In Bloody Riot 'Political' Parley

Commies Protest West German Arms

ESSEN, Germany—(AP)—Police gunfire broke up a bloody clash Sunday between anti-Reds and 30,000 Communist youths demonstrating here against the rearming of West Germany for European defense. A 21-year-old Communist youth from Munich was killed.

It was the first time in West Germany's postwar history that anyone had been killed in clashes between police and rioters.

Scores of demonstrators, who had filtered into the city despite a police ban and rigid control efforts, were injured—at least two of them seriously. Several others, bloodied by police clubs, were arrested.

THE BLOODSHED climaxed a series of street fights throughout the day between the Communist "peace caravan"—made up of youths from all over West Germany—and members of the anti-Communist Christian Workers' Youth organization.

Police said they opened fire only after the Communist started shooting.

In Berlin, the Soviet-licensed news agency, ADN, charged the police fired first and called them "brutes who attacked the youths with steel clubs and bloodhounds." The agency claimed West German police had also shot one of their own colleagues.

GERHART EISLER, East German press chief, called a special news conference for Monday to denounce the shooting. For the first time in months, western correspondents were invited to cross into the Soviet sector to attend.

The rioting appeared to have been carefully planned by Communist Party leaders as this war-damaged Ruhr industrial city celebrated its 1,110th birthday.

State authorities had banned the proposed Communist meeting and road controls were set up on all highways into Essen. Many youths were stopped at the outskirts of the city, but some 30,000 managed to sneak through and gather in the center of the city.

Red newspapers in advance had declared that "resistance is the only answer" to the ban and urged their followers to fight with all their means against the impending peace contract which is expected to be signed soon between the Western Allies and Chancellor Adenauer's Bonn regime.

ESSEN APPEARED to have been chosen for the demonstration because it is the old symbol of German cannon makers and its ill-housed workers include a larger percentage of Communists than most Ruhr cities.

The violence bore a close resemblance to the May Day Red riots in Tokyo in which two were killed and 1,454 were injured.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Gov. Dewey of New York said Sunday a talk with Secretary of State Acheson and Supreme Court Justice Frankfurter Saturday night was not a "conference" and they did not discuss Republican support of foreign aid or the Far Eastern policy.

Dewey, Acheson and Frankfurter talked in a Washington hotel, and reports of the meeting indicated Acheson had urged that a Republican nominee support the administration's foreign aid program.

The reports also said Dewey expressed objections to Acheson's Far Eastern program.

DEWEY, who is supporting Gen. Eisenhower for the Republican presidential nomination, denied on a television show Sunday that these subjects were discussed.

He said the conversation was "as secret as if we'd held it in Macy's window"—referring to the big New York department store—and added that "twenty-five other people were within five feet of us."

Jack Bell, Associated Press political writer who reported the talks, commented later that he was one of two reporters who saw the conference in progress.

BELL said no other persons were in the large conference room except themselves and a hotel attendant at the far end of the room from where the conferees sat.

Bell said the conference lasted much longer than the time mentioned by Dewey.

Discussion of foreign policy problems was heard by both reporters, Bell said, before they left the room to wait outside for the conference to break up.

A spokesman for Acheson said the secretary had no comment.

Asked if they had discussed foreign policy, Dewey replied: "How can you meet the Secretary of State and not talk foreign policy?"

EISENHOWER, he said, is the man who "knows where the bodies are buried in the Pentagon."

Dewey was asked if he would be able to advise Eisenhower on the basis of his own unsuccessful race for the presidency in 1948.

He said the Democrats would not be able again to frighten the farmers just before the election, as he charged, they did in 1948.

Saying they "pulled the plug out from under corn, hogs and beans" in an effort to "convince the farmers what would happen if the Republicans got in," Dewey added: "If they try it again this time, they're going to get caught."

Flood Relief Drive Asked

Board Accepts Remodeling Bid

Albert Vik and Son Wins \$31,495 Job

Chances that a special Red Cross drive to relieve flood victims in the Missouri Valley would be conducted in Lane County were uncertain Monday.

Charles Gillilan, president of the Lane County chapter, said he had been asked by Averill Harriman, national president, to conduct a special campaign for flood victims.

But, Gillilan said, he had hesitated to organize such a drive because the regular annual drive was so recent. The drive, which went through March, realized \$85,000 of a \$100,000 goal.

Gordon Coleman, chairman of the 1952 fund campaign, said Monday he hoped additional funds would continue to come in from outlying parts of the county to fulfill the goal.

The low bid of Albert Vik and Son Construction Co. was accepted recently by the Eugene School Board for the construction of one room, a new heating plant, corridor extension, bank of toilets, and remodeling of the old heating plant at Willagillespie School.

Vik's low bid was \$31,495 as compared to \$33,730 by H. L. Shields, \$34,026 by Arnt Ree and son, and \$36,282 by Waldo Hardy and son.

The board also accepted the low bid of Willard S. Stoneburner, \$1,978, for installation of a fire line in four fire plugs behind the new high school.

Other bidders on that job were T. C. Wildish, \$1,980.70, and Coast Construction and Excavation Co., \$2,000.

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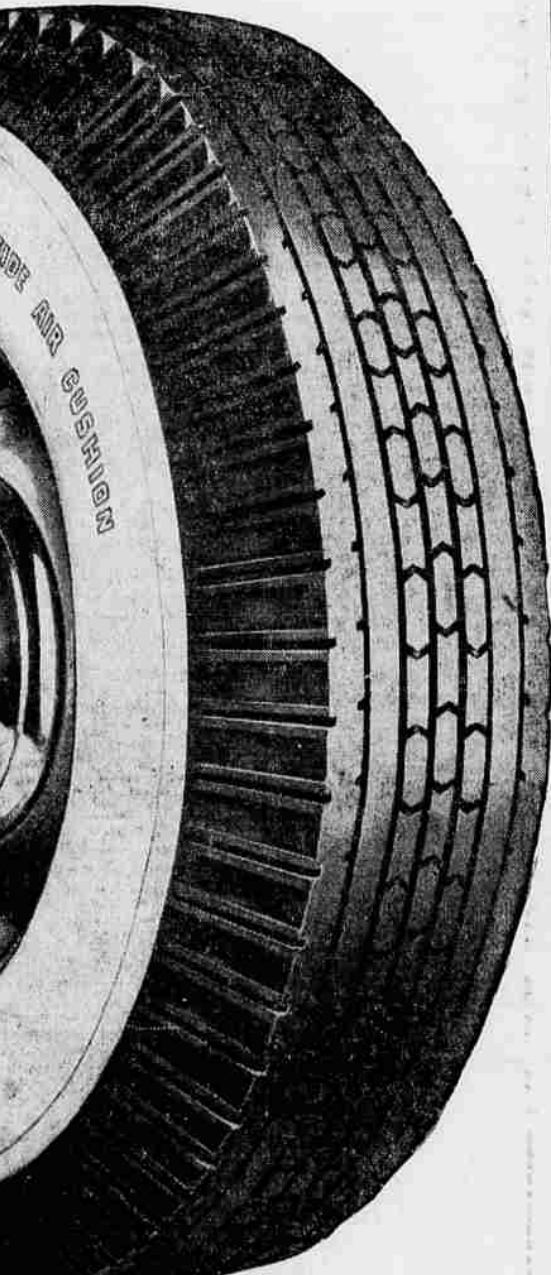
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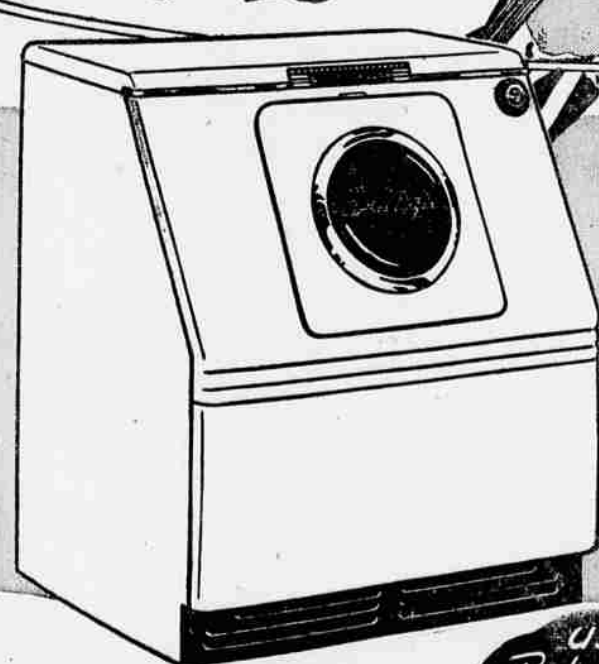
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
