Some Coast Mills
Still Closed Down

The last group of local striking CIO Woodworkers in Lane County returned to work Wednesday.

Crown-Zellerbach Corp. pond workers in Springfield were informed by phone from the Washington home office that a settlement had been made. No details of the terms were available.

Crown-Zellerbach had been negotiating as part of the Lumbermen's Industrial Relations Committee with the union, while some other Willamette Valley operators had been negotiating through Willamette Valley Operators' Assn. which settled last week.

Several coast mills were still closed by the strike, but scattered settlements in that area have been reported at Mapleton, Florence, and Swisshome.

Panty Raid

"We want falsies; we want falsies," the men chanted. They got 'em—a couple of dozen.

Mrs. Edna Stokes, head house-mother at Carson, stood grimly by the door, defying any man to try to enter the building. Ordinarily men may come in and sit in the living room until 10:30. But not Wednesday night. It was plain that Mrs. Stokes saw nothing funny in all this.

NEITHER DID Mrs. Zoa Burdick, housemother at Hendricks Hall, 14th and University, the only girls' house men actually entered. Half a dozen got onto the fire escapes and into the dining room. Mrs. Burdick drove them off.

Noting the size on a pair of pants in front of Carson Hall, a man shouted.

"36-C, Judas Priest."

The chant began:

"36-C Hip, Hip;

"36-C, Hip, hip, hooray."

Playing by the rules, the men left Carson in an orderly fashion to permit the girls to begin their parade. The girls piled onto trucks and private cars and began their collection at men's living organizations at about 11 p.m.

FIRST STOP was the Alpha Tau Omega House at 18th and Onyx. The ATOs put a garden hose and some waterbags to work, however, and the girls were discouraged right from the start.

More water greeted them at Theta Chi, 19th and University. Going north on Alder St. the caravan hardly stopped as it passed Sigma Alpha Mu, Tau Kappa Epsilon and other houses in that area. Theta Chis yelled, "Come and get 'em." They threw out a suit of long, red underwear.

Clothing had become a secondary consideration. The girls just rode along and sang and invited water-bagging. Clothing not picked up at the men's houses Wednesday night was being brought to a central collection point Thursday morning.

THEY AVOIDED John Straub Hall, the big men's dormitory between 14th and 15th on Onyx. There were rumors that an over-enthusiastic reception awaited them there.

Somewhat, along the route the truck-loads became co-ed. Men joined the caravan and it became a giant melee, with songs, chants and laughter.

Enjoying it all was "Waldo," a large and nondescript white dog belonging to Theta Chi. Waldo took part in the parade, somehow avoiding being run over, and at least once was seen wearing a pair of peach panties.

Shrimen were called out once, not to quell the riot but to turn off the fire ladders at 15th and Beech. An enthusiastic student had turned it on with a pipe wrench.

BY MIDNIGHT the girls, who had been given permission to stay out later than the usual 10:30 to collect clothing for war relief, were back at Carson Hall.

Housemothers blinked porch lights, indicating it was time to come in. Men helped round up the girls, calling.

"Hurry girls, hurry. You know what happens if you're late. Six in the face if you're late."

Grim faced housemothers counted the girls as they returned to the dormitories.

And by 12:15 all was quiet on the University of Oregon campus.

Curry County Trek Nets 15 Votes

BROOKINGS — (AP) — Curry County Sheriff Glenn R. Sabin and his deputy, W. W. Smith, are back from their trek to Mule Creek to pick up the 15 primary election votes.

To reach the remote community, they went to Crescent City, Calif., Grants Pass, and then down the Rogue River to Marial. The first delivery of second class mail since Dec. 24 arrived May 6 at Mule Creek, Sabin reported.

First class mail was brought in on foot twice a month through the winter.

Texas Sheriff Found Guilty

DALLAS, Tex. — (AP) — A federal jury convicted Sheriff Sully Montgomery of Tarrant County (Fort Worth, Tex.) Wednesday of beating the government out of \$5,518.77 in income taxes in 1948, 1949 and 1950.

Federal District Judge T. Whitfield Davidson sentenced him to seven years in federal prison. The jury convicted him in an hour and 12 minutes after it retired.

Montgomery, 51, a former member of Centre College's once great "Praying Colonels" football team, heard the verdict with his shoulders back and his head erect. He brushed at his face, more as a habit than a reaction.

Mrs. Montgomery said he would remain in office as sheriff—he announced on May 5 that he would run for another four-year term—and his attorneys gave notice of intent to appeal to the fifth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals at New Orleans.

Until the appellate court rules, Judge Davidson said, Montgomery can remain free in bond.

Court Martial Out for Fliers

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Air Force has ruled that trials by court martial will be considered "only as a last resort in clearly aggravated cases" of "stay-down" fliers.

This policy was disclosed after court martial charges were dropped against 12 reserve officers who had refused to fly. They will be discharged from the service under honorable conditions and relieved of their commissions as air force officers.

Two other officers have been convicted by courts martial for refusal to fly. One was permitted to resign under conditions other than honorable.

Of the 12 officers—six each at Randolph Air Base, San Antonio, Tex., and Mather Air Base, Sacramento, Calif.—the Air Force said.

"This headquarters, after thorough review of these cases, is of the opinion that trials by court martial are not warranted."

but does not allow for depreciation.

Depreciation coverage on all its installations has been the EWEB policy, Taylor pointed out, and has proved good business. However, for purposes of comparing them with costs of purchased power, it would not be fair to add "money in the bank" to plant production costs, he said.

SPEAKING of what the power developments would do to the scenic and sports values of the McKenzie headwaters, Taylor explained that plans allow for maintaining a flow of 40 second-feet over the three picturesque falls between Clear Lake and Smith River. Flow measurements and pictures, he said indicate this amount would maintain the full beauty of the falls.

Furthermore, Taylor said, the Oregon Game Commission has been consulted and has tentatively approved the power projects.

The units suggested at Beaver Marsh and Carmen Creek would be of the "stream-flow" type, not high dams impounding large amounts of storage water behind them. Starting at the outfall from Clear Lake, water would be diverted through a tunnel to a point above Beaver Marsh, then dropped almost 500 feet through penstocks to a 27,800 kilowatt power plant there. The weight of the falling water would turn power turbines in much the same fashion employed at the EWEB's Leaburg and Watterville hydro plants.

The diversion-and-drop procedure would be repeated below Beaver Marsh with another "head" of almost 500 feet at Carmen Creek where maximum of 35,000 kilowatts could be produced. Below Carmen Creek, the Smith River dam would produce only 5,700 kilowatts of power but would enable the EWEB to "iron out" hour-to-hour changes in the normal stream flow caused by its upstream operations.

TAYLOR TOLD board members Wednesday that Upper McKenzie power could only be counted on for peaking purposes. It would not be firm power available 24 hours every day because of limited opportunities for large storage reservoirs.

Under its present Federal Power Commission permit, the EWEB holds a three-year priority on developing the Upper McKenzie power plants. Its priority, however, does not guarantee FPC approval of EWEB proposals. It simply protects the investment being made for the power studies by assuring the EWEB that no other power developing agency can move in while its permit is in effect.

Before any actual move to build the Upper McKenzie plants could be approved, extensive public hearings would be required by the FPC and other public agencies.

11 Bodies Recovered From Train Wreckage

SANTIAGO, Spain — (AP) — Four runaway freight cars loaded with explosives and gasoline crashed head-on into the crack Galicia express Tuesday night. Eleven bodies were recovered from the wreckage soon after the crash.

Rescue workers said they believed there are many more dead in the high-speed Madrid-to-Vigo express which turned into a mass of twisted and burned wreckage when the freight cars exploded.

ROYALTY SAILS NEW YORK — (AP) — The Duke and Duchess of Windsor sailed for Europe Wednesday on their annual summer trip.

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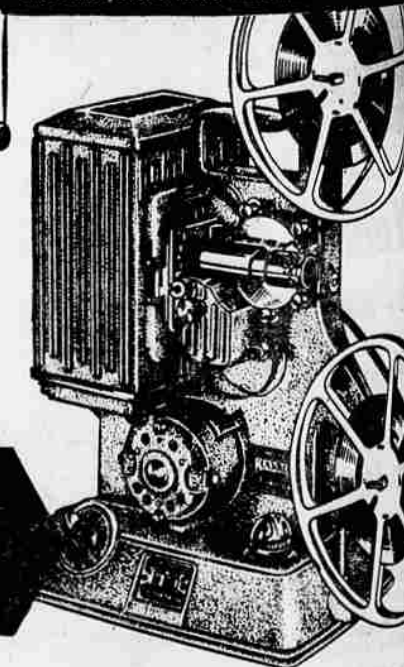
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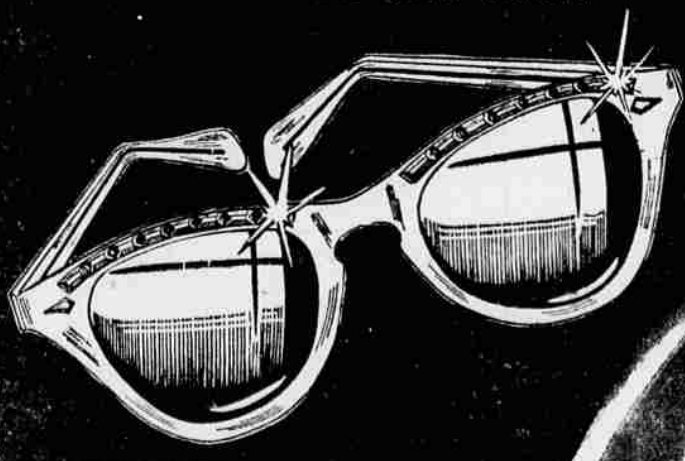
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
