

Rhee Enemies Under Arrest

Assassination Plot Based on Korea

PUSAN — (AP) — Home Minister Lee Bum Suk Friday said 11 persons had been arrested for plotting to assassinate President Syngman Rhee and other South Korean leaders.

The arrests marked a new turn in the raging political feud between Rhee and the National Assembly which brought this provincial capital and three southern provinces under martial law.

Military police acting under Rhee's orders have arrested 11 persons. Ten are accused of taking part in an international conspiracy and the other is charged with shooting a South Korean army officer. The Assemblymen are not included among the "assassination" arrests.

A United Nations agency Thursday urged Rhee to end his martial law decree of last Saturday, but the aging president has refused the request.

Lee, who was appointed home minister only last Saturday, said he was marked for assassination by Communist agents and Premier Paik Sang.

Lee charged that Communist agents were trying to overthrow the regime and form a common government with Red China. U.S. diplomatic sources have called the government's charges "eyewash." They expressed the opinion Rhee was attempting to jail his political opponents so that he could hand-pick a president next month. The assembly elects the president.

Lee said one of the men arrested for the assassination conspiracy was Sunwoo Chong Won, secretary to former Premier John Chang. He said they planned to make Chang president so that a coalition government could be formed.

He said the 11 had vast sums of Communist-supplied money which they were using to bribe Assemblymen for the June elections.

Tansy Ragwort Controls Due

Time for controlling tansy ragwort, a poisonous weed, with 2,4-D spray is running short, County W. B. Parker reported this week.

He said that once the weeds grow out of the "lettuce stage" and start sending up stalks, it's too late to get an effective kill with 2,4-D.

He recommends a spray of at least three pounds of parent acid per 100 gallons of water (or four tablespoons to a gallon of water). Tansy ragwort is a spreading weed nuisance in western Oregon and is poisonous to cattle and horses. On the other hand, some farmers have been controlling it by pasturing sheep on infested fields.

Tight Market Makes Top Grade Seed Listing More Difficult

Some farmers will find it hard this year to hit blue tag grade for certified alta fescue grass seed in 1952, according to Merle Sather, Oregon State College Extension service seed certification specialist.

Due to tightening demands in northern state marketing areas, certification standards for weed-free other crop seeds have been made more stringent this year, he explained. The deadline for 1952 crop certification applications is June 1, he added.

THE MAXIMUM weed seed content for blue tag has been lowered from one-half to three-tenths of one per cent. The upper limit presence of other crop seeds has been lowered from one to one-tenth per cent.

certified if it shows the presence of any chess or sorrel, both common Oregon weeds. Other southern states, he said, are likely to follow suit.

With announcement of the alta fescue certification changes for this year, Sather said the 1951 crop blue and red tag seed worth \$1,150,000 to farmers. Of 2,737,847 pounds involved in the certification program, the specialist said 75 per cent of it was tagged either blue or red, indicating its quality. Red tags were affixed to 562,560 pounds and 675,260 or 25 per cent of the crop entered for certification failed to meet the minimum standards.

PRESENCE of ryegrass was the chief barrier which prevented more western Oregon seed from gaining the blue tag rating. Chess and buckhorn seeds also caused considerable trouble.

Optimistic View On Fluorides Told to Grove Lions Club

By the end of 1952, over 35,000,000 people in 225 communities will be drinking water to which fluoride ions have been added, Dr. Dean Webb told members of the city's Lions Club Thursday.

As a practicing dentist, Dr. Webb said he spoke without prejudice on the proposal to add the teeth-saving chemical to drinking water. "After all, its the dentist's practice which would be directly affected," he said.

Webb said the most legitimate criticism of fluoridation is the charge it stains or mottles tooth enamel. Other charges leveled at

the plan he called "emotional." Fluorine in sufficient quantities will stain enamel, he admitted, but if added to drinking water in the ratio of one part to one million will only stain the teeth of one person in ten and that one so infinitesimally as to be unnoticeable by the layman, he said.

He read from a long list of health organizations recommending fluoridation and commented that it would appear that passage of a fluoridation bill would appear simple. He credits defeat of fluoridation measures in such places as Seattle to a minority who were able to raise a doubt in voters' minds.

Webb then read statistics to disprove other claims made against the addition of the chemical. "After all, fluorine has been present, naturally, in water in various concentrations all over North America since the continent was discovered," he stated. "And experience with natural fluorine defeats these claims."

He concluded by recommending fluoridation for locales such as Cottage Grove because of prevalence of poor teeth "which might be caused by the lack of sunshine."

Merit Award Given For Clearance Work

A certificate of merit was recently presented by J. R. Bruckart, Willamette National Forest supervisor, to Spencer T. Moore, district ranger at Detroit, for outstanding services in administration of his district.

Bruckart pointed out that Moore has been confronted with extraordinary problems in clearing timber and debris in the large basin to be filled by backwaters from Detroit Dam, and in clearing many miles of road and power line routes, all of which increase the fire hazard.

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Another Blast Due Sunday

LAS VEGAS, Nev.—(AP)—The seventh in the spring series of atom blasts at the Nevada test site was expected Sunday as Brig. Gen. Harry Stork called a news conference for Friday.

Stork is expected to outline details of troop maneuvers at the next blast. Earlier, he announced that troops would jump from their foxholes as soon as the next atom bomb was detonated.

During the spring series, the Atomic Energy Commission has called news conferences 24 to 48 hours preceding an atomic blast.

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
