known as a forceful player, and it is surely more true than ever. She played here Tuesday evening in the home of a pupil, Mrs. Royal Gick, for a score or so of friends. The program was one she had given the first of the month in Portland, as part of the University of Portland Cultural Series. Both Mrs. Underwood and her husband, who accompanied her here, are on the faculty of U. of P.

THE PROGRAM was a heavy one, but seemed not long, especially since the pianist arranged it with few pauses. She played a Brahms group, chosen to show her skill in melodic patterns; a medley of seven short waltzes, two intermezzos, and "Ballade." They offered wide contrast.

Next was a Chopin group, comprised of three etudes, a nocturne filled with pathos, and "Scherzo Opus 31," which made every board and timber in the house vibrate with its tempest of sound.

TWO LISZT numbers were the latter part of the program, one lovely thing called "Benediction of God in the Wilderness," which filled one's soul with beauty; and "Hungarian Rhapsody No. 12," which amazed and entranced with its tremendous scope, even while one wondered whether the piano would stand up under it. A Steinway, it did.

But Aurora! Why didn't they name her Titania? She could set McArthur Court ringing. She's titanic!

SHE IS doing much more public playing in and about Portland than in Eugene, and it shows. Every Saturday night at home also is devoted to music, when the Underwood Trio gets together—that's son Rex John, violin, and his wife, who plays 'cello, and Aurora.

And what does Rex Underwood do while the trio plays? Why, he holds his young granddaughter, of course... teaches her to beat time, perhaps. (He directs orchestral groups, as Eugeneans know.)

MRS. UNDERWOOD mentioned that she is an associate member of the Leschetizky Club (headquarters, New York). That is by reason of being a pupil of Mrs. Thacher, who was a first-hand pupil of the Polish pianist-teacher. There is now another pupil of Theodore Leschetizky in Eugene: Mrs. Carsten Well, who concertized as Esther Ehrhart Wall. They are a distinguished group, these pupils of the master who taught Paderewski—yet we have two.

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
