done.

He related that in a recent surprise visit from the fire chief and a fire marshal, the school surprised the visitors for the staff was able to empty the building in two minutes. Frequent fire drills made this possible.

One of the large continuing financial needs, he said, is for funds to assist out-of-town children who must be boarded out in local homes. He thanked the club for its gift, which would be used, he said, in operating expenses where most needed.

Easter Means a New Life, Major Tells Council Women

Easter's meaning is a new life. Mrs. Jan Hoogstad reminded the Eugene Council of Women's Clubs in her Good Friday message at a luncheon in the Osburn Hotel. As Jesus Christ rose, so can we, too, live on a higher plane, she said. Major Hoogstad is a member of the Eugene Council of Church Women, the group in charge of the program.

She told the group, "If enough people live above what is the accepted level," all lives will be raised. She likened the horizontal arm of the cross to the standard level of life of all people, saying that when some like Socrates, John Bunyan and Mahatma Gandhi tried to rise above the standard, people asked them to come down to the accepted level. Those who saw Jesus on the cross and asked him to save himself and come down were doing the same thing, she said.

Major Hoogstad quoted and read from the 13th chapter of first Corinthians. Moffat translation, calling it the Christian's creed. "If we could get into our lives this spirit of love," she said, referring to the Bible passage, our love would keep us up when people ask us to come down from the high level, just as Jesus' love kept him on the cross.

"The meaning of the cross has changed over the years," she remarked. At the time of the crucifixion, it was the utmost of shame, she likened it to the hanging of horse thieves when "shooting is too good for them." Now the cross is a badge of courage with medals made in the shape of a cross; the Congressional Medal of Honor and the Croix de Guerre, for example.

During the business meeting preceding Major Hoogstad's talk, Mrs. E. A. Goodnough, president of the council, started introductions of the 19 women present and asked for announcements.

Miss Betty Sether, first vice commander of the Willamette Women's Post of the American Legion, discussed work done by the American Legion in April, their Child Welfare month, and asked that council members help support this work.
