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Filipinos Raid Red Positions

Chinese Fall Back From Embattled Hill

SEOUL, Korea.—(AP)—Filipino raiders in grenade-bayonet charges twice drove Chinese Red defenders off an embattled hill on the Korea Central Front Monday.

It was the same hill west of Choswon where men of the 20th battalion combat team said they killed or wounded every one of 40 Chinese at its top Sunday.

The though Filipino raiders hit the Reds again Monday morning. The Chinese fled. The Filipinos withdrew shortly under Red mortar fire.

LATER IN the day a second Filipino patrol caught the Chinese napping. The patrol hurled grenades and charged with fixed bayonets. The Chinese fled.

Ten Reds were killed in the two assaults. The Filipinos were wearing regular issue U. S. armored vests. None was killed, the U. S. Eighth Army said.

U. N. raiders Sunday fought into heavily fortified Communist bunkers on the Western Front.

They then directed U. N. artillery fire on to fleeing Reds. Allied troops used the sturdy Red underground shelters as protection from the train of high explosives.

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BREWERS READY CORONATION BEER

LONDON.—(AP)—A firm of British brewers announced Monday it is ready with a special coronation beer to help the nation celebrate the crowning of its new queen in June, 1953.

The coronation brew will be a little more than three times as expensive—five shillings 70 cents a pine—and three times as strong as the usual lager.

The specially potent beer will be released to the public a week before the coronation.

Oregon Frog Disqualified By Judges

ANGELS CAMP, Calif.—(AP)—A California frog was declared winner of the annual Calaveras County jumping contest after an Oregon croaker was disqualified.

Big Six, handled by Ed Gunter of Gustine, Calif., won the event—made famous by a Mark Twain story—with a leap of 14 feet, six inches.

The longest jump was 14 feet, 8½ inches by Pancho, entered by the Three Flags Highway Association of Lakeview, Ore. But Pancho was ruled out by the judges for not being in the circle.

Runners-up to Big Six, and their laps, were Dudley Manlove, 14 feet, three inches, owned by Ira Blue of San Francisco; Valdina Rosa, 14 feet, two ½ inches, owned by Louise Robinson, Stockton, Calif.

Gov. Earl Warren was among the spectators and also had a frog entered. The governor, a candidate for the Republican presidential nomination, insisted there was no political significance in the fact his frog refused to budge from the starting line.

Death Stalks Killer From Two Directions

CUMMINS PRISON FARM, Ark.—(AP)—Death stalks a 62-year-old convicted cop killer from two directions as he awaits his June 7 date with the electric chair.

Dr. Arch Rollins, prison physician, said Rufus H. Green, convicted last month for the fatal shooting of Camden night chief of police Frank Williford, might not live long enough to die in the chair.

Rollins said Green, in the prison hospital, is suffering from diabetes and cancer of the face.

Better Protection Eyed for Forests

SALEM.—(AP)—The state forestry department has started a new program aimed at better than ever fire protection for Oregon forests this summer.

A series of meetings is being held through western Oregon to advise logging operators, timberland owners and others interested in the laws and regulations covering summer fire protection and seeking industry co-operation in reducing the number of fires, acting State Forester Dwight L. Phipps said Thursday.

One of the series of meetings was held at Medford Wednesday night and another will be held Friday at Kerby, in the Cave Junction area.

MEETINGS already have been held at Mapleton, Eugene, Toledo, Molalla, Mehama, Dallas and at the arboretum near Corvallis. Other meetings will be held in the Coos-Curry area, in Douglas county, in Grants Pass and in northwestern Oregon.

One of the main points of discussion, Phipps said, is the matter of forest closures during periods of high fire hazard. He said the procedure has been changed, and the western part of the state is to be zoned on the basis of similarity in weather conditions, and each zone is to be given a number.

PHIPPS SAID: "In addition there will be an increase in the number of weather stations in the various zones and reports will be submitted to the Salem office each day at stated periods. When these reports indicate the burning index is approaching the danger point and weather forecasts are not favorable, then the forester will issue closure order from the Salem office for individual zones as need arises."

"In reaching a decision as to the closure, consideration will be given to the fire experience rating within each zone and the special efforts made by the various operators in keeping fire out of the woods."
