

McDermott Allows One-Hit As Red Sox Nick Nats 1-0

Phillies Topple Giants, Dodgers Defeat Braves

Scrappy Mickey McDermott only 27 batters Thursday night as he pitched the Boston Red Sox to a brilliant 1-0, one-victory over the Washington Senators in a battle for second place in the American League.

McDermott singled to right field in the fourth inning to spoil McDermott's no-hitter. The only other Senators to reach base was Eddie Yost who walked to start the game. The one-hitter was the fourth in the season in the majors. Virgil Trucks of Detroit pitched the only no-hitter so far, beating Washington, 1-0, on May 15.

Bob Porterfield, victim of Sox' no-hitter, was also the victim Thursday night. He was hit for ten hits. The Red Sox scored the game's lone run in the fifth when Clyde Vollmer walked and Fred Hatfield, light-hitting first baseman, tripled.

McDermott pitched perfect ball from the fifth through the ninth. The lanky left-hander fanned seven in posting his third victory in two days. The victory enabled the Sox to break their tie with the Senators for second place.

The Philadelphia Phillies took advantage of loose fielding and the pace-setting New York Giants, 6-5, to end a seven-game winning streak in one of three national league day games.

Brooklyn's runner-up Dodgers, trailing from three straight defeats at the hands of the Giants, rebounded with a 7-3 triumph over the Boston Braves to pull within 1 1/2 games of their heated rivals. In the only other National League game, the Pittsburgh Pirates downed the Cincinnati Reds, 3-2.

Two tainted runs in the fifth inning and Smokey Burgess' two-run homer in the seventh ruined the Giants. Philadelphia trailed 4-0 until the fifth when the Phillies took the lead for keeps. A home run by catcher Wes Westrum admitted the first run and an RBI by second baseman Davey Williams let in the bases loaded in the seventh off Monte Kennedy, fifth Giant pitcher.

Brooklyn's bats, muffled in the first series, broke their silence against the Braves. The Dodgers added three home runs to their hits, including four home runs in three doubles. Andy Pafko, Mike Robinson, Pee Wee Reese and Gil Hodges socked homers. Reese's blast was his ninth of the season, all with the bases empty.

Little Murry Dickson entered the win column for the first time April 30 as he pitched Pittsburgh's woeful Pirates to a four-triumph over Harry Perkowski of the Reds. Dickson didn't permit a hit until the fifth.

The Pirates dented the plate in the fifth with the aid of a steal of second. Ralph Kiner, nationally passed his first three strikes, clinched the game with a two-run homer in the seventh. The blow was Kiner's fifth.

Harry Simpson and Al Rosen were the big wheels in Cleveland's victory over Detroit. Simpson home five runs on a grand slam homer and three singles and was batted in four on a pair of doubles and a single.

An eighth-inning error by Billy Beane, filling in at first base for Ferris Fain, enabled the Yanks to down the A's. Hitchcock fumbled Yogi Berra's grounder and Rizzuto scored from second on the boot to create a 2-2 tie.

FISH TALES BY DICK STRITE

★ The mountain lakes, scheduled to open Friday, will take a beating over the weekend when many anglers take advantage of a three-day Memorial Day holiday. . . . Some may have a rugged time reaching their favorite spots and those invading Gold Lake will have to walk about two miles through snow. . . . Boats have been taken to the lake by sled and W. Wade of the Odell Lake resort has also taken boats to Davis Lake—a road that is open. . . . Those without reservations are "sunk". However, reservations for either of the lakes are being taken in the future by Ernie Danner.

Among the other lakes opening are included the Umpqua, Mt. Hood, Rogue River and Deschutes national forest areas, Diamond Lake, Kingsley Reservoir in Hood River country, the northwest end of East Lake, other waters include the Deschutes River between the Bridge and Cow Camp, and two streams in Zone 6, Spring Creek and Williamson River. . . .

Lakes have provided the best fishing in recent weeks, especially Odell. Ernie and Ford Danner fished with spinning outfits and with brass Wob-It-rates at Odell and caught mackinaw weighing 17 and 18 pounds, a Dolly that weighed 10 pounds, and a 14-inch Rainbow. . . . Sheri Carroll of Mapleton caught a 12-pound mackinaw and his wife, Virginia, a 4-pounder. . . . They also caught and released five 10-inch mackinaws—all taken on trolling outfits. The Danners caught their fish casting with the lures about 20 feet deep. . . .

Ed Adams, veteran local angler who is partial to the Rogue, reports more fish in the river than in several years, and that the water is in fine shape and fishing should remain good until some time in June. . . . Ed has fished successfully about 10 miles above Gold Beach.

★ Mrs. E. Zurbuchen, R-G correspondent at Newport, reports that big ling cod are coming into Yaquina Bay and that prize-winning fish were taken in the local derby. . . . Prize winners have been Mrs. Gilbert Woodward of Oregon City, 15 pounds, 2 ounces, and Perry Stellmacher of Albany, 21 pounds, 12 ounces. . . . Shiners are now in the bay and the larger fish are coming in after them. . . .

Largest king salmon taken in the third week of the Monterey Peninsula Derby was a 33-pound, 10-ounce fish. . . . The derby leader is over 40 pounds, however. . . .

One of the outstanding jobs being done by the state game commission is the educational program for youths throughout the state. . . . Austin Hamer, head of the youth program, has given 124 lectures, complete with movies, to junior and senior high schools during the school year. . . . He also directs the summer camping program, which this year will include two-day clinics for 96 summer camps. Last year 24 camps enjoyed the wildlife feature. Hamer will be assisted this summer by Ronald Shay, recent graduate of the OSC fish and game management school.

★ Stream fishing in this area should continue good much later in the season than usual—with the heavy water content of the watersheds. . . . We have been toying with the hope of getting to the South Fork of the McKenzie, one of our long-time favorites, but Bob Hirt reports that the stream is much too high for wading. . . . Some good catches have been made, though. . . . The Willamette continues to produce some nice catches, both above and below the new dam project. . . .

The game commission reports that licensed trappers have taken 15,253 beaver pelts during the 1951-52 fiscal year, with an aggregate value of \$120,000. . . . There are 2,270 licensed trappers in the state.

Iness Second In AAU Meet

LOS ANGELES—(U.P.)—Sandy-haired Hobart Jones staged an upset Thursday as he turned in the nation's fastest 1500 meter performance of the year in winning the feature event of the Southern Pacific Association AAU meet in 3:52.4.

Jones the former Nebraska district star, took over the lead in the third lap and set a fast pace as he defeated Gene Haynes of the Navy Olympic Team by five yards. Favored Bob McMillen of Occidental was another five yards back in third.

A lonesome crowd of less than 3,000 huddled in massive Memorial Coliseum for the annual AAU event and saw seven new meet records established. Actually it was eight but Jones' fast time in the 1500 did not count as he is not registered in the SPAAA district.

Other new marks were turned in by UCLA's George Brown with a 25 foot 2 1/4 inch broad jump; USC's Jack Davis with a 14.2 110-meter high hurdle performance; UCLA's Chuck Phillips 9:38.1 in the 3000 meter steeplechase; Pepperdine's Bill Johnson's 52.8 in the 400 meter hurdles; Fortune Gordien's 173 toss in the discus and USC's Frank Flores' 47 feet 11 inches in the hop, step and jump.

Flores' mark in the "freak" hop, step and jump also was "a best in the nation" for the year performance and stamped him as an Olympic game threat.

Gordien's discus effort gave him the rubber victory in his duel with USC's Jim Iness, who was second with a toss of 172 feet 4 1/4 inches. Each had won one previous victory over the other.

Brown was the only double winner of the night, adding a first in a 10.8 100 meters to his broad jump honors.

Halbrook Sets Mark in Portland Cinder Meet

PORTLAND—(U.P.)—Grant High school won the Portland city track and field championship Thursday for the first time since 1945. The Generals scored 58 points to defeat Lincoln, which had 54. Other schools finished in this order: Jefferson 46 1/2, Roosevelt 30, Franklin 19 1/2, Cleveland 10, Washington 6 and Benson 4.

Swede Halbrook, noted Lincoln High school basketball player, set a new city high jump record of 6 feet 2 1/4 inches. The old mark of 6 feet 1 3/4 inches was set in 1949 by Emory Barnes of Jefferson, now a student at the University of Oregon.

SAN FRANCISCO—(U.P.)—The power-on-paper Oakland Oaks, pushed into a tizzy last week when they challenged San Diego for the league lead, appeared on the road to recovery Friday.

Laurelwood is entering two teams and three independents. Laurelwood's management is sponsoring a team composed of Lloyd Mattison, George Kenney, Baker Stoughton and Babe Carter. The Laurelwood pro shop will send Vern Allen, Art White, Sam Peden and George Lynch. The three independents are George Spicer, Art DeMaris and Dale Stickle.

The starting time for handicap flights is 7 a.m. to 12 noon. Starting times for championship flight is 12:30 p.m.

One of the prizes of the day will be a Lincoln-Zephyr 12-cylinder automobile to be awarded on a close-to-the-pin hole. The vintage of the auto has not been revealed by the tourney committee.

Bolt, Mangrum Tie for Lead

ST. LOUIS—(U.P.)—Lloyd Mangrum of Chicago and Tommy Bolt of Durham, N.C., each with a two-under-par 68, held the lead Friday in the 49th Western Open Golf Tournament. But no one is ready to pick the winner in the 72-hole, \$15,000 competition.

The two old pros, and newcomer Earl Wilde of Dock Island, Ill., with a 69, were the only members of the 120-man field to win the first-round encounter with Westwood Country Club's long and troublesome par 70 course Thursday.

Most of the entries settled for scores in the low and middle 70s. They included Sam Snead, the White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., slammer who was a pre-meet favorite. Snead, with seven others, wound up with a 72, good only for an eighth place tie after 18 holes.

10TH IN ROW

FRESNO, Calif. — (U.P.) — The league-leading Fresno Cardinals won their 10th game in a row, trouncing injury-riddled Modesto, 17-5, behind the power hitting of Al Grandcolas and Bill Downs.

It was Blair who provided the tournament with two stunning upsets Thursday when he defeated defending champion Dick Chapman of Pinehurst, N. C., and Billy Maxwell of Odesa, Tex., the U. S. titlist.

Stranahan, winner in 1948 and 1950, opposed Robin Cater of Scotland, who defeated Keppel Enderby of Australia, 2 and 1. The quarter-final matches were played in sunny but chilly weather over the 6,531-yard, par 72 Prestwick course.

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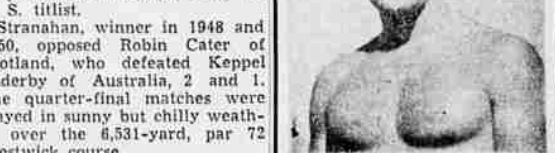
