Don Smith, and co-sponsored the winning candidate for the Jaycee-

ette Community Service Award, Mrs. Roy A. Roe.

To help pay for these benevolences, the group sold rummage twice, netting about \$150. At Christmas time, members provided a food basket for a needy family. With members of the Roseburg Zonta Club, six Eugene women attended a dance at the Veterans Hospital at Roseburg.

DURING THE YEAR, conventions and inter-city meetings came up from time to time. Guests came from Salem, Roseburg and Albany for an inter-city meeting here, and seven Eugene members went to a Corvallis meeting, two to Salem and five to Albany.

Miss Kermit Alexander, newly appointed advisor, was also given a pledge pin.

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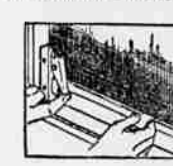
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
