

Raver Predicts Need for Power

Northwest Faces Severe Shortage

SEATTLE — (AP) — The Pacific Northwest will face severe power shortages for the next eight years unless new federal projects are launched immediately, the American Power Assn. was told Wednesday. Paradoxically, this dark outlook exists in a region that has all over a third of the nation's potential hydroelectric resources.

Paul J. Raver, Bonneville Power Administrator, said in an address prepared for the association's annual meeting. Raver said the Northwest now has 3,000,000 kilowatts of power (year-around) power and will need 9,000,000 kilowatts by 1960, more than half the required new power is now assured, he said.

Federal projects now under construction will provide 2,400,000 kilowatts and non-federal projects public and private—another 2,000,000 kilowatts, Raver declared. He said non-federal projects in the planning stage could add another 340,000 kilowatts. This would still leave a deficit of 2,300,000 kilowatts, Raver said.

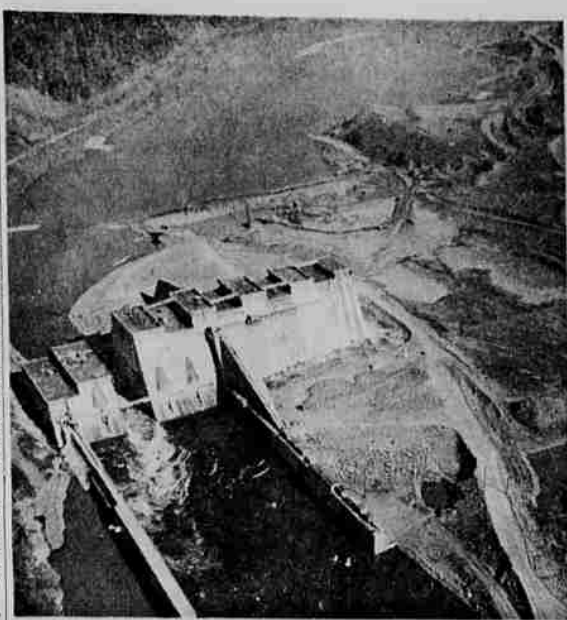
County Agent Warns Farmers Of Spittlebugs

Strawberry fields and flower beds should be checked for spittlebug damage, Lane County agents were advised this week by the County Agent's office. Young spittlebugs, called nymphs, are bright yellow in color and about 1/32 inch in length. They will be found in the tender, young parts of the plants. As they suck out the plant juice they create a liquid which produces a white froth or "spittle."

The insects vitalize plants, causing lower yields and deformities. They also attack a number of varieties of flowers. Recommended control measures are an application of 5 per cent DDT dust at the rate of 10 pounds per acre or 2 1/4 of 1 per cent rotenone dust at the rate of 50 pounds per acre.

The dust should be applied when egg hatching is nearly complete and the first fruit spur begins opening.

Labor Law Resume Heard by Rotarians

Eugene Rotarians Tuesday got a brief lesson in the history of "Labor Relations and the Law." Speaker was Dr. Paul L. Kleinsorge, professor of economics at the University of Oregon, who traced the history of labor and government since 1932.

Modern labor relations legislation, he said, began with the Federal Anti-Injunction Act, known popularly as the Norris-LaGuardia Act, which Congress passed in 1932. Enacted at a time when the labor movement in America was at a low ebb, the act spelled certain rights for unions, including the right to organize and to bargain without coercion. It also defined a labor dispute as possible even though the labor party in the dispute was not in an "employee-employer" relationship with management.

IN 1935, with the passage of the Wagner Act, labor got even broader rights, the professor who has had experience as a labor arbitrator said. It required employers to bargain in good faith with the unions, and in other ways sought to regulate the actions permitted by an employer. It did not seek to correct union abuses, because, as the professor said, the weak labor movement of that era had not had opportunity for abuses.

Under the act, however, labor flourished, he reminded the Rotarians, and abuses came up. So, in 1947, Congress passed the Taft-Hartley Act, aimed at correcting union abuses, while guaranteeing labor the more significant rights provided for in the Wagner Act.

UNDER THIS law, he said, both employer and union are answerable for practices the law deems unfair. The union is enjoined

from coercion, from discrimination against non-union members through the "closed shop," from engaging in secondary boycotts, from levying exorbitant dues, and from some "featherbedding."

The Taft-Hartley Law is not the end in American labor legislation, he predicted, since the dynamic American labor-management picture will always require new legislation geared to the needs of the time.

Labor relations, he concluded, are no longer a matter of private concern only. They have become matters of great public interest.
