Huskies Score Winning Tally On Hit Batter

SEATTLE—A hit batsman with the bases loaded in the eighth inning gave Washington a 5-4 victory over Oregon's league-leading Webfoots here Monday.

The Webfoots and Oregon State's defending champions are tied in wins and losses, but they still pay off on percentages — and Oregon is ahead. The second game of the series was scheduled Tuesday.

A sharp single by Bill Stuhdt and "bleeder" infield singles by Bill Earley and Roland Halle filled the bases for the Huskies in the bottom of the eighth — and it was then that Bill "Fireman" Mays hit Tom Absher to score Stuhdt with that proved to be the winning run.

FEW OF WASHINGTON'S 11 hits were well "tagged," while Oregon was getting the "long ball" with first baseman Tom Phillips collecting a double and triple, and Darryl Nelson a double and single — all well hit.

Oregon took the lead in the first inning when Nick Schermer singled and scored ahead of Phillips' triple. The Huskies tallied three in the fifth when Stuhdt singled and advanced on Earley's sacrifice. Halle punched a dribbler through the third-short stop, scoring Stuhdt.

Pitcher Bob Bell hit the same clot then Larry Hens hit a triple over Joe Sugura's head in right field for two more runs and a 3-1 lead.

A SINGLE by Nelson and a double by Don Siegmund scored one for Oregon in the seventh, but the Huskies came back in the same inning when Absher singled through the infield, Hens walked and Sam Mitchell was safe on a fielder's choice. With Absher on third and two away, Catcher Ron Bottler, attempting to pick Mitchell off first, three wild pitches and Absher scored.

Oregon deadlocked the count in the eighth. Norv Ritchey singled and went to third on Bill Bottler's pinch double. Schermer flied out, Ritchey holding. Nelson then doubled in two runs for a 4-4 tie, setting the stage for Washington's winning score.

HIGHCLIMBER

★ There were ten outstanding performances in track meets involving Northern Division athletes over the weekend, but while the new form chart makes many individual shifts, comparative times, distances and heights still establish Washington as the favorite for the championship at Seattle next Saturday afternoon.

Oregon State gained 5 1/2 points and Oregon a half point over the estimated team point totals over the form chart of last week, WSC losing 3 1/2, Washington 1 1/2, and Idaho one point. This is unusual in view of WSC's 77-54 dual meet triumph over the Huskies at Pullman last Saturday.

Best performances of the season last weekend were: Jack Smith's 9.6 in the 100-yard dash for Oregon (against the wind), Clint Richardson's 21.1 in the 220 for WSC, Pete Dufour's 49.1 in the 440 for Washington, Bob Forna's 4:19.6 mile for Washington, Neil Radar's 9:25.6 two-mile for WSC, Jack Morris' 23.8 in the low hurdles for Washington, Emery Barnes' 6-foot, 8-inch high jump for Oregon, Lyle Dickey's 13-foot, 10 1/2-inch pole vault for OSC, and Chuck Missfeldt's 219-foot, 1-inch javelin throw for Oregon (in the Fresno Relays).

... Add Jack Hutchins' 1:54.2 in the 880 for Oregon, a second-best time.

One of the reasons for the change in points from last week was the identity of Jim Holmes, originally listed from WSC now identified from OSC.

★ Had Saturday's Oregon-OSC meet been decided on first places, Oregon would have needed the relay victory to win. Both schools registered seven firsts in individual events. ... Barnes, if Uncle Sam doesn't tap him on the shoulder, may be an Olympic contender should he improve as rapidly as he has since the start of the season. He had never done better than 6-2 in competition until this year.

We can well imagine that the performance of Jack Smith against OSC was just as pleasing, if not more so to Coach Bill Bowerman as was Barnes' tremendous high jump. ... Jack had not been up to par all season.

Don't count too much on the form chart for the ND meet. ... For example, we're rather certain Bill Fell will do better than third in the 220, that Jack Hutchins might well win the 880, that Al Martin will place better than fourth in the mile. ... On the other hand, there are athletes at other schools probably capable of performances better than the form chart shows. ... The answer—whether or not they have competitive spirit in the "clutch."

Oregon could come in for a banner spring sports year. ... Don Kirsch's "juggling pitching staff" has been sailing along nicely and could win the right to host the California winner in the PCC playoffs here. ... Sid Milligan's golfers certainly have demonstrated their ability to cop the Northern Division title at Moscow next weekend, and Bowerman's thinclads have a good chance in Seattle despite Washington's 4 1/2-point "form chart" margin.

The Tigers, however, will try to gain strength even if it means trading such stars as George Kell, Hoot Evers, Johnny Groth or Vic Wertz.

Pollard Hurls 9-2 Win Over Cascade Union

ALBANY — Junction City clinched the overall District 5-A-2 baseball title here Monday afternoon when the Tigers topped Cascade Union 9-2. Junction City won the southern district crown while Cascade was the northern 5-A-2 champion.

The victory by Don Ruecker's club also clinched a spot for a Lane County team in the state baseball playoffs here May 22-24. The Tigers will meet the District 5-A-1 titlist, either Eugene or Springfield, for the tourney berth.

Junior righthander Bill Pollard, although plagued with streaks of wildness, notched his eighth straight victory without a loss this spring. This was Junction's 11th win in 12 starts under Ruecker, in his first year at the baseball helm.

THE TIGERS left little doubt as to the outcome by blasting out four runs in the first inning to charge Cascade starter W. Wipper with the loss. Chet Hatfield opened the contest by reaching base on catcher's interference.

Larry Barger followed by lining a double to left-centerfield. Ray Stuckrath's walk loaded the bases when Bob Todd, Junction's leading hitter, stepped to the plate. Todd promptly rapped out a two-bagger down the right side of the diamond to bat in two runs. Catcher Eric Jacobson then unloaded a single to centerfield, scoring the final pair of markers in the inning.

Junction drove W. Wipper to cover in the second inning after Hatfield singled, stole second and continued to third on the catcher's wild throw. After Barger drew a base on balls, Stuckrath flied out to left field, Hatfield scoring after the catch.

THE COUGARS closed the gap to 5-2 in the bottom of the third. After Pollard fanned the first two batters, Dalke and Bates walked. F. Wipper banged out a long single for the two runs. Waldrop followed with a ground-rule double which bounced under the fence, but Pollard got out of the inning without any further damage when he caught Gjesdal's short popper.

Again in the fourth inning, Cascade had all the makings of a rally when two batters reached base on walks. But again Pollard hurled out of the difficulty. Junction City clinched the contest with three more runs in the sixth frame. Hatfield again started the damage—as he did in each of the Tigers' scoring innings—by reaching first on the shortstop's error. Barger's ground out advanced him to second from where he scored on Stuckrath's hit.

On the throw-in, Stuckrath continued to second base, and was quickly chased across the plate by Todd's single. Todd moved around to third and came in with the Tigers' third tally of the inning on Jacobson's squeeze sacrifice.

THE LAST JUNCTION, in the seventh, scored when Hatfield again was awarded base on catcher's interference, stole second, and tallied on Barger's second double of the contest.

In fashioning a three-hit victory, Pollard struck out 10 Cascade batters. He walked five, and eleven Cascade runners stranded.

Majors Head Into 2nd Month's Play

The burden of proof is on the Giants, Dodgers and Indians to show that they can keep up their terrific first month's pace through the remainder of the major league season.

As the teams squared off for the second month of competition, the evidence was against their doing it. That was in spite of the fact that after four weeks of play they definitely looked like the three best teams in operation this year.

But it was necessary only to go back to last season to see that slow starting teams can hit the stretch at full speed and beat out the sprinters.

THE GIANTS at this stage a year ago, when they had bogged down in an 11-game losing streak, were in last place with a 7-13 won and lost record. Today, they are off to their best start since the 1945 wartime season with a 15-5 record. But in 1945 at this time they were 16-4 and went on to make it 20-5 before they faded. And fade they did, winding up in fifth place.

Manager Leo Durocher, remembering last year's dismal start, deliberately paced the Giants more slowly in spring training this year and they hit their peak as the season got underway. Whether they can maintain the pace all year is a question to be answered, but they do have terrific pitching with Sal Maglie, Larry Jansen and Jim Hearn, their big three all unbeaten.

Cleveland also has had superlative pitching from its great quartet of Bob Lemon, Bob Feller, Early Wynn and Mike Garcia, plus two standout spot jobs from old-timer Steve Gromek. The Indians have to get tight pitching because of a so-so defensive infield and a hitting attack that blows hot and cold.

BROOKLYN, despite a prolonged hitting slump, has stood up within a game of the pace-setting Giants because it has received better than expected pitching, especially from such youngsters as Billy Loes and John Rutherford in relief.

The Giants are home from their best road trip since 1916 when they won 26 games in a row on

Ellsworth Vines, the ex-tennis champion, now a golf pro at the Wilshire Club, turned in the lowest score for the 36-hole tests when he carded a seven-under par 135. He stroked the first 18 in 69 and went around in the afternoon in 66.

Brownies, Nats Complete Trade

NEW YORK — (U.P.) — Washington continued its role Monday as the "trading" club in the majors by swapping Secondbaseman Cass Michaels to the St. Louis Browns for Pitcher Lou Sleater and Infielder Fred Marsh.

The latest transaction brought the total of new Washington players to eight since they began bartering with the New York Yankees ten days ago. Four Washington players went elsewhere.

The new Washington players include Outfielder Jackie Jensen and Archie Wilson, Pitcher Frank Shea and Infielder Jerry Snyder from the Yankees and Outfielder Jim Busby and Infielder Mel Hoderlein from the Chicago White Sox.

In addition to giving up Michaels to St. Louis the Senators also shipped Outfielder Sam Mele to Chicago, and Outfielder Irv Noren and Infielder Tommy Upton to the Yanks. New York immediately transferred Upton's contract to its Kansas City club in the American Assn.

Four other clubs figured in player swaps Monday. The Browns re-acquired Pitcher Stubby Overmire from the Yanks for the waiver price and the Boston Red Sox purchased Catcher Del Wilber from the Philadelphia Phillies in "excess" of the \$10,000 waiver price.

That was not the extent of major league activity. The Yanks optioned Andy Carey, their \$80,000 bonus thirdbaseman, and Pitcher Art Schallack to Kansas City.

The Yanks also reported sophomore righthander Tom Morgan had passed his Army physical and will report for duty shortly.

The Red Sox optioned Pitcher Ralph Brickner to their Louisville American Assn. team.
