Already the magic initials that spell Daily Vacation Bible School are appearing in the church news. Modern technology with fascinating audio-visual tricks has made it a pleasure for the kids, and several ministers are preparing stories for the church page already, giving June a "pre-cue." They will appear in the coming two weeks' issues, overlooking the DVBS season.

Biggest news of this week is the mass meeting at Central Presbyterian Church, at which the "new Bible," based on sources including newly discovered documents, will be described by Dr. John Trever, national Bible authority.

Another world prominent figure will meet Eugene people at the Congregational Church when Dr. Sidney M. Berry of London, England, speaks. Public invited. Dr. Berry is in touch with the world religious and political situation.

BA Gives Report At "Quarter" On Activities

At the recent second quarterly meeting of the Salvation Army Board, officers were present: president, Mrs. Victor Morris; vice-president, William Morris; and treasurer, Alvin Iverson. The retiring officers are Lowling, president, and Henry Berth, vice-president.

Among other business, the welfare reports for the first four months of the year were discussed. The following statistics emerged:

Transient applicants for aid: 529. Of these, 529 were assisted in various ways. 451 were supplied with meals, 30 with lodgings, 255 with shoes and shoes were given, and 38 received other aid, such as medical, transportation, etc.

There were 110 instances of aid given to families, 52 residents in homes, 58 in the rest of the county, 77 grocery orders were given, 157 garments and shoes supplied, and ten pieces of household furniture, including two beds.

Ecclesiastical Interest Great In Bible Scholar's Visit Here

A new Bible, in modern speech, will be described by Dr. John C. Trever, Thursday, May 29, in several public appearances here. He is sent by the National Council of Churches. The publication of this new Bible, which goes back to original sources for its translations, including recently discovered documents, is generally considered in religious circles the biggest single milestone in church history in the past 340 years.

Trever, a distinguished Bible scholar, will speak first at Northwest Christian College, at an 11 a.m. chapel service. In the evening he will be at Central Presbyterian Church under auspices of the Oregon Council of Churches and the

Dr. Trever won special recognition in the scholarly world by being the first definitely to identify as such the most ancient manuscripts known of the Bible. These manuscripts, now called the Dead Sea Scrolls, were written about 150 B.C. and found in A.D. 1948. He has worked intimately with the Revision Committee and will answer questions concerning the forthcoming edition, which is due to be released by the publishers Sept. 30, 1952.

Preachers, Bible school teachers and other workers in the church will soon be using the Revised Standard Version.

This is the authorized revision of the American Standard Version of 1901 and of the King James Version of 1611. Work on it was begun as long ago as 1930. The former International Council of Religious Education (now joined with 11 other organizations in the National Council of Churches) appointed a committee of scholars with Dr. Luther A. Weigle, of Yale University Divinity School, as chairman. They studied the project of combining the accuracy of more recent versions with the enduring beauty of the King James Version. The actual revision began in 1937.

"Many of the Old English expressions of 1611 have become obsolete and have lost all meaning to us," Dr. Trever continued. "But what is more important to rectify is the great number of words and phrases which have changed their meaning and now convey an entirely erroneous impression."

The President said the excellent progress of the non-partisan vote campaign must please all who have the interest of their country at heart. He added that it should have the vigorous support of all political parties and civic organizations.

First Christian Organizes For Building Jobs

First Christian Church and its chapels have formed a suburban expansion coordinating board, with Cecil Warner as chairman, to provide the necessary staff power and direction to the rapidly increasing church interest in the suburban areas.

Representation is: from the World Missions and Service Department, Frank Kinney; Christian Education department, Cecil Warner, (chairman); evangelism department, Clarence Elliott; finance department, H. V. Johnson, Sr.; property department, W. R. Robertson; from the suburban chapels, the three ministers: Jim Edwards of College Crest Christian; Joe Wagon of Allison Park, and Dan Thuma of Bethel; representatives: Fred Henry, Don Schiermeyer, and Murrel Maugh, representing College Crest, Allison Park and Bethel, respectively. The evangelistic organizer for the church, Otto F. Crumroy Sr., will work under direction of the board.

First activity of the board will probably be erection of a church building for the Bethel congregation, at 2600 Wood Avenue. (Several stories have been carried about the project). The Bethel services at present are being held at the Mr. and Mrs. Murrel Maugh home, 2537 Wood Ave., off Bethel Drive.

'Africa Speaks' At Conference

NEW YORK — The relation of Christianity to the rapidly changing racial, political and social conditions in Africa, south of the Sahara, will be the basic theme of a special conference being called by the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A. at Wittenberg College, Springfield, Ohio, June 16 to 25.

Sponsored by the National Council's Africa Committee, the conference is said to be the most widely representative gathering on Africa held in North America during the past decade. Representatives of 30 major Protestant denominations and seven African governments, along with delegates from the United Nations and the U.S. State Department are expected to attend. At least 40 delegates will be Africans, many of whom are being sent by churches, governments and private organizations.

THE NCC says that with 21 million professed Christians in Africa, the continent contains a "larger body of Christians than is to be found in all the rest of the so-called non-Christian world." "If Communism or secularism or other Godless-isms win in Africa, it will be simply because Christians have failed in simple, practical living of their religion. For to Africans, Christianity is in many respects the natural and fulfilling religion of their future."

Spellman Halts Visit When Aunt Dies

LISBON, Portugal—(AP)—Francis Cardinal Spellman of New York interrupted his visit to the forthcoming World Eucharistic Congress at Barcelona Friday to turn to the United States because of the death of his aunt. The cardinal was told of the death of his aunt, Sister Filomena of the Order of St. Joseph, at Boston, Mass., when he arrived here on the liner Constitution.

Bethesda Will Enlarge Plant This Summer

Bethesda Lutheran Church has decided on "Plan No. 1" of the three they have been studying, for a new educational unit and parish unit.

Under this plan, the entire church parlors and kitchen will be turned into individual classrooms, and assembly for the primary classes, and additional educational units of 18 classrooms will be added to the west of the church. The parish unit will be to the north of the church, seating approximately 400 and it will be used for social occasions and general use. It will also contain a special room for auxiliary meetings, and visual aid equipment. The special room will have a fireplace and will be good for committee rooms particularly.

The new buildings will be covered with red-toned shingles to match the brick of the main structure, and within their styling will be modern, but not in extreme modernistic mode. The church being a fine example of the Gothic period, the new buildings will be designed to blend with the Gothic.

THE HEATING system of the whole system may be changed from slabwood to oil. The auditorium of the parish hall will have a large stage for Christmas plays, and so on. There will be recreational facilities.

Only a small portion of the lawn area will have to be sacrificed, and the formal gardens will be only slightly disturbed. A "patio" will be created with a grass covering, between the church and the parish hall. The formal memorial gardens and lawn of the Bethesda Lutheran Church have long been a show place of the Danebo community.

The church council Friday evening was to select a financing committee and they will begin active work immediately. It is hoped if all goes well to start construction this summer, with the thought of finishing before the rainy season.
