## House to Act On GI Benefits For Korea Men

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A bill extending veterans' benefits to men and women who joined the armed forces since the Korean War began (June 27, 1950) will come up for House action Monday.

The measure—carrying help along the lines given veterans of World War II—is subject to 40 minutes' debate. Then, with no opportunity for any change to be made, it can be voted up or down. If a roll call is required, however, this will not be taken until Thursday.

The measure provides that educational benefits shall be paid directly to the veterans instead of to the colleges, as is the practice presently.

REP. OLIN TEAGUE (D-Tex.), author of the bill, claims this provision was written "out of consideration for the veterans and the taxpayers" and as a remedy for abuses discovered in the present veteran training program.

But Rep. W. L. Springer (R-Ill.) claims the discrimination against the private colleges of the nation. Springer's plan to offer an amendment on the floor was stopped by the committee's decision to ask the House to suspend its rules and pass the bill in one action.

THE BILL provides an educational allowance of \$110 a month for veterans without dependents or \$150 for those with dependents who enroll in a full-time institutional course.

The half-time schooling allowance would be \$50 and \$70.

From these allowances, veterans would have to meet all of their education costs, including subsistence.

For apprenticeships or other on-the-job training, allowances of \$70 and \$95 would be made. On-the-job training allowances would be \$95 and \$120.

Education benefits would be given on the basis of 1½ days of training for each day of service since June 27, 1950, regardless of where it was performed, with the maximum period amounting to 36 calendar months.

ABILENE, Kas. —(AP)—They garlanded Abilene Saturday with gay, red-white-and-blue bunting in preparation for the homecoming next week of Gen. Dwight Eisenhower, the town's favorite son, soldier, presidential candidate and everything else.

But in the carnival air, there are overtones of serious concern. In the eyes of Eisenhower's leaders, this will be much more than just a celebration. They say it can have profound effects, for good or evil, on the last stretch drive to nominate him as the Republican candidate for the presidency.

## Red Offensive Theft Charged To Grove Trio

TOKYO (Sunday)—(U.P.)—Gen. James A. Van Fleet said Saturday the Communists outnumber the Allies 2½ to 1 in Korea, but that a new Communist offensive will end only in disaster for the enemy.

The 8th Army commander told newsmen in Seoul he believed the 1,000,000-man Communist army would not be "foolish enough" to start the major offensive that North Korean Lt. Gen. Nam Il threatened at the Panmunjom peace talks.

As Van Fleet spoke Allied tanks and infantrymen raided Communist lines on the central front west of the Pukhan River, East of Pukhan, U.N. troops killed 16 Reds while beating off a four-hour enemy assault that followed 600 rounds of enemy artillery.

The Air Force announced that U. S. Sabre Jets shot down two MiG Saturday and damaged two more, while its weekly summary disclosed the F-86s shot down six MiGs during the week ending Friday without loss to themselves.

## Medical Care To Cost Britons

LONDON —(AP)—Britain's socialized medicine program will be scaled down Sunday.

For the first time in four years, Britons will have to pay directly for some health services, such as prescriptions, dental treatment and false teeth.

Winston Churchill's government cut back the tax-supported program to save money. Government ministers expect to save \$6 million dollars a year through the new charges.

THE HARD CORE of the program is not destroyed, however, said health minister Ian MacLeod said in a speech "the government does not declare, and it is not part of conservative policy or philosophy, that charges must remain a permanent part of the national health service."

Socialized medicine was the most popular measure of the former labor government. Its principle has become widely accepted. About 95 per cent of the people use the health service. About 95 per cent of the country's 11,000 dentists, 90 per cent of the 23,500 general medical practitioners and practically all the 16,000 druggists and 7,000 opticians participate.

THE NEW charges include: Up to \$12.60 for false teeth, up to \$2.80 for a course of dental treatment, 14 cents for each prescription, \$8.40 for surgical boots, \$2.80 for surgical supports, and varying costs for a private room in a hospital for many cases.

There still will be no direct charge for a doctor's services, surgery, hospital care, or laboratory work.

GRAND LAKE, Colo. —(AP)—The nation's highest continuous highway-trail—Ridge Road—was opened officially Friday in a ribbon-cutting ceremony near the 12,183-foot high point of the route through Rocky Mountain National Park.

EVERETT, Wash. (AP)—Rep. Henry M. Jackson (D.—Wash.) made his long-expected announcement Saturday that he would be a candidate for the U. S. Senate this autumn. Sen. Harry P. Cain (R.—Wash.) will oppose him.

criticized the statements Counsel for the Government made in answer to some of Judge Pine's questions in which Counsel took the position that the President was above the Constitution. One of the things your editorial shows is that you have missed completely the constitutional theory upon which my constitutional argument on the steel case has been based.

It is difficult for me to understand the emotional drunk which you imbibed in when you wrote your editorial because I always have felt that you usually try to present both sides of an issue with fairness and factual accuracy. I suspect that in this instance my criticism of the press touched such a sensitive spot that you resorted to the psychological escape mechanism which psychologists tell us guilty men frequently resort to, namely, attribute to their critics the very weaknesses which they themselves possess in such full measure.

I say, most good-naturedly, that it has been my observation that you gentlemen of the press are strong in criticism but very weak when it comes to recognizing its application to yourselves. Thus, I said to some of my newspaper friends last night, and I am sure you will be surprised to know that I have any, that I think the highly emotional reaction of many editors of the country to my criticism of the steel case was a whole.

## North End Extensions Improve Mail Service

Mail deliveries were improved slightly in the Eugene area during May by the extension of a mounted route north of the city. Now receiving the service are Dove, Ruskin and Bogart Lanes, and Rosteen Drive.

Other extensions will be made in June, said Postmaster Ethan L. Newman. Monday, mounted route service will start for McDougal and Hawn Lanes and rural carrier service (Route 1) will begin on Elizabeth, Theona, Wilbur, and Jessen Lanes. These are also north of Eugene.

At the same time Rt. 5, west of Eugene, will take in a portion of Central Road.

Additional extensions have been submitted to the Post Office Dept. for approval, said Newman, to keep up with increased postal business.

## Halibut Catch Large Off Astoria Port

ASTORIA—(AP)—Big loads of halibut arrived here this week, but salmon catches were falling off.

One boat, the Hermes II, landed 17,000 pounds of halibut and another, the Jesse B, docked with 15,000. The fish brought 19 to 20 cents a pound.

The season ends in this zone June 9.

Only a small number of salmon vessels have been putting to sea to troll for salmon because the schools have been found.

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
