for Big Drive

Thomas Hunter of Eugene, has been appointed chairman for the \$12,000 building funds campaign of the Presbyterian Church in the Willamette Valley. Hunter lives in Kincaid, Eugene.

The nation-wide campaign, which is being conducted among churches during all of 1952, will see the establishment of new churches in new or growing communities where population has outdistanced church facilities.

He also provides \$4,500,000 for theological seminaries at Princeton, N. J., Pittsburgh, Pa., Union, Ill., Louisville, Ky., Duquesne, Pa., Charlotte, N. C., Lincoln, Pa., and San Francisco, Calif.

Report of the amount submitted toward the campaign goal was made at the annual meeting of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in New York City, which opened last week.

Regional co-chairman of the campaign is Dr. Hugh Ivan Taylor, pastor of the Westminster Presbyterian Church in Dayton, Ohio, and C. Slaymaker, president of the Slaymaker Lock Co., in Dayton, Pa.

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Possible Shakeup
For Two Churches

The hottest news yarn in years for the usually staid church page was the electrifying news that the Commonwealth Company of Portland and San Francisco is interested in buying the block of property south of Eleventh between Willamette and Oak, on which two of Eugene's largest churches are located.

The First Christian Church was delighted. They want a new building and that's that. First Methodist, with its huge brick structure, was not so sure; members admit that the thought of a modern, functional building with lots of parking space is attractive. But there are many financial and sentimental kinks to be ironed out for both churches. Fine old memories cling about the familiar buildings.

The Christian Church promptly had a congregational meeting which voted unanimously to sell if the proposition is favorable. Quoting from the current issue of their church bulletin:

"This means that the board is on record as favoring the sale of the present church property and will welcome negotiations with the companies involved. The consensus of opinion at the board meeting was that this was an opportunity that would not come again soon and it came at a logical time before we had gone too far into plans for the renovation of the present building and the erection of new buildings on the lot south of the church."

The Methodists have called a church meeting for May 1 and will then take action. Their brick building, the pastor, the Rev. Beryl Farris explains, would be expensive to wreck, and hurried unofficial estimates among church members place the cost of building a church to suit their needs at a frightening figure somewhere between \$500,000 and "from there on up." Neither church has land purchased on which to build, and the Methodists at least would be very loath to leave a downtown location.

Significant is a meeting and dinner called for Monday evening, April 28, at Central Presbyterian Church, when delegates from most Eugene churches will meet to argue, listen, and eventually to vote, on the constitution of the proposed new Eugene Council of Churches. The public is welcome to sit "in the balcony."

Of special note: the Blachly Memorial Church, on the shore of Triangle Lake, is having its dedication Sunday. It is non-denominational, and represent a year of loving labor on the part of almost everybody of the old families of Blachly and the lake area and up and down Highway 36, plus big donations from the lumber companies of the area, and hours of back-breaking toil by loggers, housewives, teen-agers, and just everybody.

The women of the communities undertook the task of painting big piles of plywood that seemed never-ending. The minister, the

Luther Depicted
In German Films

Louis de Rochemont Associates, of the nation's leading film companies, has been engaged by Lutheran Church Productions, Inc., to produce its motion picture on the life of Martin Luther, according to the Rev. E. D. Busch, Area Representative of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod and pastor of Hope Lutheran Church in Springfield.

Lutheran Church Productions, in which six church groups are co-operating, has collected nearly \$400,000 for the project.

Included are the National Lutheran Council, American Lutheran Church, Augustana Lutheran Church, Evangelical Lutheran Church, The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod and United Lutheran Church in America.

In order to give the Luther film all the authenticity and power possible it will be shot on location in Germany. Final adjustments are now being made on that script which has been in preparation for nearly a year. Selection of a director and actors to play the part of Luther and other leading roles will be made in the near future. It is expected that most of the cast will be chosen in Germany.

Present plans call for shooting of the film to begin about July 1, and it is hoped to complete the picture for showing in 1953 in the U.S.

Lothar Wolff, associate producer of the de Rochemont Company, will be in charge of the production.

Louis de Rochemont was producer of the March of Time for nine years, then entered the field of fiction films. The story of de Rochemont and his film company has been featured in several periodicals, among the "Time" and "The Saturday Evening Post." Time said of him that he "builds his movies around a hard core of fact, shoots them in actual settings, weights the cast with unknowns, little-knowns or non-professionals, so that stories will look as if they were filmed while they were happening."

His "Lost Boundaries" tackled the racial question, while "Whistle at Eaton Falls" deals with the relations of management and labor. His films have had wide artistic and commercial success.
