Bradley Cites Red Strength

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Gen. Bradley told Congress Monday that Russia is building toward a peak of military strength which will make "the general period of 1954 the most dangerous" to U.S. security.

Bradley, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of staff, testified before a Senate appropriations subcommittee. He was opposing a House-approved ceiling of 46 billion dollars on U.S. defense spending in the year starting July 1. The Pentagon budget called for a spending program of 52 billions.

His prepared statement, read to the subcommittee at a closed door meeting, was made public by that group.
"Military considerations which today deter our enemies from war may have lost their deterring effect by the 1954 period," Bradley said.
"Our enemies will have capabilities of endangering our country—doing it most critical damage—at that time."
His implication was that U. S. atomic superiority may be lost by that date.

More Cancer Victims Saved

NEW YORK—(AP)—The Cancer Society Sunday reported doctors are saving one in every four cancer patients—and could possibly double this rate if treatments start in time.

The Society, in its annual report for 1951, said some 70,000 lives were saved last year. It said a higher recovery rate now is possible "without a lot of further knowledge" if the disease is caught early.

Consequently, the Society said, it tried last year to foster "a new national habit of health which looks beyond the traditional signs of illness to the possible presence of this deadly disease in a minor symptom."

Fifty million circulars listing cancer's "seven danger signals," were distributed as part of this public education project, the Society said. Radio and television programs and documentary films also were used.

The report said 700,000 men, women and children now are under treatment for cancer in the United States and added that about 215,000 Americans die of cancer each year.

Bakers' Strike Hits Portland

PORTLAND — (UP) — Portland was added Monday to the list of Pacific Northwest cities in the grip of a baker's strike as 650 workers walked off the job in 27 plants here.

Some restaurants began cutting down on the amount of bread served but no serious shortage

Spokesmen for major bakeries in Eugene said bread supplies should remain normal in local stores since contracts between management and the bakers do not expire until August in this area.

was expected immediately. Many small neighborhood and large stocks of bread were placed in cold storage last week in anticipation of the strike.

The strike was voted by the union Saturday after last minute talks failed to produce an agreement. They agreed, however, to continue negotiations during the strike. The Portland strike followed walkouts in Seattle, Spokane, Tacoma and Lewiston, Ida. Main issue is the Sunday shift. The union seeks an end to weekend work but employers say bread has to be baked on Sundays for the Monday trade.

Rare Whale Still Smells

SAN FRANCISCO — (AP) — A 20-foot - 2000-pound whale of floundered ashore Sunday, died, and immediately became a problem to area residents and civic officials.

Two highway patrolmen, called to the scene, notified the Coast Guard.

"That's the local health department's problem," the Coast Guard said.

The health department said disposal of the body, lying in the bright sunshine, was up to the city engineer. But the city engineer was not available for action.

Meanwhile the Navy had been contacted.

"Heavens, no, we don't want it," the Navy said.

The only person happy about the whale was Dr. Robert C. Miller, director of the California Academy of Sciences. It seems the mammal is of a rare species—it's a Genus Mesoplodon.

Residents of the area were not impressed.

U.S. Employees Low in Oregon

WASHINGTON — (AP)—Washington and Oregon rank ninth and 30th, respectively, among the 48 states and the District of Columbia in the number of paid government employees, the Civil Service Commission reports.

Washington had 68,098 civilians on the government payroll as of Dec. 31, 1951, and Oregon 18,268. The total for the two states was less than four per cent of the overall government payroll which numbered 2,518,137.

In both states, the largest single units were the military services. Washington had 44,273 persons on the Defense Department payroll, Oregon 4,723.

The Post Office Department employed 6,340 persons in Washington and 4,624 in Oregon. Veterans Administration had 3,542 workers in Washington and 1,903 in Oregon.

The remainder in each state are employed by miscellaneous government agencies and departments.

Lodge Interest Sold

PORTLAND—(AP)—Controlling interest in the lease of Timberline Lodge on Mt. Hood has been sold to Elston R. Ireland, Portland restaurant chain operator, and Carl R. and John McFadden, theatre operators.

The lodge has been operated by Timberline Lodge, Inc., comprised of a group of Portland business men, since it was built 14 years ago.
