

World Group Slates Speakers Federalists to Hear Union Arguments

Emerson Thatcher, city attorney of Kent, Wash., will give the final argument on the question "Should world government be an objective of U. S. foreign policy?" to be presented at a "town meeting" type of forum at the Osburn Hotel, Saturday at 7:30 p.m.

Other speakers will include Neal Potter, Northwest field director of the United World Federalists, Dr. Edna Landros of the Atlantic Union Committee, and Dr. Roy McCall, head of the University of Oregon's department of speech.

This event, which is open to the public, will follow a dinner at the Osburn highlighting a two-day seminar of the United World Federalists.

At 2 p.m. Saturday, Mrs. Russell Gribbskov, Junction City, will speak on "World Government and the American People" in the Oriental room of the Osburn Hotel.

"Christianity and Federation" is the title of a sermon to be delivered by Dr. Paul Means of the U. of O. department of religion at the Oriental room, at 9 a.m. Sunday.

Following the sermon, Mrs. Justin Hammer will present "A Lesson from History on Federation," and Robert Naper of the First National Bank, Eugene, will give a short analysis of the expected benefits of limited government on a global scale.

Each of these sessions is open to the public.

Chamber Okays Part in Survey

The board of directors of the Springfield Chamber of Commerce has decided to participate in a county-wide industrial and resources appraisal.

Sponsored by the Eugene Chamber of Commerce, the intent of appraisal project is to ascertain the county's present industrial situation and map out plans for the future.

Industrial Survey Associates of San Francisco have been contracted for the mechanics of the survey, with participation of all communities of the county needed for the answers to the firm's questions.

Tongues Topic Of Conference

The third annual Northwest Pacific conference of foreign language teachers opened Friday in the Erb Memorial Union Building on the campus.

The first general session of the three-day foreign language conference began at 9 a. m. with George D. Hocking of Willamette University presiding.

The principal address of the conference will be delivered at the Saturday noon luncheon when Professor Ira O. Wade, chairman of the department of modern languages at Princeton University, will discuss "Phonemes, Humanisms and Sabrejets."

The conference will end Saturday afternoon with reports of conference groups, selection of next year's meeting place and nomination of the 1953 executive committee. Chairman of this year's conference is Dr. D. M. Dougherty, head of the department of foreign languages at the University of Oregon and regional chairman of the conference of foreign language teachers.

Farmers Nominating Rodent Supervisors

Nominations by Lane County granges and farm bureau centers are now being received by County Agent O. S. Fletcher for rodent control supervisors for county communities.

When the nominations are in, Fletcher will recommend appointment of the supervisors to the Lane County Court. He urged the farm groups to get their nominations in promptly.

The supervisors will help carry out the county's annual program to poison ground squirrels and other rodents.

Sunday School to Hear Octogenarian Quartet

Eugene's Octogenarian Quartet will sing Sunday, at 9:45 a.m. at Sunday School services of the First Evangelical United Brethren Church, 8th and Monroe Sts.

One of the members, R. T. Burnett, will sing a solo with the rest of the quartet as chorus, and the two tenors, John H. Starr and George McLean, will sing a duet.

School Uses Thesis

The university's school of journalism is using the masters thesis of one of its graduates as a textbook in a journalism course being given this term.

The thesis, written by John Valleau, explains press coverage of the last session of the Oregon state legislature. Valleau is currently serving as editor of the Imperial Valley Press, daily newspaper published in El Centro, Cal.

Opposition Uses Lies, Todd Avers At Charter Forum

Opponents of the proposed county manager form of government for Lane County were accused Thursday night of using "pure, open lies" in a statement about the plan published in last Sunday's Register-Guard.

George Todd, chairman of the committee for the county manager plan, made the charge at a YMCA Little Town Hall forum in the First Congregational Church. He challenged his forum opponents to back up their statements, which he termed "dishonest, distorted and misrepresentative."

But all the heated statements did not come from the pro-manager element. Two anti-manager members of the forum panel, Lewis Hoffman and Paul Plank, repeatedly charged that adoption of the plan at the May 16 elections would result in dictatorship for the county.

Eugene Register-Guard Editor William Tugman was the object of one of the night's most vehement attacks, leveled by Robert N. McCrea, a member of the forum audience who is also treasurer of the anti-manager forces.

AFTER ACCUSING panel moderator Dr. Robert Clark of "planting" one of the panel members to prevent Hoffman from answering questions during a "cross-examination period," McCrea switched his sights to Tugman. The plan was brought forth for the first time, in 1948, "at the instigation of William Tugman," he said. He "brought it under his own name" then, but in 1950 and again this year has "trotted it out" with someone else as its head, McCrea railed.

In his opening remarks, Todd reviewed the main points of the manager proposal. As he noted them, they are:

- A seven-man elected board "vested with all the powers of Lane County."

- A manager, appointed by the board and responsible to it alone, who would in turn appoint heads of the six major departments for administrative set-up.

He then attacked the statement of the Lane County Committee for Democracy, (the anti-manager group), which appeared in Sunday's paper as part of a full-page discussion of the proposal. To the committee's charge that the county board would be a "weak... council," Todd replied that well-qualified persons have already indicated their interest in the jobs. To the charge that the plan would result in increased costs, he said that each one of the 60 counties with some form of the manager system have shown either reduced costs or improved services.

THE COMMITTEE'S assertion that the county manager could appoint the "police, judge and jury in district and justice courts," Todd classed as "the ultimate untruth." "It (the plan) does not in any manner touch the judicial department," he stated.

Hoffman, secretary of the Committee for Democracy, in his opening 10-minute talk, said that he would "not attempt to answer" Todd's remarks in the few minutes at his disposal. He then went on to explain his opposition, which he outlined as follows:

- The basic Oregon law which allows county manager forms of government is unlike any other

Stanley J. Jerabek, 643 1/2 Oak St., Eugene, was sentenced by District Judge Chester N. Anderson. Police reports indicated the case against Jerabek involved giving whiskey to a 16-year-old junior high school boy.

County Building Permits Go Up During April

Lane County Building Inspector James Partridge reported Friday that residential building permits issued from his office during the first half of April totaled \$302,000.

Partridge said permits for all of March totaled only \$432,950. February figures totaled \$385,150.

At the present rate, April residential permits may exceed \$800,000, Partridge said. April, 1951, permits totaled only \$420,000.

in the country and consequently untried.

- The system would place too much power in the hands of one person—the county manager.

- It would deprive voters of naming their own officials and would discourage participation in public affairs.

- It would abolish political parties, which now enable voters to know what candidates stand for, and would thus destroy the training ground for persons going into state and national jobs.

- It would create a possibility for a "rubber stamp situation" in which the manager would control the elected board.

After the opening speeches, the second member of each side was allowed to question the first speaker on the opposite side. Plank, vice-chairman of the Committee for Democracy, asked Todd if he thought that politics could be done away with under any system. Todd said that he thought they could on a county level.

Plank then commented that the "absence" of the manager drive was that the "outs" wanted to get "in" to the government. Todd replied that only one member of his committee had ever sought a county office.

DR. JAMES GILBERT, the other half of the pro-manager team, quizzed Hoffman on parts of his talk. He asked Hoffman to show where in Oregon's county manager laws differed from those of other states. Hoffman stated that under the Oregon system any number of county departments may be set up, but Gilbert disagreed.

Gilbert also took issue with Hoffman on the latter's charge that the manager would be a dictator. He would always be subject to recall by the board, Gilbert said, and if the board failed to act the people have power to recall the board.

A number of persons in the audience got into the discussion when it was thrown open. J. S. Avers asked Todd if one man, the manager, wouldn't be given the electing power which now belongs to the voters.

ABSOLUTELY NOT, Todd said. The people would elect a seven-man board of policy-makers who would be vested with all the county's powers.

Norman Schneider queried Hoffman about the costs under a manager system. Hoffman had said that he didn't think the Eugene city manager had done too "brilliant" a job from an economy standpoint. Replying to Schneider, Hoffman said that since 1945, Eugene's millage rate had gone up 4.9 mills while that of the county had decreased 5.1 mills.

Asked whether we were going "forward or backward" in the tendency to centralize government, Gilbert answered that centralized power "was the very essence of democracy when exercised under direct responsibility to the people."

COMMENTING on the same question, Plank said that while "we are now electing doers" we would be "once removing the individual from the job" under the manager plan.

Winding up their arguments, both Gilbert and Plank pointed to the historic tradition of county government. Plank saw in it the "grass roots of America" which shouldn't be destroyed while Gilbert thought it was time to get away from "grandpa's government."

Captain Elihu M. Ben-Dror, veteran of Israeli military campaigns, will address an evening meeting sponsored by the Eugene B'nai B'rith Lodge No. 1404, at the Veterans' Memorial Bldg. Monday, April 21.

The program will begin with a dinner at 6:30 p.m. Capt. Ben-Dror will speak at 8:30. Reservations may be made by calling Ed Schwartz at 5-3261 or Mrs. Oscar Strauss at 4-7263. Persons not attending the dinner have been invited to the 8:30 program. Included will be a new film made in Israel by Henry Morgenthau Jr.

Capt. Ben-Dror, one of the oldest members of the formerly underground Haganah Defense Force of Palestine, began his military career in World War I as a member of the Jewish Legion. Following service under General Allenby on the Turkish Front, he returned to the Holy Land for service with the Northern Palestine Mounted Police.

He was active in defense of Palestine during the Arab troubles of 1936-1939. Later he commanded the training of a Jewish Settlement Police Force.

After serving as the Jewish Agency's liaison officer with British military forces in Palestine, he joined the British Army as Commander of a Jewish unit in the Eighth Army Campaign against Rommel in North Africa.

While Capt. Ben-Dror's Eugene appearance was arranged to promote the sale of Israeli bonds, there will be no solicitation or direct sale at Monday night's meeting, local lodge officials said.

Disastrous Fire Laid to Wiring

TOKYO — (AP)—Police Friday blamed Tottori's disastrous \$41,800,000 fire on a short circuit caused by illegal tapping of electric wires. They jailed three suspects.

The 12-hour fire left 25,000 homeless and injured 120 persons, but no one was killed. An estimated 5,000 homes were destroyed.

The government allotted \$1,100,000 to help rebuild the southwestern Honshu Island city of 81,000. And additional \$69,000 will be spent on temporary shelters.

The fire was the worst in Japan since World War II and was officially described as the third largest since 1926.

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UO Suspends Two Students

**Punishment Meted
For Altering Grades**

Two unidentified University of Oregon students were expelled from the school for an indefinite time Thursday after both confessed to breaking into Emerald Hall and altering grade cards and other records. The action, the most severe in the university discipline code, was taken by unanimous vote of the Student Discipline Committee.

Expulsion from the university bars students from attending any recognized college.

Donald M. DuShane, director of student affairs, said the two students were the first to be suspended in "several years." Usually, he explained, the university uses "suspension," a lighter punishment. "I don't know how far back you'd have to go, but it would be at least several years," he said, to find the case of other students expelled from the institution.

In line with university policy on internal disciplinary disputes, DuShane said names of the students would not be revealed. He suggested, however, they were men and not seniors.
