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Teacher Training Stressed by UO

Every department in the University of Oregon is offering courses which are specifically prepared to meet the needs of elementary or secondary school teachers in its 1952 Summer Session from June 16 until August 29.

The regular summer session will last for eight weeks from June 23 to August 15, but a post session of two weeks is provided for graduate students in education who wish three additional hours by reading and conference.

Ninety-five members of the regular university faculty have been chosen to teach. In addition, a visiting faculty of 35 professors will be present.

Among the outstanding visiting professors will be Dr. John S.

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Carroll, West Texas Technological Institute and Dr. Howard Dawson, director of rural education for the National Association. These men will direct the workshop for county superintendents scheduled August 11 through 16.

IN PHYSICAL education, Johnny Wooden, basketball coach at the University of California at Los Angeles, and Leo R. Meyer, football coach at Texas Christian University, will lead the coaching school. Lloyd Falkren, San Diego public schools, and Frank S. Lloyd, director of physical education and recreation, City College of New York, will teach.

Visiting professors in library training are Mrs. Carson McGuire, school librarian in Austin, Texas; and Miss Lottie Lamb, University high school librarian. The training workshop for high school librarians will be directed by Dr. Carl W. Hintz, university librarian.

The program in the journalism school is designed especially for teachers who are responsible for high school courses for newspapers and yearbooks, and will feature three visiting professors. They are Dr. Ralph O. Nafziger, director of the University of Wisconsin School of Journalism; Bernice Conolly and Amarelle Barnes, instructors at DePaul University school.

THE UNIVERSITY offers a complete series of courses to train for elementary classroom teachers. Courses fulfilling the requirements for all administrative and supervisory credentials required in the state of Oregon are given.

Visiting professors in the School of Education are Dr. James D. Logsdon, principal of Shorewood High School, Shorewood, Wis.; Dr. Dean Lobaugh, assistant superintendent of schools in Eugene; Dr. Harold Spears, assistant superintendent of schools in San Francisco; Dr. William C. Jorday, elementary school principal in San Francisco; Dr. George Hayward, principal of Elmwood School, East Orange, New Jersey; Miss Bette Ann Roth, assistant professor of education at Iowa State Teachers College.

Dr. Aldon Blankenship, superintendent of schools in Tacoma, Wash.; Dr. John L. Bracken, superintendent of schools in Clayton, Missouri; Donal L. Kruzner, King County deputy superintendent of schools; Dr. Clarence Hines, superintendent of schools, Eugene; Dr. Wendell Van Loan, superintendent of schools in Corvallis; Dr. William C. Jones, dean of administration at the University of Oregon; and Miss Helen Prouty, assistant professor of education, San Diego State College.

TWO SPECIAL workshops are given in this year's summer session. One is in the field of alcohol

education and the other is in the field of family life education.

Sponsored by the Oregon Liquor Control Commission, the workshop in alcohol education will be under the direction of Mr. Kenneth Ferrier, assistant professor of education in the general extension division.

The E. C. Brown Trust is making the workshop on family life education available to summer session students. Headed by Dr. Lester A. Kirkendall, Oregon State College, the workshop will feature Mrs. Ruth Osborne of Hinsdale, Ill., and Curtis E. Avery of the E. C. Brown Trust, as assistants.

In special education, Dr. Edgar Doll, coordinator of research in the Devereau Schools, Devon, Pa., has been named leader. Prof. Pat A. Killgallon, University of Oregon, will be in charge of the project, assisted by Mrs. Verna Hogg and Dr. Walter Snyder, both of the State Department of Education, Salem.

RAY WOLF, supervisor of social studies in the Portland Public Schools, and Paul Kamby, professor of education at the university, will conduct a workshop for Eugene teachers in language arts, social science, science and mathematics.

The Elementary School Principals' Conference, June 16 to 27, will feature Dr. Donald J. Patterson, of the United States Office of Education; Dr. Inga McDaniels, psychologist in the San Bernardino County public schools and Dr. Lorene Fox, Queens College, New York City. Dr. Gordon McCloskey, Washington State College, will also take part in the program.

In psychology, one visitor, Dr. Alfred Baldwin, associate professor of psychology at the University of Kansas, will supplement the university faculty.

They will conduct a series of workshops June 16 through June 27.

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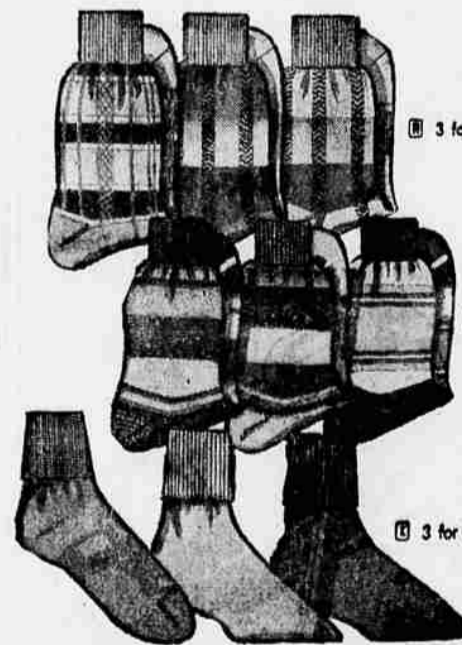
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
