mission a steady source of income.

THIS SPECIAL order means this money will not have to appear in present or future budgets. However, money from previous tax land transactions can't be claimed by the commission, according to Luckey, if it has already been earmarked and appropriated. (Most of it, apparently, has been appropriated.)

The county has never before utilized this 10 per cent method of obtaining revenue for museum building construction.

After the committee had deleted the \$250,000 from a special building fund, Commissioner Lee Raish said this amount should be building fund, Commissioner Lee Raish said there is great need for such an institution, that the aged of Lane County in many cases are not receiving proper care.

COMMISSIONER Robert MacLay said he didn't think the county was far enough along in its planning to budget such a large amount. "I favor the idea, but no one around the county seems to be taking an interest in it," MacLay said. "We haven't progressed far enough yet."

Finally, the committee agreed to budget \$10,000 "to explore all the possibilities" in determining the feasibility of a convalescent home.

The \$10,000 will be used for study and analysis of the proposed project. However, no one at present has determined what type of study will be needed or who will make it.

According to unofficial estimates, the millage rate on the county budget will remain approximately the same. On present county valuation, millage would be about 8.5 mills, a slight increase. If valuation increases to \$132,000,000, millage will be 7.3 mills. It is now 7.6 mills. Millage would include all special levies outside the 6 per cent tax limitation.

MONEY THAT can be raised by the county within the 6 per cent limitation is \$858,862. Money that can be raised by special levies already approved by county taxpayers is \$212,241. The proposed budget is within the 6 per cent limitation.

The taxpayer's meeting on the budget will be held at the courthouse at 10 a. m., June 30.

A FASHION SHOW and ladies' tea-cocktail hour is set for the Veterans Memorial Bldg. at 4 p. m. Friday. Women's bowling and golf tournaments are also scheduled.

A luncheon for Past Exalted Rulers, former local lodge leaders, has already attracted more than 75 PERs.

The convention is not only an all-Elks affair either. The public is invited to a Flag Day service and drill team competition at the Civic Stadium Saturday, starting at 1:30 p. m. This afternoon program will open with a band concert by the Eugene Elks Band, led by Ward Croft.

Earlier Saturday, at 11 a. m., the Astoria Elks Band will give a free band concert at the bandstand in the city-county park on E. 8th Ave.

More than 100 golfers, 68 bowling teams, and 20 trap shoot teams have already registered, according to Rev. Marlett, athletic activities chairman. The number of bowling teams is about 15 more than were registered for the state Elks Tournament this year, Marlett said.
