Hopes Brighten To End Rail Labor Dispute

WASHINGTON — (U.P.) — Government hopes for ending the three-year-old railroad wage and working rules battle rose Saturday as the White House announced that Acting Defense Mobilizer John R. Steelman has reopened intensified mediation efforts.

Steelman, who has been handling the rail dispute for a year and a half, met with both the carriers and three big operating unions Friday and planned to continue talks throughout the weekend.

Management and union negotiators may meet jointly soon, with Steelman and Leverett Edwards, chairman of the national mediation board.

Both sides were hopeful the deadlock, one of the longest in labor relations history, would be broken during the current talks, but agreed that a settlement was not "imminent."

The engineers, firemen and conductors—representing 150,000 rail workers—have long been willing to accept the carriers' wage offer of 38 cents an hour for yard workers and 23 1/4 cents for roadmen, but have balked at four changes in working rules sought by the railroads.

Although President Truman invoked a special rail seizure law when he took over the railroads on Aug. 25, 1950, the unions are challenging the government's refusal to make the seizure "a real one" by seizing company profits.

Senate Backs Testimony That U.S. Atom Defenses Are Weak

WASHINGTON — (U.P.) — Sen. Russell B. Long (D-La.), said Saturday Lt. Gen. Ennis C. Whitehead "did not go too far" in testifying Friday that U. S. defenses against atomic bomb attack are dangerously weak.

Whitehead told the Senate preparedness subcommittee, "I think that a well planned, well executed, surprise attack on the United States would succeed beyond the fondest hopes of its commanders."

HE LATER testified he had intended to limit his testimony to the state of defenses existing 10 months ago, when he retired as commander of U. S. aerial defenses, and that he meant an "atomic attack."

But the general said he still believes air-defense planners "are gambling" with U. S. security, rather than taking "calculated risks," as they describe it, in delaying a swift build-up of a full 143-wing Air Force.

Current strength of the Air Force is estimated by Pentagon sources at 95 wings, not all of which are equipped with the most modern aircraft.

WHITEHEAD'S testimony

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Campaign On For Douglas

PORTLAND — (U.P.) — Supporters of Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas for the Democratic nomination for president are going ahead with their Oregon campaign despite opposition by Douglas.

The supreme court justice has paid \$100 for a page in the Oregon Voters Pamphlet asking the people not to vote for him.

But Reuben Lenske, chairman of the Douglas for President Committee, said a meeting was scheduled for Saturday night to map a campaign for votes.

Lenske said he had received a letter from Albert Einstein, famous scientist, endorsing Douglas.

Einstein wrote: "This is the only man for whom I could vote with a good conscience."

No 'Whistle Stop Tour' Due For Eisenhower Campaigning

BOSTON — (U.P.) — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's national campaign manager says the general will not make a "whistle-stop tour" before the Republican National Convention but will be "completely frank" in discussing political issues.

Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge Jr. (R-Mass.), leading the Eisenhower forces in a drive to capture the 38 delegate seats at stake in Tuesday's Massachusetts primary, told a Marblehead rally Friday night that when the general returns home in June he "will be completely free to discuss issues, and he will do exactly that."

"He will not hook a private car on the back of a train for a whistle-stop tour," Lodge said. "He will be himself, remain in character, and do things in his

regular way." Lodge did not disclose whether Eisenhower had scheduled any additional public appearances after his June 4 "homecoming" speech slated at Abilene, Kans.

The general's Washington campaign headquarters said he planned to spend "several weeks" in Denver, Colo., with Mrs. Eisenhower's mother.

Kaiser-Frazer Reports Loss on Auto Sales

DETROIT — (U.P.) — A 1951 net loss of \$12,300,000 was reported Friday by Kaiser-Frazer Corp.

The auto company's annual report reported sales for 1951 totaled \$145,652,685, compared with \$238,035,683 in 1950. It also showed production last year was 99,536 automobiles compared with 151,415 in 1950.

Drug Warfare Charges Made

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. — (U.P.) — America's top narcotics sleuth accused Red China Saturday of drug warfare against the U.N. in the Far East.

Harry J. Anslinger, U.S. narcotics commissioner, said he will present fully documented cases to prove his charge to the U.N. commission on narcotic drugs next week. Anslinger is the U.S. delegate to the commission.

He told a reporter the oriental Communists had a two-fold purpose: Selling habit-forming drugs to finance party activities and war materials, and spreading addiction to undermine the of U.S. and other troops Far East.

North Korean as well as Chinese Communists are involved in growing, smuggling and selling drugs, chiefly Heroin, Ans said. Japan is the principal Japanese Communist warehouse in the ring, he said.
