

Market Burglar Gets 2 Years

Paramount Rifler Admits His Guilt

Clayton George Dunn, 23, Eugene, was sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary Monday after pleading guilty in Circuit Court to a charge of burglary not in a dwelling.

Dunn was arrested last month by Springfield police inside Paramount Market, 2090 Main St., Springfield. He admitted rifling two cash registers.

Meanwhile, in District Court Monday three men were arraigned on charges of assault and battery and one was charged with pointing a gun at another. All were released on their own recognizance after pleading not guilty. No hearing date has been set.

Harold P. Potter, 40, Rt. 1, Box 310, Cottage Grove; Howard D. Potter, 37, Lorane Rt., Cottage Grove; and Doris P. Potter, 67, Rt. 1, Cottage Grove, were charged with assault and battery.

Harold Potter was also charged with pointing a gun at another.

St. Louis Post-Dispatch Wins 5th Pulitzer Prize

NEW YORK — (AP) — St. Louis Post-Dispatch's exposure of corruption in the internal revenue department won that newspaper its fifth Pulitzer Prize Monday. No other newspaper ever won that many.

The 1952 Pulitzer award for fiction went to Herman Wouk's novel of the wartime Navy, "The Caine Mutiny," while Joseph Kramm's "The Shrike" won the stage drama award.

THE PULITZER prizes for journalism to individuals were doubled for the first time this year, being worth \$1000 apiece. Awards in the fields of arts and letters remained at \$500 apiece. Newspapers won a gold plaque.

The Post-Dispatch, published by the founder of the awards, the late Joseph Pulitzer, won previous prizes in 1937, 1941, 1948 and 1950.

It was cited again this year for disinterested and meritorious public service in its exposure of "shocking evidence of political immorality."

Other Pulitzer awards announced by Columbia trustees on recommendation of the advisory board of Columbia's graduate school of journalism were:

LOCAL REPORTING — George De Carvalho of the San Francisco Chronicle, for stories of a "ransom

racket" extorting money from Chinese in America who had relations in Red China.

NATIONAL REPORTING — Anthony Leviero of the New York Times, for an exclusive report on talks between President Truman and Gen. Douglas MacArthur at Wake Island during their 1950 conference. Leviero's exclusive was published April 21, 1951.

INTERNATIONAL REPORTING — John M. Hightower of the Associated Press, "for the sustained quality of his coverage of news of international affairs during the year." Diplomatic correspondent for the AP, Hightower last month won the Sigma Delta Chi prize and the Raymond Clapper award for the excellence of his work.

EDITORIAL WRITING — Louis La Coss of the St. Louis Globe-Democrat for his editorial entitled "The Low State of Public Morals." It echoed the deep concern of the average American over the West Point cheating scandals, the baseball fixing, the exposures of government corruption and the Kefauver Senate crime committee hearings.

CARTOONS — Fred L. Packer of the New York Mirror, for his cartoon "Your Editors Ought to Have More Sense Than to Print What I Say." It shows an irate President Truman pointing his finger at the Washington newspaper corns.

NEWS PHOTOGRAPHY — John Robinson and Don Ultang of the Des Moines Register and Tribune. Their sequence of six photos was taken at a Drake-Oklahoma A. & M. football game in which Negro Player Johnny Bright's jaw was broken.

HISTORY — Oscar Handlin's "The Uprooted," the epic story of the migrations that made America a great new world. Handlin is associate professor of history at Harvard University.

BIOGRAPHY — Merlo J. Pusey's "Charles Evans Hughes," a two-volume study of the late Chief Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court. Pusey is associate editor of the Washington Post.

POETRY — Marianne Moore's "Collected Poems," culled from three previous books of poetry. Born in St. Louis, she lives in Brooklyn and has been hailed by some admirers as "the most accomplished poetess in the English-speaking world today."

The occasion of the cartoon was President Truman's angry denunciation of newsmen for printed stories about guided missiles, atomic plants and pictures of aerial maps of American cities. Actually, it turned out that all the stories and photos had been released by the President, the Pentagon, the Atomic Energy Commission and other government agencies.

He called for a bulldozer and a truck. The whale was carted off to a tallow factory.

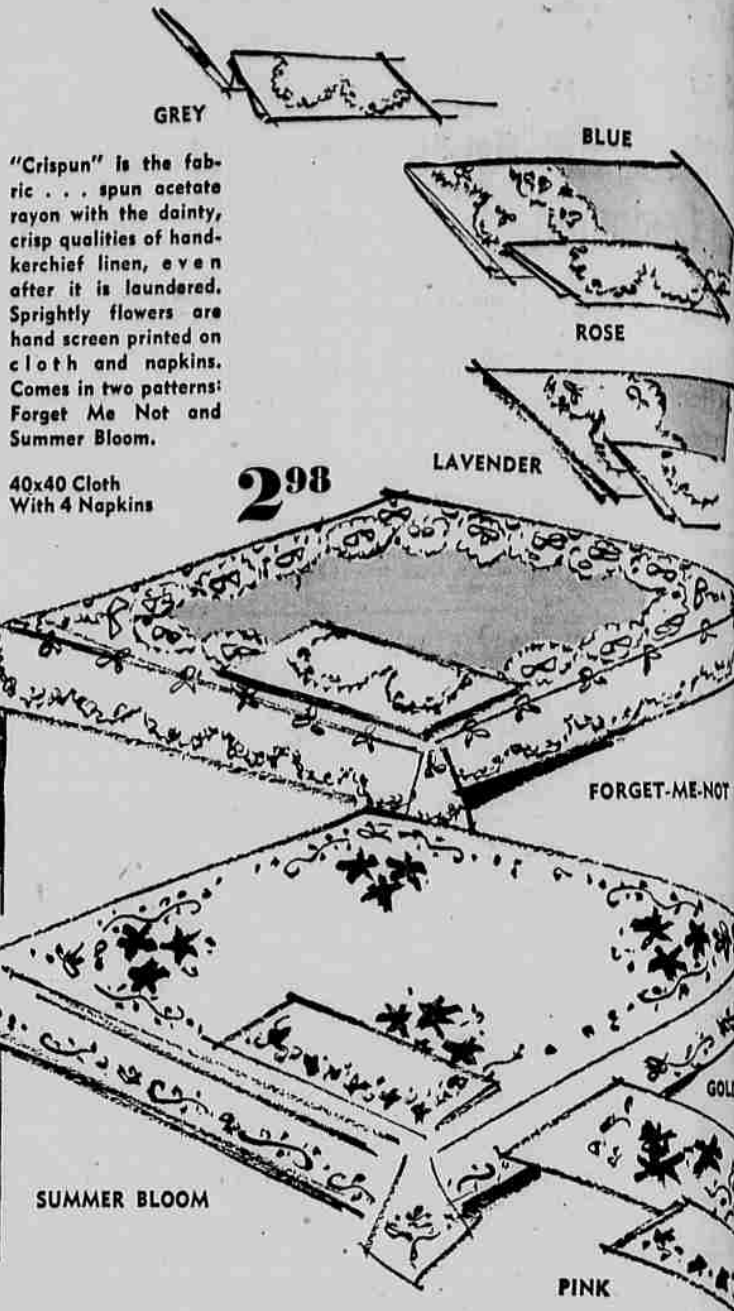
The tallow factory is happy. So are Oakland officials. They agreed with the scientist. The whale was a rare thing—too rare.

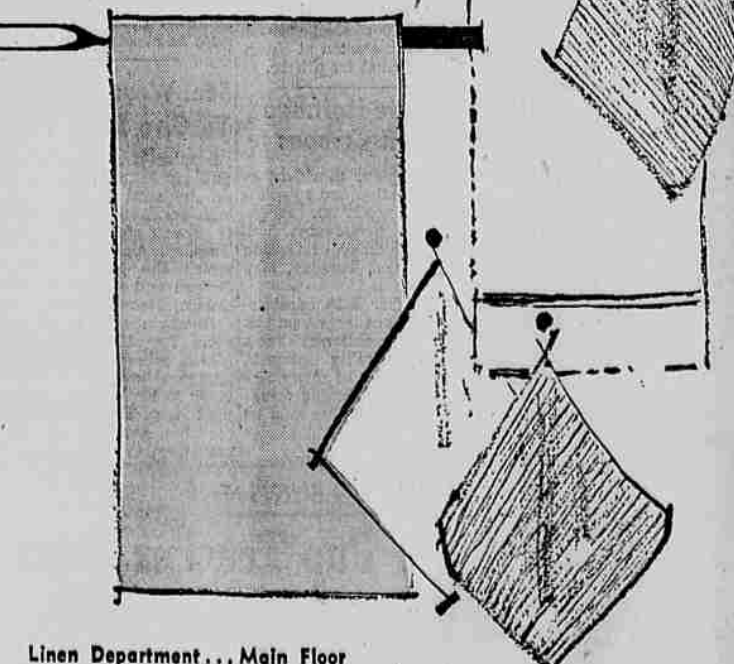

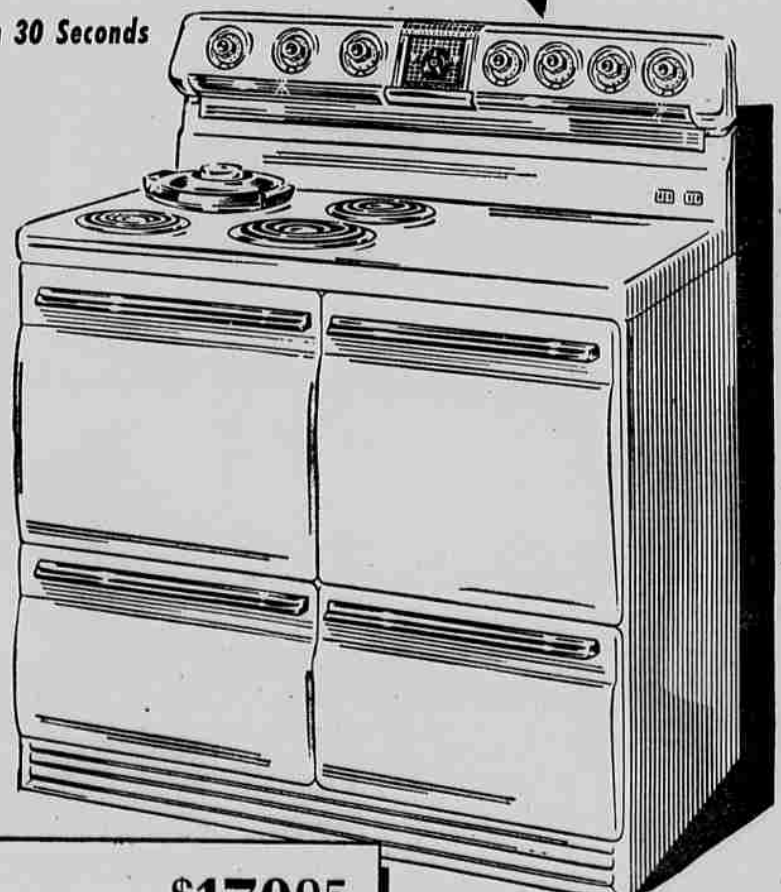
