

Healthy Sailor Court-Martialed

**Former Executive
Claims "Inequality"**

SEASIDE HARBOR — (AP) — A prosecutor told a court today that a wealthy seaman who tried to get regulations changed to get peace-time lumber executives from Newark, N. J., is being court-martialed against Navy discipline and trying to publicly discredit superior officers.

TRIAL is an outgrowth of a case in which Hopping has been charged with "inequality," which he says is Navy through "brass-bound inequality."

Richard J. Sieman, of the court Hopping used to be in the U.S.S. Resolute in an effort to discredit Lt. commanding officer, Lt. C. Kilpatrick of Waterbury, N. Y.

Secrecy Veil Lifted On Global Bomber

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Air Force partially lifted the secrecy surrounding its eight-jet B-52 "Global" bomber Tuesday.

Boeing Airplane Co. was permitted to reveal the swept-wing ship's outside dimensions, showing it to be half again as large as the six-jet B-47 atomic bomber and somewhat smaller than the B-36.

The Air Force conceded it no longer is "practical" to try hiding certain details about the B-52 Stratofortress, which Secretary Thomas K. Finletter has made a test case for its security views. He contends aircraft technical information helps the enemy but does not interest the public, and that "nothing will be revealed that does not have to be revealed as a practical matter."

Now that the ship is being flight tested at Seattle, Wash., Boeing can distribute pictures that have not been doctored to conceal certain features, as was the case with the first pictures five months ago.

The newly-announced dimensions show the plane to be 153 feet long, 48 feet high at the tail and 185 feet in wing span. It was also

\$600,000 Bond Issue Asked For New Schools

Eugene school district voters will be asked June 16 to approve a \$600,000 bond issue to finance a new junior high, the first unit on a new River Road school, and if enough funds remain, to start on an Augusta St. school.

The election will be June 16, at the regular school board member election.

The \$600,000, if approved, would be retired at the rate of \$200,000 a year, and would start in 1953. The serial levy of \$200,000 a year voted for the high school will end June 30, 1953, so there will be no change in millage rate if the bond issue is approved.

THE BOARD spent much of the meeting time Monday night deciding on furniture for the new high school. In most cases J. K. Gill Co., Portland, was the successful bidder.

The board approved the purchase of 820 folding chairs, 96 tablet arm chairs, 340 chair-desks, 54 teachers' desks and 120 matching chairs, two typewriter desks, and library furniture.

Decisions are still to be made on 1,600 pupil chairs, 65 folding tables, 12 table trucks, and 70 pupil desks.

Value of the furniture purchased Monday is \$26,336.

Although most other business was routine, the board did hear a report on the formation of a local teachers' union in Eugene. The board members were told that so far only four teachers have joined.

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ROSEBURG have local teacher unions in Oregon.

Representatives of the teamsters' local met with about 35 of the teachers here last week. The four main points of the union platform, the board was told, are that salaries should be equal to those in skilled trades, a teacher's work week should be defined, extra-curricular duties should be limited, and a labor member should be elected to the school board.

Legally, the board cannot make any official act regarding the unionization of district employees.

SIX TEACHER resignations were accepted, most for personal reasons. Elnora Aydelott, Jean Coley, Margaret Harvey, Phyllis Hopkins, David White, and Barbara Wolfe are the resigning teachers. Three new teachers were elected.

The board also approved the transfer of Paul Burch, social living teacher at Eugene High to vice-principal and teacher at Colin Kelly.

A request from the Washington School PTA asking that the board accept easements for a gravel sidewalk near the school was rejected. The board feared that if the easements, which had been obtained by the PTA in the board's name, were accepted and someone were injured on the walk that the district insurance would not apply. The problem of maintenance and precedent also affected the board's decision.

THE BOARD adopted the 1952-53 school calendar, which indicates that school will start Sept. 8 and end June 9. A two-week Christmas vacation is scheduled. Cooks at the district's schools were ordered to be on duty at any time their lunchrooms and kitchens are in use. They will be paid for their services by the organization using the rooms, with the exception of PTA dinners or refreshment periods. The district will assume the cook's expenses for PTA functions.

**FBI Captures
Jail Escapee**

SPOKANE — (AP) — Special F.B.I. agents Monday apprehended William Frank McCarty, 31, one of four prisoners who escaped from Marion County jail at Salem, May 6. Only one of the men is still at large.

McCarty was arrested at the home of relatives here.

The escapee was being held on a burglary charge at Salem. McCarty, along with Melvin Leedy, 20, Edmund Werner, 21, and Albert Louis Purser, 35, made their escape after someone had sawed through iron bars of a cell.

Leedy was apprehended in Spokane Friday night, and Werner was taken into custody at Lewiston, Idaho, the same day.

8 Families Homeless

INDEPENDENCE, Ore. (UP) — Fire destroyed 24 hopyard workers' cabins at the Sunset Farms near here Monday night.

Eight families were made temporarily homeless by the blaze, which started from an undetermined cause.

Loss was estimated at \$15,000 not including workers' possessions.

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
