

Nunan Balks At Questions

Refuses to Explain \$97,328 Deposits

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Joseph D. Nunan, Jr., former internal revenue commissioner, has refused to explain cash deposits of \$97,328 which did not show on his income tax returns.

Nunan's cash transactions in the six-year period 1945-50 were described to the House ways and means subcommittee Wednesday by Andres Saldana, internal revenue agent in the second district of New York.

NUNAN, HIMSELF, had been slated to appear before the subcommittee, but his physicians said he was too ill to undergo questioning. Chairman Cecil R. King (D-Calif.) of the subcommittee which has been investigating tax scandals ordered Nunan examined again by a committee-appointed heart specialist.

King said the physician's report probably will determine whether the subcommittee will take contempt action against the man who headed the federal tax collection office from 1944 until June 30, 1947.

AFTER SALDANA had told the subcommittee about finding the unexplained deposits of \$97,328 in various bank and brokerage accounts, Subcommittee Counsel Adrian W. Dewind commented that Nunan had been asked to explain these cash transactions at a secret hearing several weeks ago and had refused on grounds of possible self-incrimination.

Saldana also testified that \$35,583 in bank deposits by check could not be traced over the five-year period and were not reported as taxable income. He said the only record was bank deposit slips showing that the deposits were made by check.

Rep. Robert W. Kean (R-NJ) said he figured that Nunan, while internal revenue commissioner, had about \$78,000 in income not reported on his tax returns.

Harriman Enters Presidential Race

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Foreign aid chief W. Averell Harriman tossed his hat into the ring Tuesday in a full-fledged bid for the Democratic presidential nomination.

The 60-year-old New Yorker told newsmen he will conduct a fighting nationwide campaign keyed to the Truman administration's domestic and foreign policies.

Harriman called for strong "progressive, liberal" policies on the home front and "unflinching world leadership" in foreign affairs.

A longtime disciple of the Roosevelt-Truman "deal" programs, dating back to Franklin D. Roosevelt's first year in the White House in 1933, Harriman was praised by President Truman as a "great liberal" and as qualified for the presidency.

Talking to reporters while newsreel cameras hummed, Harriman

He said he wanted to assure his supporters he would be an active candidate—thus countering reports that his chief function would be to hold New York's 94-vote delegation together until leaders decided whom to back at the national convention.

Some party bigwigs had said last week at the outset of a fledgling boom for Harriman that they didn't expect the lanky, greying New Yorker to go far on a national scale.

But Harriman noted that a national committee, headed by Senator Lehman and Rep. Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr., both of New York, has been organized to push his candidacy in a nationwide campaign.

TB Drugs Not 'Magic Bullets'

Patients Build Up Resistance to Pills

SARANAC LAKE, N. Y. — (AP) — Scientists and laymen had word Wednesday from the world-famous Trudeau Tuberculosis Laboratory that the new anti-TB "miracle" drugs were "not yet the magic bullet so long awaited."

The laboratory head, Dr. William Steenkamp Jr., said Tuesday night that tests conducted at the pioneer tuberculosis sanatorium revealed that TB patients tended to build up resistance to the new drugs as the treatment progressed.

He said that TB germs developed resistance to the drugs as early as 26 days after the start of treatment.

The new drugs, developed simultaneously by scientists of Hoffman-La Roche Inc. and E. R. Squibb and Sons, can be produced cheaply and readily. At least 15 American drug firms are preparing to market them under different trade names.

State Violates Liquor Prices

MEDFORD, Ore. — (AP) — A member of the Oregon State Liquor commission confirmed that the commission has been notified it is violating price regulations.

W. A. Spangler, Klamath Falls member of the commission, said the Office of Price Stabilization was protesting the price increase of last Dec. 1, which the federal agency earlier had told the liquor commission could not be put into effect.

Spangler was in Medford Wednesday for a commission meeting and said the OPS complaint probably would be discussed but he did not think the commission would take any action on it. Spangler indicated he was inclined to await the government's next move.

GOODING, Idaho — (AP) — Greyhound Bus Driver Ray Hemmert of Boise was arrested for speeding through a school zone Tuesday and fined \$15 by Police Judge Stanley Legg.

His passengers took up a collection to pay the fine and Hemmert came out a nickel ahead on the deal.

College Students Take Deferment Test

WASHINGTON — (AP) — About 56,500 college students will take the sixth draft deferment test Wednesday.

Selective Service Director Lewis B. Hershey, who made the estimate, reminded college men that the examination will be used as a basis for granting educational deferments to permit students to stay in school.

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil — (AP) — Eva Peron, wife of Argentine President Juan D. Peron, has been awarded the "Southern Cross" Grand Degree, Brazil's highest decoration, by President President Getulio Vargas.

Straight Dope On Dunkerque

MOSCOW — (AP) — Russian readers got the Soviet dope Wednesday on the British evacuation from Dunkerque.

Neither heroism nor skill got the British troops off the sands of France—Hitler let them get away on purpose, wrote the Russian Navy newspaper Red Fleet.

The Fuehrer issued orders to let the British troops get away, the paper explained, in hopes this would speed up an Anglo-German agreement on a joint war against the Soviet Union.

Red Fleet said further: "The myth on the 'heroic feat' of the British fleet at Dunkerque was needed by the English falsifiers of history in order to conceal the truth from their own people and the world public."

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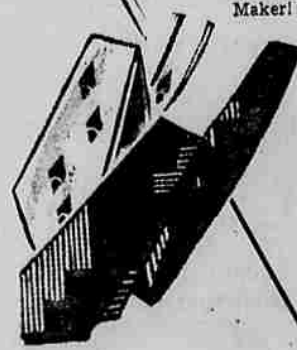
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
