In the spring, when a young woman is swinging to a new style, she wonders what her style might look like. She knows her hair is well-groomed in a way becoming to her, but she is not sure if it will give her more poise for dates and parties.

The ideal is a perfect oval, broader and wider at the top, in nature's pattern for an egg. Your hair-do can help you to create that effect. Figure it out for yourself. Determine your need for a fluffy or sleek, high or flat, wide or narrow, long or short coiffure. This to give the illusion of the oval outline and bring out your best features.

The perfect face is hard to find—and you can be plenty popular and happy, regardless of what happens to be YOUR facial contour. But it is interesting to compare your measurements with the yardstick for symmetrical facial beauty. As taught to future fashion models by Caroline Leonetti: The face is divided into three equal parts, forehead, nose, chin. The length should be equal to the width, plus one third that width. This can guide you to the balancing coiffure.

FOR BOYS who want to tame unruly hair, here are some tips from stylists: The hair-cut (and combing) should follow the natural part that leads out from the crown. If the part will not fall into place as you comb, perhaps the crown hair is cut too short. For control of cowlicks, you need the weight of enough hair to hold down the cowlick while it is being properly trained.

To bring out the natural oil and sheen, to banish the dull colorless look, brush briskly, daily. When you brush, don't spread the dust! After every two or three strokes, cleanse the brush on a towel. This is a spring tonic for the clean, live look that improves appearance however you happen to wear your hair.

Woman 'In the Background' Is Senator Kefauver's Wife

WASHINGTON — Nancy Kefauver, wife of Senator Estes Kefauver of coonskin cap and television fame, is a vivacious Scottish-born red-head who has done much to endear Washington to the Kefauver clan.

The clan, which includes Linda, 10; David, 6; Diane, 4; and Gail, 15 months, is an average one—except when the Senator appears on television. Then the dickens breaks loose in the family circle.

Last year, when Kefauver was investigating organized crime, his children disliked his work intensely.

"Oh, Mummy," they said, "Daddy's getting much more publicity than the cowboys on TV—and he's not nearly as good."

BUT NANCY Kefauver is a wise wife. She laughed with her children and stuck by her husband as she has done all her married life. She'll have lots more TV to contend with during her husband's race for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Actually Mrs. Kefauver has many claims to fame of her own. Besides keeping house and seeing to the daily needs of four young children, she does charity work, and paints portraits in her spare time. She and her husband relax by golfing, swimming, and usually take a short trip to Florida in the winter.

They both enjoy entertaining and being entertained. "We like to entertain informally," Mrs. Kefauver says. Then after a moment she adds "with four children I must admit, it's impossible to do anything else."

MANY EVENINGS the Kefauvers stay home with the children and read. "The Senator does a lot of studying," his wife explains.

Mrs. Kefauver is upset, however, over recent publicity she's given her husband.

While appearing on a Washington network recently, she spoke frankly of her family's reactions to the Senator's presidential campaign. "I had no idea all this would be printed," she says. "Actually I realize he's becoming president is such a far cry from actuality, it's ludicrous to even think about it."

BUT SHE HAS managed to add dignity and charm to her husband's career. In 1948 during his senatorial campaign they toured Tennessee together.

"I always stayed in the background and never made any speeches," she says. "Perhaps, that's one reason he won." Then during the crime investigations last year, while the eyes of the world were upon her husband, his pretty wife occasionally stole the show.

"There's nothing Red about me," he says, "except my red-headed wife."

Young Nancy Pigott, daughter of baronet Sir Stephen J. Pigott—knighthood for his part in building the Queen ships, Elizabeth and Mary—came to visit her mother's home town, Chattanooga, Tenn., in 1934.

"I came to see the country," she says, "but instead I met the Senator."

"Frankly," she adds, "I'm awfully glad I did."
