

CC Students to Preach 'NCC Day'

On Sunday, May 4, will be the first of the Christian churches of the Northwest. Some 110 students from the local college program and from congregations in Montana, Idaho, Washington and Oregon will be present.

The Rev. Henry W. Peck, pastor of Blachly Memorial Church, writes: "Thanks for the writeup about our dedication last Sunday. The church was filled to overflowing with more than 400 attending."

Two national religious organizations, the Catholic Church and Youth for Christ, are making national blood-collecting campaigns. Youth for Christ's effort has been set by the Red Cross for the week of May 5 through 10 and their quota is 10,000 pints. Eugene YFC director Harvey Klapstein (President of Bible Standard Institute in Eugene) will have cards available for pledging, and the cards will be distributed at the rally Saturday evening. Also, YFC members will be active to obtain signatures, all week.

The Catholics have been asked by the Red Cross to circulate their pledge cards May 11, and the blood collection will be made June 12.

Most of the churches are having annual meetings and electing church officers staffs this week. There should be an interesting collection of stories for next week's church page, most of them showing impressive gains in membership and effectiveness over the past 12 months for the churches.

The Billy Graham western color-sound movie, "Mr. Texas" is being shown at the Eugene Hotel.

Churches on DST; NCC Speakers Out

It's "Daylight Sabbath Time" for Eugene and Springfield churches this coming Sunday, and no churches have announced special plans for standard time services except the Blachly Memorial Church By The Lake, at Triangle Lake; they will worship on standard time this Sunday only. Cottage Grove churches will be on standard time, as the city council there meets Monday and until then will take no DST action. Other town and rural churches have made no announcement and presumably will follow local procedure.

The Rev. Chas. A. Epple, president of the Eugene Ministerial Ass'n., says that there was some sentiment among the ministers to stay on standard time for this first Sunday only. Last year several churches did so. But this year the city council's action took place at mid-week, too late for thorough publicity to all members. Besides, some ministers have radio commitments or more than one church to serve; it was decided to make no concerted attempt for last minute action. So—roll out, kiddies, Sunday school is an hour early this week.

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Two Easterners Take "Pulpit" On Church Cast

Dr. Joseph H. Lookstein, rabbi of the Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun of New York, will be the first speaker on CBS Radio's "Church of the Air" Sunday, May 4 (KERG-CBS Radio, 6 a.m.). Music will be taken from the traditional Jewish ritual, and will be sung by Cantor Hyman Gertler.

The Rev. John H. Gardner Jr., pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Baltimore, Md., will be the speaker on the second half of the program. Dr. Gardner, taking his text from Matthew 12:43, will speak on "Life in an Empty Room." His church, one of the oldest in Baltimore, was founded in 1761. Music will be sung by the Choir of the First Presbyterian Church, directed and accompanied by Margaret P. Ingle.

KERG will carry the dedication of the Pacific Lutheran College Music Speech Building from Tacoma, Wash., 8-6:30 p.m. Sunday, May 4. Program will feature the formal dedication speech by Dr. S. C. Eastvold, president of the college.

Their apartment is well stocked with groceries and supplies donated through a committee of men of the church.
