

Controls' Fate Still in Hands Of Committee

'Not in Right Mood'
To Extend Measure

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Sen. Maybank (D-SC) said Friday his Senate Banking Committee is in no mood to extend the wage and price stabilization program while those handling it work "at cross purposes."

The committee twice has delayed work on a bill to extend the Defense Production Act, which provides authority for price, wage, rent and credit controls, and for the rationing of scarce materials. The existing law expires June 30 unless Congress acts.

A COMMITTEE source, declining to be quoted by name, told a reporter the group has let the White House know it will insist on guarantees of better teamwork than was displayed in handling the steel wage dispute before agreeing to an extension.

The big committee has called the "big four" of the defense mobilization and stabilization program, under which wage-price controls operate, to appear before it in a body Tuesday and tell who is boss and how they plan to work together in the future.

Maybank said John R. Steelman, President Truman's assistant defense mobilizer; Roger L. Putnam, stabilization director; Ellis Arnall, price administrator; and Nathan P. Feinsinger, chairman of the Wage Stabilization Board, all have agreed to attend.

Charles E. Wilson, who resigned as defense mobilizer in the row over handling the steel wage-price controversy also may attend, the Senator added.

Maybank said the meeting stems from Wilson's contentions that the Wage Stabilization Board has worked "at cross purposes" with objectives of the price control program, and has invaded areas legally under the National Labor Relations Board.

IN PARTICULAR, Maybank said, Senators want to learn more about the WSB recommendations that the steel industry should sign union shop agreements with its employees.

Sen. Moody (D-Mich) announced that when work resumes on the bill he will renew his fight for more liberal credit controls on the time-payment purchase of automobiles and household goods.

Moody said he has an amendment ready proposing a 25 per cent down payment on automobiles, and 25 months to pay, instead of the present one third down and 18 months to pay.

He said that on household goods such as refrigerators and radios, he will propose a 12 1/2 per cent down payment instead of the present 15 per cent, and 21 months to pay instead of the present 18 months.

Union Counts Strike Ballots

PORTLAND — (AP) — A count of 80,000 CIO International Woodworkers of America strike ballots started at union headquarters here Thursday.

Officials indicated early returns were running more than 90 per cent in favor of a strike if negotiations with employers fail.

The union already has reached an agreement with the Weyerhaeuser Timber Company providing for a 7 1/2 cent hour pay increase, and improved working conditions.

Negotiations are continuing with other employer groups.

TWINS REALLY IDENTICAL

MIGs Challenge U. N. Sabre Jets

SEOUL — (AP) — Communist MIG jets streaked south from their Manchurian bases Friday and tangled with U.S. Sabre jets in six battles high over North Korea.

The U.S. Fifth Air Force said one Red jet was shot down and three were damaged.

Allied losses are reported weekly.

One MIG was shot down and two were damaged in one of five morning battles which matched a total of 70 Sabres against 5 Russian-type MIGs.

The third MIG was damaged in an afternoon dogfight involving 50 Sabres and about 60 MIGs.

On the ground, Communist patrols continued to feel out United Nations defenses. They concentrated on the western and central fronts.

Intermittent enemy artillery fell Friday along sectors west of the Pukhan River in the center of the line, where the main Red probes were made.

An Eighth Army staff officer said the Communists had been observed digging in along ridges fronting Allied positions on the central front. Reinforcements were moved in to strengthen the U.N. lines.

Stern Wheeler Ends Nobility

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Carrying only a "cargo" of memories, the once-proud Sacramento River stern wheeler "Delta King" was being towed to British Columbia Friday.

The weathered, engineless hulk slipped quietly out of the Golden Gate Tuesday night, bound for Kitimat, where she will be moored to serve as a housing unit for construction workers.

Her unsung passing was in sharp contrast to the gay, colorful pre-war era when she and a sister ship, the "Delta Queen," carried thousands of passengers annually on overnight excursions up and down the river.

The Delta Queen is now cruising on the Mississippi River.

U of O Graduate Named As Morse Assistant

WASHINGTON — (AP)—William Berg, former Portlander and now a member of the faculty of the University of Colorado law school, Thursday was named administrative assistant to Sen. Wayne L. More (D-Ore.).

Berg, who will succeed Ivar H. Peterson, recently named as a member of the National Labor Relations board, will arrive here Friday to take over his duties as chief of staff to Sen. Morse.

Berg is a graduate of the University of Oregon law school.

Rich Jeweler Pays \$15,000 Ransom in Trick Kidnaping

MIAMI, Fla. — (AP) — A wealthy Miami jeweler paid \$15,000 "ransom" for return of his six-year-old son Thursday in what police called a phony kidnaping.

Daniel Richter was duped into paying \$15,000 in jewels and \$200 cash in what police said was "one of the cleverest and most perfectly timed" extortions in memory.

The boy, Richard, was never actually kidnaped, Police said, although Richter was convinced he was buying his son's safe return.

WHILE POLICE and the FBI marshaled forces to meet what they thought was a genuine kidnaping, the child was riding in a taxicab from a private school at Miami Beach to Doctor's hospital in Coral Gables, a distance of about 12 miles.

Police said the plotters used the school, the taxi company and the hospital as unwitting dupes in their shakedown.

As police reconstructed the crime, it happened this way:

A man who said he was "Dr. Henderson" called the Yellow Cab Co., at Miami Beach and asked them to pick up Ricky Richter at Coburn school and drive him to the hospital, purportedly to be with his "gravely ill" mother.

Almost simultaneously, a woman's voice called the school authorities and said a taxi would arrive soon to pick up the boy.

CAB DRIVER Bert Walowitz, 24, was sent to the school and picked up the boy. One member of the gang must have watched him because a telephone call then went to the father's office in downtown Miami.

The caller told Daniel Richter he had Ricky in his custody and that no harm would come to the child if the father cooperated.

"He said, 'this is purely a business deal and will require \$50,000 in diamonds and \$5,000 in cash for you to get your boy back,'" Richter reported.

The caller warned Richter the boy's life would be in danger if police were notified, and gave him five minutes to verify the story.

Richter quickly called the school, learned his son was gone, then decided to notify police. While Detectives M. H. Wiggins and E. A. Taunton were enroute to Richter's jewelry store, his phone rang again.

HE GAVE ME instructions to take the jewels and money to a phone booth in the Ponce de Leon Hotel," Richter related. "I told him the most I could raise was about \$15,000 in jewels and \$200 in cash. He said that would do."

Richter went to the hotel and waited in the booth. A bellboy told him he was wanted on the phone at the desk and the same man who had called earlier told him to put the jewels and cash in a bag in a coin locker at the Greyhound bus station, place the key with a wad of chewing gum under the counter of a certain telephone booth, and leave.

Richter was still a step ahead of detectives, who were being briefed at the store by his brother, Alvin Richter.

The father rushed to the bus station, placed the bag in a locker, and since the designated phone booth was being used, placed the key in another booth.

DETECTIVES REACHED the bus station as Richter left. While one watched the originally-designated booth, the other went back to the store to find the father.

Apparently while the detectives watched one phone booth, one of the extortionists slipped into the other, around a corner, and took the key.

When police reinforcements arrived, the key was gone, the locker was open and the key was in it, still sticky with chewing gum.

About the time Richter returned to his store, a puzzled doctor at the hospital called and asked if he had a son, Ricky. The boy was at the hospital and the cab driver was waiting for his fare.

Richter said the whole sequence of events took about an hour.

Allies Reopen POW Parleys

MUNSAN — (AP)—Allied and Communist staff officers, after a two week recess, Saturday reopened off-the-record talks on how to exchange prisoners of the Korean war.

There was no indication whether a break was imminent in the long deadlock over the Allied demand for voluntary repatriation.

Some observers, however, indicated a compromise formula was in the works. Both sides were believed to have spent the past two weeks overhauling prisoner rosters and bringing them up to date.

The U. N. Command said it was ready for another try to break the deadlock. The Communists had pressed twice for speedy resumption of the secret talks.

The staff officers will meet at 11 a. m. (6 p. m.) Friday. The negotiations were recessed April 4 to allow both sides to explore possible new solutions.

The agreement to resume prisoner exchange talks came during a short "no progress" session of the subcommittee on truce supervision.

The meeting lasted eight minutes and 25 seconds—more than the total of the previous seven sessions.
