Club Forming At Santa Clara

New Park District Proposed for Area

Some 50 persons attended a
Monday night meeting to form a
civic club in the Santa Clara
community.

Those present in the Santa
Clara fire hall adopted a set of
by-laws, decided upon the second
Monday of each month for the
club's regular meeting date, and
elected a five-man committee to
nominate a slate of officers to be
voted at the first regular meeting.

All persons who reside in or
are interested in the Santa Clara
community are eligible for mem-
bership.

A brief discussion of the pro-
posed River Road-Santa Clara
park district took place. Petitions
for formation of such a district
have been circulated and the
necessary signatures obtained, but
they have not yet been submitted
to the Lane County Court. The

after receiving the petition before
an election on the issue could be
called.
