

Angry Admiral Knocks Enemy Stalling Tactics

'Vicious Communist Propaganda Attack'

MUNSAN, Korea — (P) — The United Nations Command Monday sharply accused the Communists of using the Korea armistice talks for a propaganda sounding board.

A U.N. communique said the Reds fired "their most vicious propaganda attack of the 10-month-old armistice negotiations" in a 34-minute "tirade, obviously prepared in advance" and "filled with invective distortions and palpable lies."

Another plenary session was scheduled for 11 a.m. Tuesday.

BUT VICE Adm. C. Turner Joy, senior U. N. delegate, told the Reds the U. N. Command "formally disassociates itself from the propaganda purposes for which you are utilizing these meetings."

North Korean Gen. Nam Il delivered the blast at the U.N. command.

It was studied with Red accusations that the Allies mistreated Red prisoners of war.

Never before had newsmen covering the negotiations in Panmunjom seen the usually mild-mannered admiral so angry.

After the 52-minute session Joy said:

"We were subjected today to one of the most vicious propaganda blasts we have ever had. The Communists told us in effect that unless we intend to disrupt the meetings they would insist on meeting every day and use these meetings overtly for propaganda although they did not use those words."

Nam Il again rejected Joy's proposal for an indefinite recess until the Communists have something concrete to offer.

BRIG. GEN. William P. Nuckols, U. N. spokesman, said the Reds have instructions to insist on continuing the talks and "to utilize them entirely for a propaganda sounding board. This appears to be a course of action."

The talks are tightly deadlocked over the exchange of prisoners. The United Nations command has demanded voluntary repatriation of POWs.

The Reds have insisted that all held by the U.N. be returned by force if necessary.

More than half the Red prisoners held by the Allies have said they will forcibly resist being returned to Red rule.

ESCAPEE COSTS DEPUTY MONEY

Oil Workers Set Talks Tuesday

DENVER — (P) — Union leaders called Monday for a tightening of a nation-wide strike of about 90,000 oil workers as union and industry officials headed for a Washington conference Tuesday.

The conference was called by the Wage Stabilization Board to talk over ways and means of ending the walkout, now in its 13th day.

The coalition of striking unions turned down a request by the board to send its men back to work, pending the conference. CIO Oil Workers International Union officials of eight midwestern states met at Toledo, Ohio, Sunday and agreed to "tighten up picketing at all points where it may be legal to do so."

Officials of western states which rely heavily upon motorists for their tourist trade expressed fears that the oil strike, if prolonged, would cut sharply into lucrative summer business.

In California, the independent Union of Petroleum Workers signed an agreement for wage increases with the Standard Oil Co. of California. However, this union has not been involved in the strike called April 30.

GOP Delegates Protest Ike List

Ten "Favored" Candidates Chosen

PORTLAND — (P) — Protests were voiced Monday by some of the 34 candidates for delegate-at-large to the Republican national convention who were not among the "favored" 10 candidates recommended for voter support by the Oregon-for-Eisenhower organization.

"A flagrant example of the sabotage of our election laws," said Sid Woodbury, one of the delegate candidates not included in the list.

The list was announced Saturday in a move to elect a solid slate of Ike supporters in the May 16 primary election.

THE EISENHOWER committee explained the move was "due to the confusion created by eight candidates who filed under an outmoded 1905 law to avoid a pledge to support the choice of the voters" in the election.

William L. Phillips of Salem, chairman of the Oregon-for-Eisenhower committee, explained that selection of the 10 delegates followed a recommendation made by Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., of Massachusetts that the slate be adopted.

"It was a decision awfully hard for some of us to agree with," said Phillips.

"SENATOR Lodge apparently has been ill advised in his attempt to tell the voters of Oregon who the ten delegates-at-large to the Republican convention shall be," said a statement by a group of Portlanders protesting the slate.

The chosen 10 were: Howard C. Belton, Canby; Zylpha Zell Burns, Portland; Robert A. Elliott, Medford; Mark Hatfield, Salem; William M. McAllister, Medford; Gov. Douglas McKay, Salem; Sen. Wayne Morse, Eugene; H. Clay Myers, Portland; Gordon D. Orput, Portland and Lamar Tooez, Portland.

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Warplanes Rip Up Rail Network With Saturation Bombings

SEOUL, Korea — (P) — United Nations warplanes Monday blasted the North Korean rail network with another of their new saturation bombings designed to make track repairs as tough as possible for the Reds.

The U. S. Fifth Air Force said fighter-bombers made 28 cuts in a short stretch on the vital Kanggye-Sinanju line near Hui-chon in the northwest.

Nine U. S. B29s hit the Hui-chon

on the main lines.

This makes repair work more difficult for the Red track crews, who have been able overnight to

repair cuts by only a few bombs.

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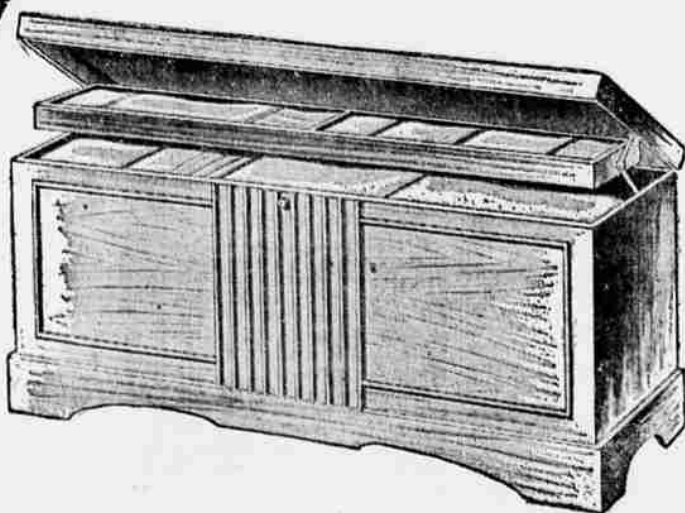
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
