

Police Collect Papers Against Red Officers

Down Raids Hit French Party Dens

PARIS—(AP)—Police flying squads seized mounds of documents and riot weapons Saturday in raids on Communist offices throughout France.

One aim obviously was to obtain evidence supporting the government's charge that plans for a Red revolution were behind the rioting here Wednesday night against Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway.

The raids began soon after dawn. Steel-helmeted police struck in Paris, in Lyon, Marseille, Clermont-Ferrand, Bordeaux and La Rochelle.

BUT IT WAS quickly clear that the French Reds—who recognize Communist party west of the Iron Curtain only as having a larger Communist—had not been taken entirely off guard.

At several points, chimneys of party headquarters were smoking with the fires of burning papers before the police squads reached the scene. At others, valuable moments were lost while police forced their way through barricaded entries.

The Communists had been on the alert since their secretary-general, Jacques Duclos, was jailed in the anti-Ridgway rioting and accused of plotting against France's internal security.

THE INTERIOR Ministry said important stocks of weapons were seized, including piles of black-jacks, shoemakers' paring knives and cases of cartridges. It did not disclose whether firearms were found.

Burning of documents is sometimes a prelude to Communist moves toward going underground. One Red-front organization in Paris was reported to have been burning papers the past two days.

Grasshoppers Sweep Into Barley Fields

KLAMATH FALLS—(AP)—Hordes of grasshoppers began edging into barley fields south of here Saturday, and by nightfall had destroyed an estimated several thousands of dollars worth of the crop.

A delay in arrival of spraying airplanes enabled the grasshoppers, which were detected some days ago, to move into the fields.

Aerial spreading of poison mash ahead of the grasshoppers now is scheduled to start Monday.

Sam Smith, federal grasshopper control specialist, was hopeful that the invasion would be stopped in its tracks. He said there was a chance damage would be slight. He explained that fields already damaged could be replanted in time for a crop this year. The barley, a high-priced malting variety, now is up about six inches.

The grasshoppers have 25,000 acres of the barley surrounded in the Tulelake area, most of the fields in northern California.

Federal prisoners from a work camp at Tulelake now are mixing poison mash for use by the planes Monday.

Flour Mill Workers Protest Japan Shipments

ASTORIA—(AP)—Flour mill workers here are protesting against the shipment of wheat to Japan.

The workers, who are members of the Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union, believe, flour, instead of wheat, should be sent.

They said in a protest to Sen. Morse (R-Ore.) that the wheat is being milled in Japan and sold to the former U. S. flour customers in Asia, curtailing production here.

U.S. Coeds Just 'Want a Man' English Girl Student Says

MANCHESTER, England, (AP)—An English girl student's complaint that American girls go to college only to "get a man" has touched off a controversy in the columns of the staid Manchester Guardian.

It all started when Miss Pat Arrowsmith, a Cambridge University student who spent a year at Ohio University in Athens, Ohio, wrote a dispatch for the Guardian entitled "Athens, Middle West."

Miss Arrowsmith said, among other things:

"MANY American girls go to college simply in order to 'get a man'."

"Scholarly learning is positively

discouraged... most student work for 'grades' and 'credits,' not knowledge....

"The general level of conversation in drugstore and bedroom is low... Attendance at poetry readings and piano recitals is poor."

Miss Arrowsmith also complained that she was criticized for going to a dance with a Negro. She said she was requested not to do it again because it was "contrary to the local mores." She wrote a letter of protest to the student newspaper, she said, but it was not published.

First retort came from Carolyn Herbert, a former Ohio University student who now lives in England.

"I found her views as superficial and disgruntled as some summer tourists to England who remember only bus queues, royal parties and cricket games," Miss Herbert said.

"IF MORE Miss Arrowsmiths return from our United States, they might bring back some of our breadth of interest, tolerance for the many, flexibility, and enthusiastic ingenuity."

F. V. Meyer, an American economics lecturer who said he once was on the faculty of a university much like Ohio, suggested Miss Arrowsmith might have been disillusioned because of her Cambridge and English girls' boarding school background.

He said her point of view was "extremely narrow, scientifically invalid, badly informed, definitely unfair and, above all, pardonably immature."

\$32 Billions Worth Of Arms Ordered

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Defense Department reported Saturday that it ordered \$32 billion worth of weapons, supplies, construction and expansion of existing production facilities during the first ten months of the present fiscal year.

The Defense Department had \$18½ billion still available for obligation as of May 1. Of that \$14 billion 100 million dollars was for ordering hard goods items.

C-47 Debris Found on Peak

REDDING, Calif. (AP)—The U.S. Forest Service reported today a tourist has found the wreckage of an Air Force C-47 which disappeared last Dec. 26 on a flight from Spokane, Wash., to Fairfield, Calif., with eight men on board.

The Forest Service said an Englishman named W. Chapman spotted the airplane wreck on the lower east side of 10,453-foot Mount Lassen.

Chapman notified the Forest Service office in Lassen National Park and an unidentified ranger went to the scene and found a wrecked airplane bearing the number "438142." The Ranger said the wreck was so deeply embedded in snow it was impossible to tell how many men were aboard.

At Red Bluff, Calif., airport officials said the registration number on the wreckage was the same as that of the missing transport.

The Forest Service said a search and rescue team had been sent out from Hamilton Field, Calif., to check the wreckage.

Control of Koje Prisoners Faces Severest Test Yet

KOJE ISLAND, Korea—(AP)—Communist control over Koje Island's 80,000 riotous prisoners gets its first severe challenge when United Nations guards begin moving rebellious captives into smaller compounds—probably the first week in June.

The exact date for the movement has not been announced. But camp officials say they expect Red leaders to put up some sort of fight.

Communists still rule within the present huge compounds housing from 5,000 to 8,000 POWs. U. N. guards were under orders until Friday not to enter the enclosures. New compounds will hold only 500 each.

BRIG. GEN. HAYDON L. Boatner, the new camp commander, has slowly been cracking down on the Reds. His security force has been bolstered by two American combat-tested infantry regiments and Dutch, Greek, British, Canadian and South Korean troops.

But the breakup of the prisoners into smaller groups is generally looked upon as the big test.

The present compounds are roughly 100 by 300 yards. Prisoners can freely intermingle within the area. Some compounds are separated only by narrow roads.

permitting prisoners to establish communications.

THE NEW compounds being constructed in Koje's east and central valleys will house a maximum of 500 each. Each compound will be about 75 yards square. There will be eight compounds within an enclosure using a common recreation and exercise ground, but occupants at only one compound will be permitted to use it at a time.

Army officials declined to say whether there would be guards within the overall enclosure housing the eight compounds. Individual enclosures, however, will be about 500 feet apart. They are about 150 yards wide and 400 yards long. About 20 enclosures will be needed.

U. S. ARMY Engineers and Infantrymen have been working around the clock to construct the new compounds since Boatner ordered the prisoners broken up into smaller groups.

New 10-inch square poles are used for stringing barbed wire fencing. Within each compound will be two long buildings capable of housing 250 POWs each. Prisoners, to begin with, may be quartered in tents. Each compound will have its own kitchen and latrine. Prisoner-cooks will prepare the meals.

About 450 women prisoners will be kept in their present separate quarters.

Indian Queried In Burns Death

BURNS—(AP)—Questioning of a Toledo, Ore., Indian about the death of his wife continued here Saturday by District Attorney Leonard S. Duncan.

Duncan said an autopsy Friday showed the wife, Mrs. Ethel John, 30, a white woman, died of a head injury.

Her body was brought here Thursday in a trailer by Lindsey John, 41, a Siletz Indian. He went to Duncan and reported that his wife was fatally injured when she jumped from a car as they drove through Wyoming with their 6-year old son Tuesday night.

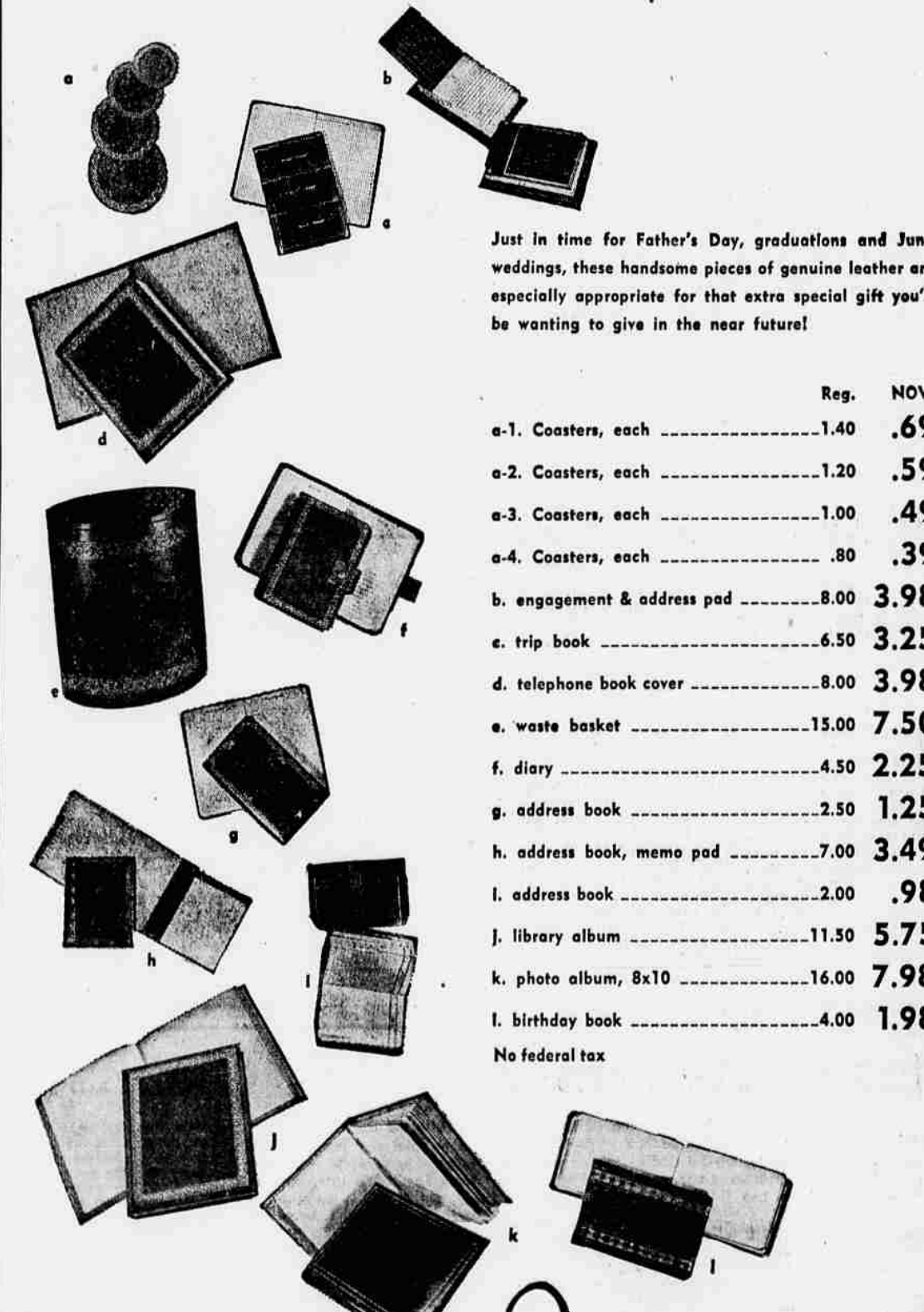
John said he helped his wife back into the car and that she seemed all right. Later he moved her to the trailer and said next day found her dead.
