Missouri Falls At Kansas City

Mississippi River Floods Iowa Town

KANSAS CITY—(P)—The Kansas City area was over the hump Friday in its fight against the Missouri river but flood workers still maintained a vigil along the network of dikes for possible weak spots.

The flood-choked river continued to fall after reaching its peak here Thursday afternoon, just a fraction under 30.7 feet. That was a little below the predicted crest of 31 and more than 10 feet under the top of the levees.

IT WAS A record upstream flood until the muddy surge hit Kansas City. But from here on downstream the river stages were lower than the terrible flood of July, 1951, when the Kaw (Kansas) river, which joins the Missouri here, laid waste to the rich industrial areas of the two Kansas Cities.

Nothing like that happened this time. The record 1951 stage here was 38.2.

Downstream, the water poked its creeping fingers into creeks and sloughs as the flood spread over fertile farmland. But there were no heavily populated areas in its path.

AS THE CREST passed Kansas City, President Truman signed a \$25,000,000 flood relief bill in Washington.

On the Mississippi river, the record flood there inundated a Clinton, Ia., residential area eight blocks from the waterfront. It was the second flood blow in a year for Clinton.

The long, flat crest was expected to reach Clinton Friday.



\$4 MILLION FIRE ON VANCOUVER PIER—Huge columns of smoke rise over Vancouver, B. C., waterfront in one of the worst fires to strike the city. The fire spread so rapidly that the 1200-foot pier was ablaze from end to end within 30 minutes after the alarm. Flames crumpled a \$2,500,000 grain-loading terminal. Adjoining warehouses and contents that were destroyed were valued at \$1,500,000.

Oriental War Bride Assured She's Welcome in U.S. Town

ALHAMBRA, Calif. — (P) — Nobuko Coronel, an Oriental war bride who begged to be a "Madame Butterfly," is on her way to a new home here with her GI husband and baby.

Thus her love affair is happier than the one in Puccini's opera, "Madame Butterfly," which also involves an Occidental man and an Oriental girl.

Thanks to letters from Alhambra townfolk, Nobuko—a 20-year-old Filipino girl of Japanese-Okinawan ancestry—knows now that she is wanted.

Shortly before she sailed from Okinawa this week with her husband, Cpl. Robert A. Coronel, and Mary Ann, five months, Nobuko received an airmail package of 70 letters received by the Alhambra Post-Advocate from its readers. The newspaper had published Cpl. Coronel's letter saying:

"Nobuko is worried that the people of Alhambra will not accept her as an American citizen. I received a nasty letter which she unfortunately read . . . She begged me to get a divorce. I love my wife and baby more than anything in the world and I'd give up my citizenship before I'd give up my wife and baby."

In asking the newspaper's aid, Coronel pointed out that Nobuko worked with the Philippine underground against the Japanese during World War II.

"All she has to show for her work is a citation, a big scar on her arm and a piece of shrapnel in her side," the husband wrote. He and Nobuko were married in Okinawa in February, 1951.

The letter-published together with an editorial—drew an immediate response.

"Please do not judge the whole

community on the biased thought of one person," wrote one. Another said: "Do not break up your marriage over one intolerant letter."

Another letter put it this way: "You will find Americans like every type you have ever known. Some will be intolerant, bigoted, unkind, even cruel, but you will also find many, many more who will be the kind of people you will want Mary Ann to know. These are the people who live by the Golden

Rule, those who know God made all individuals, regardless of color of hair, eyes, skin—or size of nose.

"When you arrive in America, hold your head up—be proud of what you have to offer this country in return for citizenship. Your offer of friendship, courage, honesty and love will be met by friendship, courage, honesty and love."

It is a lighter-hearted bride Cpl. Coronel will bring home sometime early in May.

Demo Leaders Abandon Hope For Orderly 4-Day Convention

WASHINGTON — (P) — Democratic Party leaders have all but abandoned hope for an orderly four-day national convention.

They think it is much more likely that the Democratic Convention, which starts in Chicago July 21, will turn into a free-for-all fight for the presidential nomination.

While the Democrats are not expecting a repeat of the 1924 convention with its more than 100 ballots, neither do they expect a one-ballot nomination which has been the rule in the past four national conventions.

Including favorite sons, it now appears that as many as 10 or more names may go before the Chicago convention.

On the basis of present indications, Democrats are speculating that it is unlikely that any candidate will have many more than a quarter of the 1230 delegates on the first ballot.

One usually well-informed party official believes that Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) will be the

front-runner on the first ballot with about 325 delegates, followed by Sen. Richard B. Russell (D-Ga.) with something short of 300.

Kefauver faces heavy resistance from organization Democrats in many states. Similarly, Russell may have trouble gaining ground because Northern Democrats oppose his leadership of the Southern fight against civil rights legislation.

The names of Mutual Security Administrator W. Averell Harriman, Vice-President Alben W. Barkley, Sen. Robert S. Kerr (D-Okla.), Gov. G. Mennen Williams of Michigan, Sen. Brien McMahon (D-Conn.) and Sen. Hubert Humphrey (D-Minn.) also are expected to be placed in nomination.

Burly Fireman Saves Youth From Suicide

MIAMI, Fla. — (P) — A burly fireman snatched a lovelorn youth from an 11th story hotel ledge here after he had turned a deaf ear to the pleas of a pretty girl and a priest.

James Vickery, 22, Atlanta, lingered for two hours and 20 minutes on his dizzy perch Tuesday, threatening to jump to his death because "I want my girl."

Big John Lundstedt of the fire department rescue squad prevented a tragic ending to the real-life television drama seen by thousands of South Floridians.

Lundstedt caught the red-haired youth off guard, lunged over the roof railing and grabbed him. Four firemen pulled the pair to safety.

A Catholic priest, the Rev. D. Cronin, and Marjorie Kojac, a pretty blonde who lived with the youth's girl friend, had pleaded with Vickery to come off the ledge. He refused.

Pale and glassy-eyed, Vickery was carried to Jackson Memorial Hospital for an examination by doctors, who ordered him taken to Miami Retreat, a mental institution.
