SAN FRANCISCO — (U.P.) — Pacific Coast League clubs started unloading their "dead wood" Tuesday as the deadline neared for the major leagues to reduce to the player limit on Sunday, May 18. San Diego, which has been crying for additional help while leading the league, expects to get a lot of aid for Lefty O'Doul; Sacramento has additional talent coming from player trades to the majors; Hollywood and Los Angeles will get new faces from their parent teams, the Pittsburgh Pirates and the Chicago Cubs; Seattle has more help coming from the Chicago White Sox.

The Oakland A's Tuesday released veteran Outfielder Danny Litwiler and Pitcher Lou Tost, who had been on the reserve list. That cut the A's roster to 21. The PCL player limit is 23.

Preparing for the big exchange, Hollywood lost Outfielder Gus Bell back to the parent Pirates; and the Angels started receiving reinforcements in the person of Leon Brinkopf, who was their regular third baseman and "most valuable player" in the 1951 season.

Marciano Posts 3rd Round KO

PROVIDENCE, R.I. — (U.P.) — Rocky Marciano of Brockton, Mass., knocked out Bernie Reynolds of Fairfield, Conn., in two minutes, 21 seconds of the third round Monday night before 4,528 fans at the Rhode Island Auditorium in a scheduled 10-round bout.

Scoring his 36th knockout in 40 professional fights, Marciano brought an abrupt end to the contest when he stepped back from a clinch and drove an overhand right to Reynolds' chin. Reynolds crumpled to the canvas and took the full count stretched full length on his back.

In the first round Reynolds, former New England heavyweight titlist, carried the fight to Marciano and scored frequently at long range with left jabs and crossing rights. Marciano came to life in the second round and flailed rights and lefts to the body as Reynolds countered with left hooks and jabs.

Top Major League Averages

Batting

NEW YORK — (U.P.) — Two veteran "money players," shortstop Phil Rizzuto of the New York Yankees and Second Baseman Jackie Robinson of the Brooklyn Dodgers, took the American and National League batting derbies Tuesday.

Rizzuto, last of the Yankee "old guard," and Robinson each enjoyed a seven-point lead. Rizzuto is hitting .351, and Robinson .393.

The top ten in each league underwent a shakeup with exactly half of last week's leaders dropping from the list. Bob Nieman, the fine looking outfielder of the St. Louis Browns, tailed off from a pace-setting .424 to .295.

Rizzuto's nearest opponents are Al Rosen of Cleveland, steadily improving his position in a move from fifth, and Dom, the last of the DiMaggios. They're tied for second at .344. Rosen also leads with eight homers and 20 runs batted in.

Pitching

NEW YORK (U.P.) — Pitchers Sal Maglie of the New York Giants and Mike Garcia of the Cleveland Indians Tuesday boasted the best earned run averages in the Major Leagues.

Figures released by the Associated Press' new statistical bureau disclosed that Maglie, ace of the Giants' strong mound corps, has yielded only seven runs—five earned—in 44 innings for a phenomenal 1.02 earned run percentage.

Garcia, surrendered 12 runs, seven earned, in 54 innings for a 1.17 percentage, to top the American League. The Indians right-hander has won four games and lost two. Figures include games of Sunday, May 11.

Rookie Bill Henry of the Boston Red Sox with 4-0 and Maglie with 5-0 are the top winning pitchers among many with unbeaten records.
